POPULATION OF KNOX COUNTY, OHIO.

We give here, below, the official report of 1870, with the population and statistics, as received and compared with the returns at Washington. By the corrected returns it is found that Knox County has not so largely decreased in population as first reports indicated. We copy from the revised figures as they are now published.

In comparing the population with that of 1860 we find that every township, except Clinton and Pleasant, has lost in population. Clinton has increased from 884 to 984, and Pleasant from 828 to 851. Mt. Vernon has increased from 4147 in 1860, to 4876. This comprises the old territory; we find by the addition of the new territory, the population of Mt. Vernon will be about 5017.

HISTORY OF KNOX COUNTY, OHIO.

We give due thanks to SAMUEL FARQUHAR, now Auditor of the County, for his kind assistance in getting the valuable information which we give very briefly below.

The first organization of the county of Knox was in February, 1808, when it was by enactment of the Legislature organized into a separate and distinct county—honored with the name of General Henry Knox, a distinguished officer of the Revolutionary army, who was subsequently Secretary of War in General Washington's administration.

The first white man known to have viewed this section of country was John Stilley, who, when a captive among the Indians, traversed the White Woman and Owl Creek from its mouth, in a northwesterly direction, as early as June, 1779, nine years before the name of Ohio was given to the territory, and when the savages and wild beasts roamed at will throughout its vast extent.

The first election that ever was held in Knox County, Ohio, was on the 4th day of April, 1808; the entire people of the county voted at Mount Vernon. The officers of the election were Ebenezer Brown, Jabez Beers, and Samuel Kratzer, Judge; William Gass and Robert Anderson, Clerks. They were from the most remote points, as well as from the vicinity of Mount Vernon. The election of the first officers in a new county brings out everybody; they elected them by the following votes: John Lewis, for Commissioner, received 56 votes, John Harrod 52, and Joseph Walker 48. Silas Brown was elected the first Sheriff; Jonathan Craig, for Coroner, had 45, and Francis Hardesty 1. Then for trustees—for it remembered the whole county composed the district—George Downs had 41 votes, Henry Roberts 36, and Joseph Coleman, 36. The vote for Overseer of the Poor was—Moses Craig 22; James Walker received 2 votes, Alexander Walker 12. The candidates for Supervisor were Saml. Kratzer, who received , and Peter Baxter, 36. For Fence Viewers, George Zin, Michael Click, and Jesse Severe were candidates. For House Appraisers, Archibald Gardner and James Craig each received 12 votes. For Constable, G. Wilkins 30, Philip Walker 21, Jonathan Hunt, Jr., 15, David Miller 8. For Treasurer, Ben Butler had 12 votes, and James Walker, Jr., 2.

The above gives the result of the first election in the county of Knox, of which we can see the rapid increase in population throughout all parts of the county.

In the first laying out of the townships of the county, those who would like to know what these townships comprised, will find that Wayne at that time embraced all of the present townships of Franklin and Chester, in Morrow County, Middlebury and Berlin, Wayne, and the north half of Morris.

Clinton included Broomfield, now in Morrow County, Liberty, and the north half of Pleasant, Monroe and Pike, and half of Clay.

Morgan consisted of the west half of Clay, southwest quarter of Harrison, south half of Pleasant, and all of Morgan, Miller, MILFORD, and Hilliar.

Union at that time took in Brown, Jefferson, Union, Howard, Butler, Jackson, and three fourths of Harrison. The above townships composed the county as early as 1809.

The first settlers in this district were from Virginia, Maryland, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania, and its inhabitants at every period of its history have been chiefly from the Middle States.

From our research into its early history, we are led to believe that Andrew Craig was the first white man who located within the present county limits. He was there at a very early day. The first cabin-house that was built in the county, is supposed to have been built by Andrew Craig; this hut was located by a little

Indian field, about a half mile east of where Mount Vernon City now stands, and at the point where Center Run empties into the Kokosing River, and there lived when Mount Vernon was laid out, in 1805. There he was upon the organization of Knox County, its oldest inhabitant, and there he continued until 1809.

Such a frontiersman could not rest easy when white men got thick around him, so he left, and went further west to the Indian village Greentown, and from thence migrated further out upon the frontier, preferring red men for neighbors.

The principal towns worthy of note to the early settlers, were Lancaster, Chillicothe, and Zanesville; all of these places at that early day consisted of but a very few log huts, and at that time were considered large places.

Ben. Butler, Peter Coyle, and Thomas Bell Peatterson, in the spring of 1805, augmented the Walker settlement, where Mount Vernon was located. Shortly thereafter William Douglass is joined by James Loveridge, who emigrated from Morris County, New Jersey, and with his wife took quarters, on the 6th of July, upon the clapboards in the garret of his little log cabin, and was very thankful to obtain a shelter of that kind, to spend years in the new country. Mr. Loveridge, shortly after arriving in Knox County, purchased a large tract of land in and about Morris Township, on which he erected a dwelling, and has since resided.

In the winter of 1805-6 that settlement entered into a written agreement to give nine bushels of corn for each wolf scalp that might be taken, and three of the men caught forty-one wolves in steel traps and pens. The description of the pens, and one of the stories told of their operation, we give in the words of an old settler. "Wolf pens were about six feet long, four wide, and three feet high, formed like a huge square box of small logs, and floored with puncheons; were very heavy, and moved by an axle at one end, made of a small round stick; the trap was set by a figure 4, with any kind of meat, except that of wolves', the animals being fonder of any other than their own. On gnawing the meat, the lid fell, and caught unamiable native."

Mount Vernon—of late widely known as the Armstrong section. The family consisted of his wife and his sons; William now lives at Pekin, Illinois; Isaiah near Pilot Knob, Missouri; Richard Roberts, of Berlin, and daughter Massah, who married Dr. Timothy Burr, and died at Clinton, March 9, 1814. Nine acres of the beautiful prairie were at once broken up, and planted in corn. It was very hard work to break the virgin soil with a good four-horse plow team at this early day; it was the finest crop of corn that was ever raised in the county at that time. In the fall, Wm. Y. Farquhar, a cousin of Henry Roberts, came with his family; and after him came Wm. W. Farquhar, with his family. They all stopped with Henry Roberts, and thus composed the first settlement of Friends in this district or county. Thence came Quakers in Wayne, Middlebury, and Berlin, which formed the second settlement.

The First Settlement with the County Treasurer.

The first fiscal year of Knox County made the following showing, on settlement of the Treasurer with the Commissioners, and from a full investigation of all the accounts and moneys paid into his hands as Treasurer, that the said Treasurer has paid and accounted with us for the above twenty-three dollars seventy cents and four mills, which is as follows:—

Order that Henry Haines be allowed the sum of \$23 70.4, which is a balance due him on settlement as Treasurer of Knox County, and the Treasurer is ordered to pay the same.

We now give the amount of taxes paid in the county of Knox. Total taxes levied for all purposes in A.D. 1870, \$167,741 42.

The total value of all the personal and real property of the county, in 1870, was \$12,773,687.

The above will show the rapid increase in wealth from 1809 up to 1870, which will give the amount of taxes paid for all purposes in Knox County.

Henry Haines, the first Treasurer of Knox County, was one of the finest men in the county. At its organization he had been a man of education and property, and was in easy circumstances. He became deranged on the subject of religion, was an active and leading member of the Disciples, or Christian denomination, at that time called "New Lights." He officiated with James Smith in the first Conference held in the county, of which David Young, of Zanesville, was Presiding Elder.

Haines became a loud exhorter, and becoming deranged, got a tin horn and rode around the town and country day and night, notifying the people to prepare for judgment, as the world was coming to an end.

Beyond the recollection of the oldest inhabitants now living within our border, a tragedy was enacted on the point of a bluff between Center Run and Owl Creek, of which much has been said by old citizens, but very little is known. The exact time of its occurrence is usually stated at about 1805; but, in fact, it must have occurred as early as 1800, if not before that. Two slaves had run away from their masters. Tumlinson, who lived in Virginia, had got into this part of the country, and had taken up with squaws. Their pursuers tracked them through to Zanesville, and up Owl Creek, and finally came upon them at Andy Craig's. One of the boys was a mulatto, and recognizing his master's son as he approached, with two other men, sprang to the bank and into the creek, pursued by the men, who overtook him in the middle of the stream, and a deadly struggle took place, in which he killed his young master, but was then overpowered, taken to the hut, tied, and shortly after placed on the horse his young master had ridden, and the company started for Virginia with him. The second night after leaving Craig's they built a camp-fire, and left the mulatto tied by it when they went out for game. On their return he was found to have been shot, but neither could say that he did it. The belief was that they had become tired of taking him along, and as he was surely troublesome, he was killed to get rid of him, and out of revenge for the loss of Tumlinson.

Ben Butler informs us that on his trip to Owl Creek, in 1801, Andy Craig told him the particulars of this fight, and that in 1805, when he made a trip out to the Sandusky Plains, he saw the negro

who escaped, and was then living with a squaw among the Indians, and talked with him about this affair.

Result of the first Court of Common Pleas in Knox County, in February Term of 1808. William Hendrick was the first criminal who was found guilty of felony. The sentence of the court, when, where, by whom, and how executed. The judgment of eastigation was executed upon the public square of Mount Vernon shortly after the adjournment of court, in the presence of all the people, Silas Brown being sheriff; and it fell to his lot as such to serve the legal process upon the body of William Hendricks. There was a small leaning hickory tree on the east side of the public square; to this selected spot the culprit was taken, and his hands were stretched up over his head and tied to the tree, and the stripes were applied by the sheriff to his naked back. He was struck forty times with a heavy raw-hide whip. Spectators pleaded for mercy for the poor fellow. Such was the mode of punishment in the early settlements of our country.

We now give the time the Townships were first laid out, as they now exist.

MIDDLEBURY TOWNSHIP.

On the 3d of December, 1823, this Township was established, and the first election was held at the house of Luther Bateman, in April, 1824. It is now in the northwest corner of Knox County. The improvements of this Township are good; with scores of improvements, the beauty of the country, and the intelligence of its inhabitants, it ranks among the first in the county.

BERLIN TOWNSHIP.

This Township received its name from some of its earliest settlers, having emigrated from Berlin, Connecticut. It was organized as a Township, March 9th, 1825. Stephen Cole proposed the name.

BROWN TOWNSHIP.

This Township was laid out March 9th, 1825, and attached to Jefferson until it should be ascertained that there were inhabitants enough in Brown to have it organized. March 6th, 1826, order was made by the commissioners that Brown Township be hereafter considered a separate and distinct Township, and the election be held at the house of Josiah Ewing.

JEFFERSON TOWNSHIP.

This Township, bearing the honored name of President Jefferson, was, at the March term of the commissioners, declared a distinct Township. An election was then ordered for Township officers at the election of the first Monday of April, 1829, at the house of Andrew Lockard.

MONROE TOWNSHIP.

This Township was erected March 9th, 1825, and favored with the name of President Monroe. The surface of the country is broken; it is well watered with fine springs throughout its entire border.

PIKE TOWNSHIP.

This Township was established June 7th, 1819, and derived its name from General Pike. The first election was held the 26th of June, at the house of Michael Harter. David Long, an old settler of Pike Township, to whom we feel indebted for the above information, settled in Pike Township in 1816, and has remained in that Township until the present day.

HOWARD TOWNSHIP.

In the general reorganization of March 9th, 1825, this Township was formed. The land is generally rolling and well watered by springs and streams, and is good wheat land.

MORRIS TOWNSHIP.

On the 2d day of March, 1812, upon petition of several citizens, this Township was laid off and an order issued for an election, to be held at the house of Benjamin Bush, for Township officers. A majority of the early settlers being natives of Morris County, New Jersey, caused the name of Morris to be selected.

WAYNE TOWNSHIP.

One of the first Townships was named for the distinguished brave General Wayne, more generally known by the sobriquet "Mad Anthony." It is now one of the most beautiful Townships in the county of Knox. It is well watered, well timbered, healthy, and possessed of uncommon attractions for a home. The last few years' improvements have been going on rapidly in this Township, having, as it has for its society, some of the most energetic and persevering inhabitants of the county.

Fredericktown, the principal mart of business for the farmers of the northwestern portion of Knox, was laid out in 1807 by John Kerr, with its principal streets laid out as you will notice by referring to the plot of the town.

LIBERTY TOWNSHIP.

This Township, as at present bounded, was created March 9th, 1825, and, in a spirit of freedom, styled Liberty.

Mt. Liberty, in this Township, occupies an elevated position, being situated upon the State road to the Capital, and in the heart of a productive country on Dry Creek, and has been a place of considerable business; the new railroad being now located there, running from Cleveland to Columbus, will bring it into notice and to its wanted activity, having location and facilities for a thriving town.

HILLIAR TOWNSHIP.

Was laid off from Miller, upon petition of its citizens, August 28, 1818. It is the southwestern Township of the county. When the Township was formed the settlers agreed to the name of Hilliar, in compliment to Dr. Richard Hilliar, who was then the largest landholder residing in the limits. It now has a small village named after the Township, together with the village of Centerburg, its principal mart of business for this Township hereafter, being located on the Cleveland and Columbus Railroad, now under rapid progress, which will bring it up to a level with other portions of the county.

MILFORD TOWNSHIP.

This Township was created March 3d, 1823, out of territory taken from Miller. The land is generally level, and soil fertile. Named in honor of New Milford, Connecticut; the settlers being mostly all eastern people, the name was adopted. They were industrious, temperate, and orderly citizens, and their families have followed in their footsteps closely, as is customary in the land of steady habits.

MILLER TOWNSHIP.

This Township seems to have sprung into existence like the natural uprising of the sun, bringing fair prospects with it. One thing we do know, and that is this, the Township was named after one of its earliest settlers, James Miller, Esq., a very worthy gentleman, a native of Vermont. This Township, together with that of Clay, has the facilities for making the best butter in the county; it is not to be wondered at that we meet so many of G. B. Potwin's produce wagons trundling along with their heavy burdens of this one commodity, from these southern Townships.

PLEASANT TOWNSHIP.

March 9th, 1825, this township was created, and named on account of its delightful views. Its settlements have always been retarded by large landholders. Having no village or centre, Mt. Vernon is its principal trading point, although it is a healthy locality.

MORGAN TOWNSHIP.

In the first division of the county one of the four Townships was called Morgan, in honor of the brave native of New Jersey, Daniel Morgan, the distinguished General in our Revolutionary War. This Township also has suffered in its settlements in consequence of its large landholders.

In getting the location of roads and streams we have had some difficulty on account of finding no one to assist us, farmers being so far separated; although we find this to be in improvements and richness of soil to stand second in value and desirableness of

location to none in the county. What a rich country it is in the neighborhood of Jacob Bell and the Sperrys, with its large fields of waving grain that we saw while making surveys for this the Knox County Atlas.

CLAY TOWNSHIP.

On the 9th of March, 1825, this Township was laid out and honored with the name of the great American commoner, Henry Clay. The surface of the country is uneven; the soil is however very fertile, and is noted for fine springs and good butter.

JACKSON TOWNSHIP.

In honor of General Andrew Jackson, the commissioners, on the 4th of September, 1815, erected this Township. It is watered equal to any other Township in the county, being watered by the Wakatomika River. The ground is also rolling in this Township, but quite productive; also good butter to be found in this Township, and in point of fact Knox County is not to be excelled in its good butter and butter makers. The only town or P. O. in this Township is Bladensburg.

BUTLER TOWNSHIP.

This Township was laid out in March, 1825, and named after Richard Butler, Major-General of the U.S.A. This is a very healthy Township; the land generally rough and broken; the population is smaller than in other Townships of the county; the wild and picturesque scenery giving an air of romance to much of the country.

HARRISON TOWNSHIP.

On the 9th of March, 1825, another Township was laid out and named after General Wm. Henry Harrison. The descendants of the early settlers of this Township are of the same old stamp, vigorous and energetic, moving forward the ear of improvement.

UNION TOWNSHIP.

This Township was laid out March 9th, 1825. Several of the early settlers of this Township, whose names are familiar, still live. Millwood and Danville are the two centres of this Township. The land of this Township is generally rolling and hilly.

COLLEGE TOWNSHIP.

This Township was organized on December 21st, 1838, and so named in consequence of its being the seat of Kenyon College; and all the lands belonging to that institution, being one-fourth of the Township of Pleasant, northeast corner, which has in its limits the handsome little village of Gambier, with its prosperous schools and colleges, making it one of the principal attractions or interests of the county. With the high moral intelligence and educational advantages it affords, its healthful locality, it should be well patronized by all who desire a finished education.


RELIGION AND EDUCATION.

The religious societies most noted in point of numbers and influence are the Methodist, Baptist, Presbyterian, Congregational, and the Christian Disciple. All are lending a power to influence the morals and piety of the community.

CONCLUSION.

From a cloud the "size of a man's hand" this county has risen, in a half century, to occupy an elevated position as an integer of the great commonwealth. From a few brave and hardy pioneers the population has multiplied to thousands, with proportional increase in Religion, Science, and General Intelligence. With our fertile valleys, and hills rich in agricultural wealth, our undeveloped mineral resources, and the example of the past, what may we not, a loyal people, hope for in the future?


