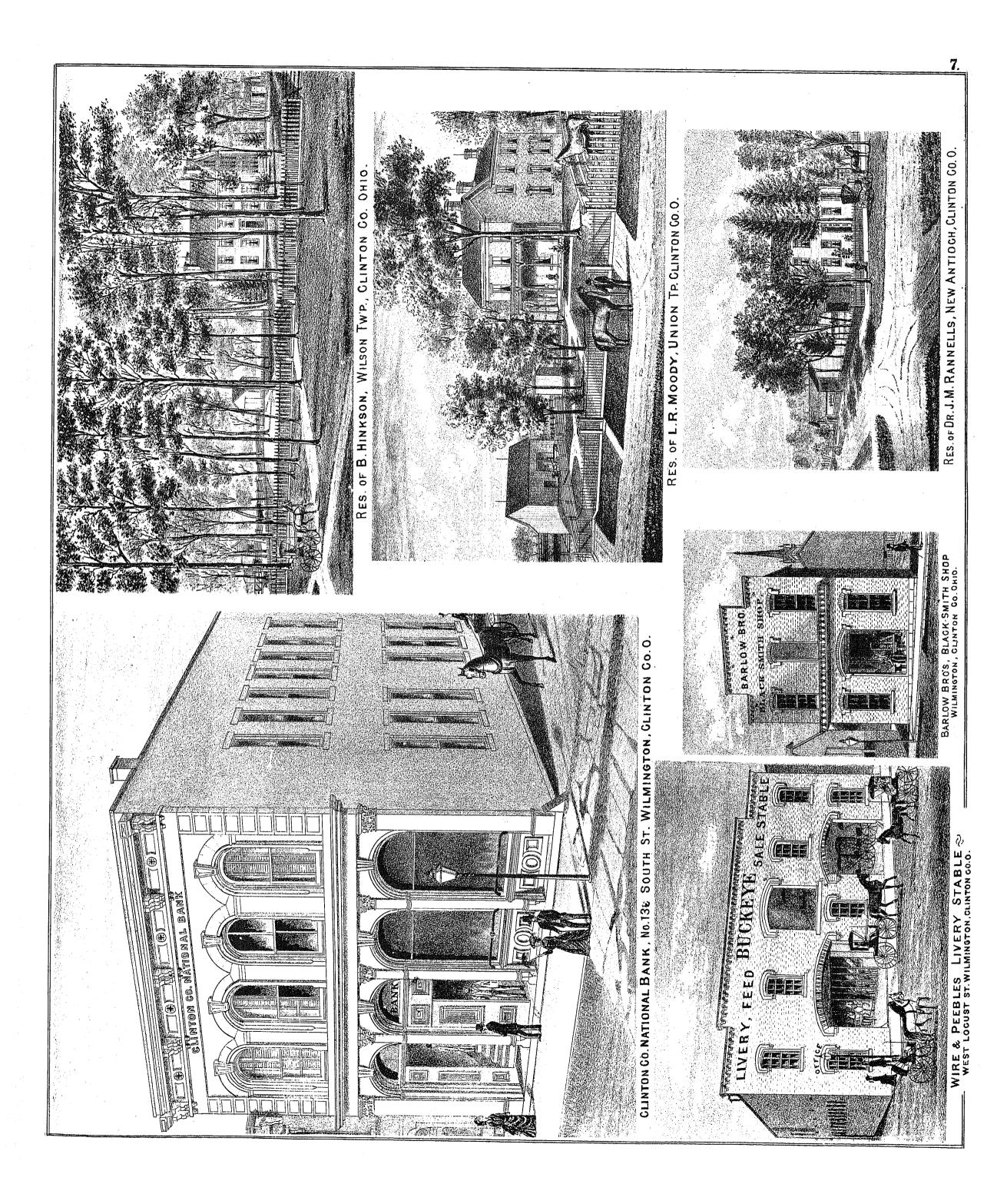

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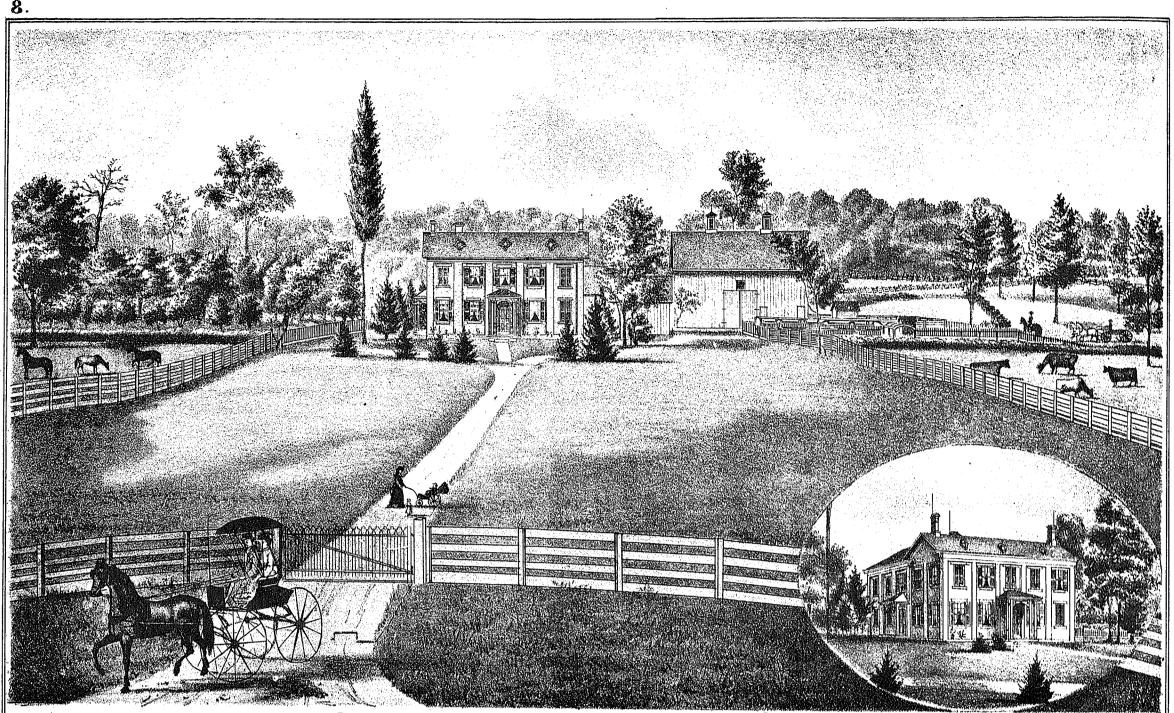

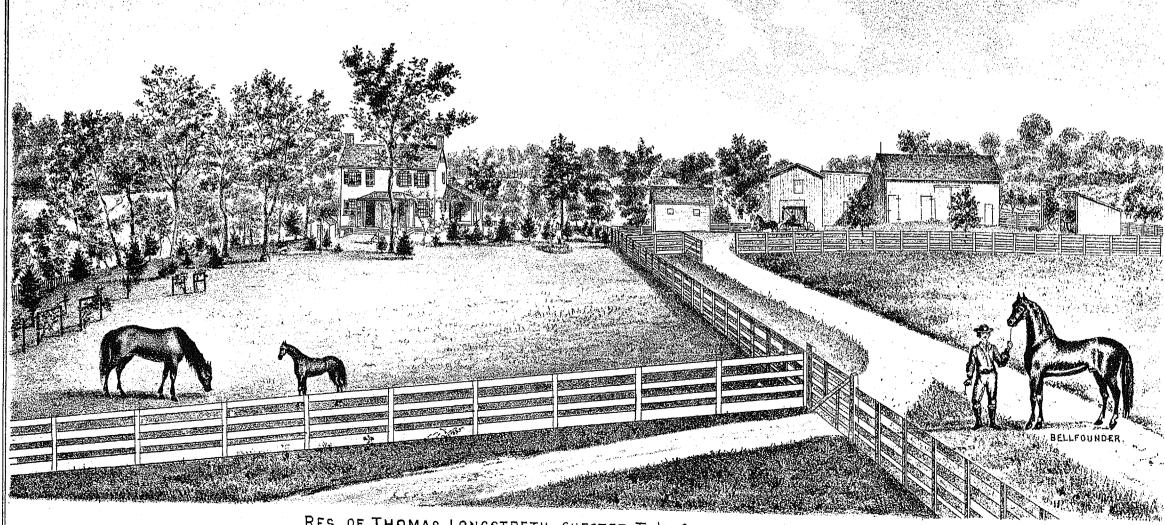

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HISTORY OF CLINTON COUNTY, OHIO.

STATE OF OHIO.—This State is bounded north by Lake Eric, north-east by Pennsylvania, east and south-east by the Ohio river, which separates it from Virginia; south and south-east by the same stream, which there separates it from Kentucky, west by Indiana, and north-west by Michigan. This State lies between 37° 25′ and 41° 58′ north latitude, and between 3° 30′ and 7° 48′ west longitude from Washington.

The soil of Ohio is generally fertile. The productions are wheat, rye, oats, corn, live stock, and fruits. The principal tributaries of the Ohio river flowing in this State, are Muskingum, Hockhocking, Sciota, and Great and Little Miami. Their sources interlock with those running into Lake Erie: the Ashtabula, Grand, Cuyahoga, Huron, Sandusky, and Mannee. The original Constitution of Ohio, was formed at Chillicothe, in 1802, and continued in operation until 1851, when a new Constitution was framed at Columbus, by a convention, March 10th, and adopted by the people, June 17th, 1851. By this constitution, the Senators and Representa-tives are elected biennially, and meet at Columbus, on the first Monday of January following.

The territory now comprised within the limits of this State, was formerly a part of the immense central tract owned by the French, and called Louisiana. The time when the settlement of the State comnenced, was that when the close of the Revolutionary war promised permanent peace and security, even to that then distant and wild portion of our territory. A considerable part of the territory had been granted to the soldiers newly disbanded; and tracts of considerable extent o persons who had been sufferers from the destructive marauding incursions of the enemy, in the course of the war, when several Connecticut towns were reduced to ashes. The Connecticut claim was founded on the royal charter of the Colony, which, after fixing the northern and southern boundaries of Connecticut, carried them through to the Pacific Ocean. Under this authority, Connecticut had settled the Wyoming Valley in Pennsylvania, and long exercised jurisdiction over it, together with all other parts of the tract thus conceded to her, in consideration of a valuable portion of Ohio, afterward called New Connecticut, or the Connecticut Reserve.

EARLY SURVEYS.

The Great Miami river was surveyed for one hundred miles, in 1751, by Christopher Gist, agent of the Old English Ohio Company; and the English had a fort, or trading-post on Loramie's Creek, forty-seven miles north of Dayton, which was taken by the French. In 1788 the Miami Valleys were examined by Daniel Boone, during his captivity, and by Bowman and Clark, on their military excursions. By an act of Parliament, 1774, all this territory, known as the North Western Territory, was made a part of the Province of Quebec. In 1783 the claims of England to the North Western Territory was signed to the United States. In the Autumn of 1785, a detachment of United States troops, under the command of Maj. John Doughty, commenced the erection, and the next year completed Fort Harmer, on the right bank of the Muskingum, at its junction with the Ohio. t was named in honor of Col. Josiah Harmer, to whose regiment Major Doughty was attached. In the same year, Gen. Benj. Tupper, of Massachu setts, was appointed Surveyor, under the Surveyor General of that state, to begin the survey of the country north-west of the Ohio and proceeded that year as far as Pittsburg. The survey was on account of the hostility of the Indians, postponed until the following year, when he and General Putnam published an invitation to disbanded soldiers, who had received deeds of land in Ohio, in payment of their services, to proceed with them to the Ohio region. "The Ohio Company" was formed at their proposition; and on the 7th of April, 1788, Gen. Putnam landed at the mouth of the Muskingum, with a party of laborers and artificers, and began to make preparations for the first settlement designed by that association, at

At that period, the Shawnees were inhabitants of a large part of the best lands in the bounds of the present State, especially the Valleys of Sciota, Miami and Wabash. Their principal chief was Cornstalk, who had distinguished himself by his faithfulness to our countrymen, by his successful opposition to the league formed against them, by the nations beyond, to assist the British in the war. The next settlement after that at Marietta, was made at Columbia, six miles above Cincinnati, Nov. 16th, 1789, by Major Stiles, and twenty-five others, chiefly from Redstone, Pennsylvania, and partly from New York and New Jersey, under Judge Symmes. This olony was formed under circumstances of peculiar danger, the Indian being numerous and hostile around them, so that the settlers were compelled to take turns as laborers and sentinels while erecting a block house.

HARMER'S EXPEDITION.

In 1790, nearly twenty persons were killed by the Indians, near Cineinnati; and in the autumn of that year. General Harmer proceeded against them, with 320 regulars, 833 Kentucky and Pennsylvania militia, and 600 volunteers. After a severe loss in an ambush, he returned without accomplishing anything important. In 1791, General St. Clair, with a force of 2,300, was attacked in his camp, fifty miles from the Miami villages, and after a severe battle, driven from his position, and pursued four miles, with the loss of about 900 men, in killed, wounded and missing. The following year, the Indians murdered several of the commissioners sent by the United States government, to treat for peace. The third settlement was made by Frenchmen, at Gallipolis, in 1791. They had been induced to come from France, by the "Scotia Land Company," so called, an association of men who hoped to obtain from Congress a large grant of land, but were unsuccessful. Many of the settlers afterward dispersed, but the remainder at length obtained a grant of 24,000 acres, in the south-east part of Scotia County, on the Ohio. The tract was known as the French grant. The fourth settlement was at Cleveland, on Lake Eric, in 1796. Another was made at Conneaut, the same year. Both these were made by emigrants from the eastern States. In 1794, General Wayne, after many delays, and the erection of several forts, routed a large force of Indians and Canadians,

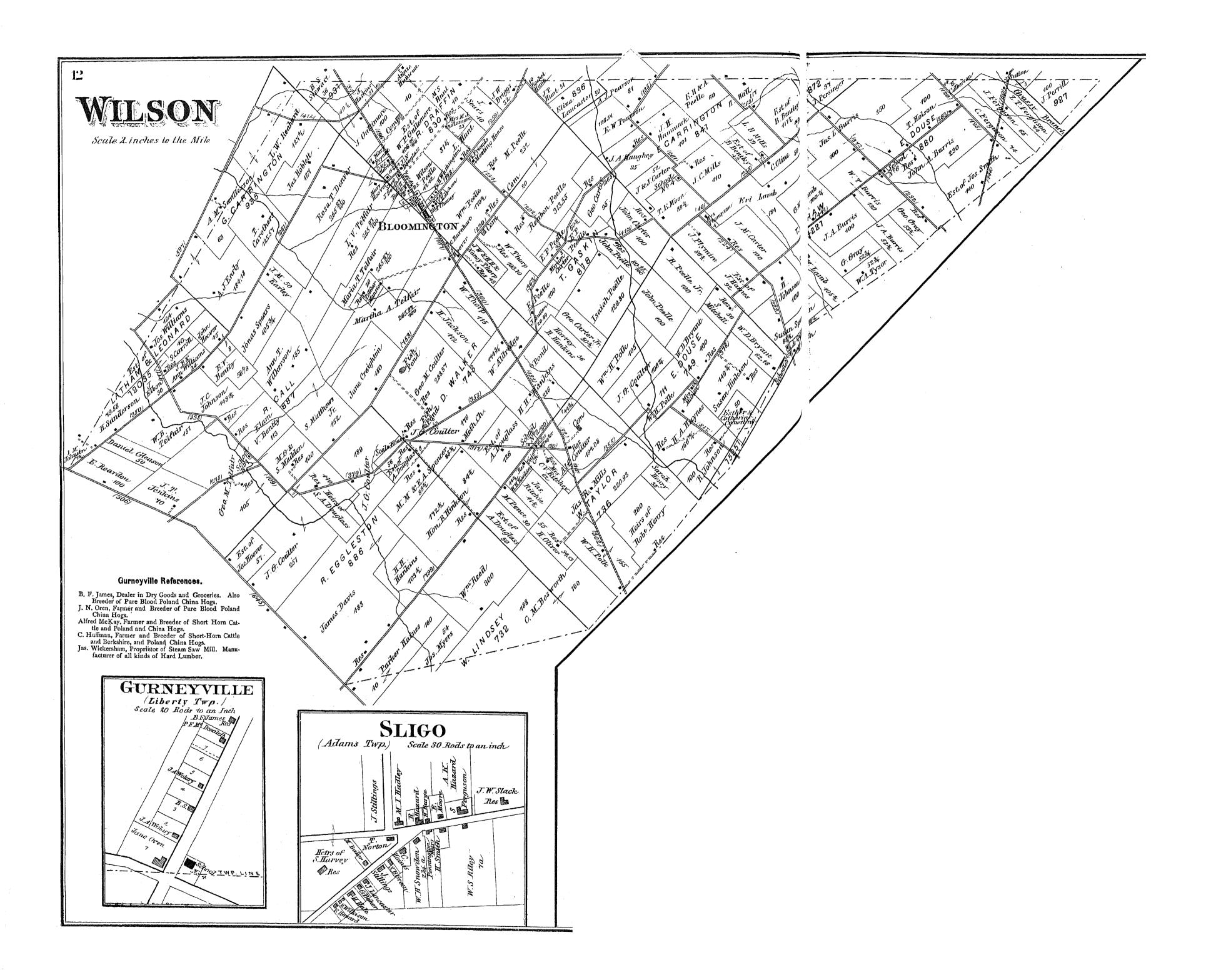
ORGANIZATION OF CLINTON COUNTY

Clinton County was organized in the year 1810. The territory now within the limits of the County, was originally parts of Warren and Highland Counties—being a part of the land that was reserved to reward the soldiers of the Revolutionary war, and known under the general name of "Military Lands." The County was named after Governor George Clinton, of New York, Vice President of the United States. The County is bounded north, by Greene, east, by Fayette and Highland, south, by Highland and Brown, and west, by Warren County. Clinton County contains about 400 square miles of land, and has a population of 21,914, or 53 inhabitants to the square mile. The soil in most parts of the County, is a black loam, usually several feet in depth, on a stratum of clay, and in some places of sand or coarse gravel. It is very fertile, and well adapted to the production of wheat, corn, oats, grass, and all kinds of vegetables. A small portion of the land in the south-west part of the County is hilly, the remainder level or gently undulating. The land is in a high state of cultivation, and the farms well improved. Stock raising is extensively pursued in this County, and many fine droves of eattle, sheep and hogs, are annually shipped to various markets. The principal streams of the County, are Anderson's and Todd's Fork, Cowan's Creek, Casar's Creek, and the East Fork of the Little Miami, all of which flow in a south-westerly direction, and are tributary to the "Little Miami River." The principal Surveyor's office was opened for the strength of the little was compared to the country of the principal Surveyor's office was opened. for the entry of lands in the military district of Ohio, between the Scioto and Little Miami rivers, on the first of August, 1787. "The first entry of land in what is now Clinton County, was number 550, which includes a large body of land east and north-east of New Antioch. This entry was made, beyond a doubt, by the principal surveyor, Col. Richard C. Anderson, for himself and another, only four days after the office opened. The entry reads "No. 550, Aug. 4th, 1787. Richard C. Anderson and Mayo Carrington enter 4,000 acres of land on Military warrant, No. 586, on the waters of the Little Miami, beginning three miles south-east of Col. Logan's encampment in October, 1786." During the winter of 1794–5, Gen. Nathaniel Massie, assisted by Nathaniel Beasley, Peter Lee, and others, surveyed a large portion of land on Todd's Fork and Casar Creek.

Carolinas. As to whom the first permanent settler in the County was, is not definitely known. It has been asserted by members of the family of David Sewell, that his settlement in Vernon Township dates back to 1798, while other members of the family claim that it was two or three years subsequent. Unfortunately, there are no records showing the date of Mr. Sewell's settlement in the County. The first permanent settlement of which there is any record was that of Amos Wilson and James Mills in that part of the County, known as Wilson Township. Mr. Wilson was born in New Jersey on the seventh of April, 1770. In the year 1784, at the age of 14, he emigrated to the State of Kentucky, where he remained until 1791, when he removed to Ohio; and, in 1799, in company with James Mills (his brother-in-law). settled in what is now Wilson Township—Clinton County—, where he remained until 1839, when he removed to the State of Indiana, but returned to Ohio in 1843, and, in 1844, returned to Indiana, where he remained until his death, Oct. 27, 1854. Mr. Wilson was married four times, viz: June 22d, 1791, to Ann Mills, who died March 25th, 1807; September 27th, 1807, he was married to Ruchel Junes who died March 1719. The Total Total County of the County he was married to Bachel James, who died May 7th, 1818; July 12th, 1818, he was married to Mary Coulter, who died in 1839; and in 1848, he was again married to Elizabeth Dowden, who died in the year 1874. Mr. Wilson was the father of fifteen children, five of whom are now living. At the time of his first marriage, he could neither read nor write. After experiencing religion, he learned both and began speaking as a minister in the Baptist Church. In moral attainments he was unsurpassed by none. The spring of 1800 brought a few families to the County. Morgan Van-Metre, from Morgantown, Va., located in the vicinity of Snow Hill, making a purchase of 200 acres of land. Timothy Bennett came to the north-west territory in the spring of this year. He was a native of New Jersey, where he was born in 1765. When he arrived at manhood he removed to Pennsylvania, in 1789, where he was married to Elizabeth Hoblitt. In the fall of the same year, they, in company with her father's family, descended the Ohio river to Maysville, Kentucky, where they proceeded to the interior and settled in Woodford County, where they remained ten years. In the fall of 1799, Mr. Bennett purchased 200 acres of land in survey No. of entry 2690, within the Virginia Military District. In the Spring of 1800, in company with his -consisting of wife, two sons, as new home, going via Cincinnati, carrying their provisions, cooking utensils, beds, clothing on pack-horses. From Cincinnati he went to a point near Centerville, Montgomery County, where he found quite a number of persons from his native State, they having settled there one year or two previous Mr. Bennett remained here during the summer, and, in the winter of 1801, having found the land he had purchased, and having creeted a log cabin upon the same, he removed to his new home, about one and a half miles northeast of the present town of Wilmington, where he remained until his death, which occurred early in the year 1827. During the years 1803-4, emigrants began to arrive more rapidly, and settlements were made in different localities, and which continued to increase, so that in 1810, when the County was formed, the population had reached 2,674. In this progressive age, the settlement of a new country is not difficult. The railroad, the postoffice, and the telegraph follow close in the wake of civilization. Transportation facilities are such that emigrants carry with them to their new homes, not only the comforts of life, but many of its luxuries, and the most improved implements of husbandry and manufacturing, so that in a very short time after they arrive at their place of destination. We find them in the enjoyment of all the conveniences and advantages of an old community, with easy and constant communication with their friends whom they left behind, and with the protection of a powerful government. Villages and towns spring up as if by magic. It was not so in the early days of Clinton County, the pioneers of which saw before them a vast wilderness of dense forest. They were remote from any cultivated region, with no facilities for transportation but the pack-horse and the heavy emigrant wagon; and no roads for these. Food, clothing, household goods, farming



implements and munitions of war could be obtained only in small supplies and with great difficulty. Intercourse with the older settlements was slow and uncertain, and they could not be relied on for protection or assistance in times of need. To overcome such obstacles and face such dangers require more than ordinary courage. The habitations of those days were the double log cabin with an entry between, two rooms, clap board roof, puncheon floors, with chimneys of split sticks and clay mortar, clap-board doors with wooden hinges and latches. A loom and spinning-wheel were indispensable, as well as a hominy-block and pestle, and a hand-mill to

The farms of the new settlers were small, numbering from five to twenty acres. Wild pasture was abundant and good; stock was permitted to remain all the year in the woods. Game was abundant, and each pioneer had his rifle and knew well how to use it. Necessity schooled the settlers in economy, and bound them together in the strongest social ties; they had no written law and no court of justice except public opinion. Honesty was a written law and no court of justice except public opinion. Honesty was a universal characteristic of these pioneers, and a thief, or a man detected of any dishonest practice, would not be tolerated in any community. The members of each community were mutually dependent, and every one was expected to do his duty faithfully. When invitations were sent out for assistance at a house-raising, or a log-rolling, every man invited was expected to be present. Isolated from refined society and compelled to live in a style extremely simple, the people were rude in manners, but very hospitable, and divided their scanty stores and rough fare freely with the neighbor or stranger, and to offer pay for a favor of this kind was an offence. They lived, worked, suffered, fasted, and feasted together in the most cordial harmony.

"On February 19th, 1810, Clinton County was established. The law creating the County took effect March 1st, of that year. Judge Hughes, it is believed, was the first to move for the establishment of the County. The scheme was warmly opposed by many of his neighbors, who urged that their taxes would be greatly increased to defray the expenses incident to the creation of a new county: such as the erection of public buildings, the increase of public offices, &c. But Judge Hughes opposed to these arguments an activity, energy and public spirit that finally enabled him to succeed. He circulated petitions extensively, was instrumental in calling a public meeting of the popula within the limits of the proposed pay (fourty and by great of the people, within the limits of the proposed new County, and by great personal efforts carried his proposition, and was appointed to carry the petitions for the new County to Col. Richard S. Thomas, Mathias Corwin, the former senator, and the latter representative of Warren County. Through the instrumentality of these gentlemen mainly, the law creating the new County of Clinton was carried in the Lagislature following. of Judge Hughes throughout the contest, and his final success, entitle him to be called the Father of Clinton County."

The first court in Clinton County was held at the house of Jesse Hughes, near the present site of Wilmington, on the 28th day of March, "in the year near the present site of Wilmington, on the 28th day of March, "in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and ten," presided over by Francis Dunlavy and Thomas Hinkson, Associate Judges, at which time Warren Sabin was appointed Clerk pro tem, and Robert Eachus appointed Recorder of said County. The Court then adjourned sine die. "At the organization of the County, three townships were made: Chester, Vernon and Richland; and the number of townships were made: and the number of townships was not increased until August 13th, 1813; when Green and Union Townships was not increased until August 15th, 1813; when Green and Union Townships were created. Wilmington was in the beginning in Chester Township. Each township was allowed three justices of the peace. The three elected for Chester were Robert Eachus, George Arnold and William Haynes."

The County having been established, it now became necessary to select a site and locate the County-seat. For this purpose the Legislature appointed three commissioners who, having examined several localities, finally selected the place where Wilmington now is, for the County-seat. The spot selected the place where Wilmington now is, for the County-seat. The spot selected by the Commissioners included sixty acres of land, belonging to two persons, viz: fifty acres to David Faulkner, and the remaining ten acres to Joseph Doan. The second term of Court was also held at the house of Jesse Hughes, on the 16th of May, 1810; present, Peter Burr, Jesse Hughes and Thomas Hinkson, Associate Judges, Warren Sabin, Clerk; whereupon James McManis was appointed "Director" with instructions. It was also decided that Peter Burr was first in commission, Jesse Hughes second, and Thomas Hinkson third. The Court then proceeded to examine the report of the commissioners appointed to establish a sent of justice for the County, after which it adjourned. But the location for the sent of justice was not yet determined upon, it being the desire of the court that David Faulkner and Joseph Doan should make a deed and sufficient title in fee simple for their dountions, within a specified time, which, if they failed to do, the con were instructed to select another place for the seat of justice for the County. Deeds were executed by Faulkner and Doan for their respective donations, and on the 27th of May, the Court received the report of the "Director," examined the donation bond of David Faulkner to the Director for fifty acres of land, on certain proviso therein contained; also a donation bond of Joseph Down to the Director, for ten and one fourth acres of land on the same proviso. On the same day, the Court ordered "the Director to lay out the town for the County-sent, and to sell every odd number of the lots, on a credit of one-third in six, one-third in twelve, and the remainder in eighteen months: the purchaser giving bond with approved scenrity. The Director was also ordered to advertise the sale of said lots in the Chillicothe and Lebanon newspapers as long as he thought necessary before the sale. The plat of the town being completed, the first sale of lots took place on the 6th and 7th days of August, 1810. "The sale was largely attended, and competition ran high. The highest price paid for any lot was \$100. This was lot No. 72, laying the whole length of it on the east side of South Street, and extending from Main Street to Morris Alley. The lowest price paid for an lot was for No. 82, on east Sugar-tree Street." "The name given to the town, on the official plat and in the deeds, for the lots sold at the first sale, was "Clinton." The name of the town was changed to that of "Armonia," by order of the Court, Sept. 10th, 1810. At the same time, James McManis ook an additional donation deed from Joseph Doon, and proceeded to advertise the remainder of the loss moold in "Armenia" (formerly "Clinton,") in the following newspapers, viz: "Western Star," "Liberty Hall," and "Scioto Gazette," said lots to be offered for sale at public auction, on the first Monday of November, 1810, the sale to continue from that day until they were all offered for sale; giving a credit of six, twelve and eighteen months, in three equal payments, the notes to be taken separate for each payment, allowing a discount of eight per cent, on cash payments the Director reserving the right to reject the sale of such lots not bringing their supposed value. Under a law of the state, authorizing the "Associate Judges" to fill vacancies in the "Board of Commissioners," the Court, this day (Sept. 10, 1810), appointed James Wilson to fill the vacancy of George McManis, resigned. The Court also allowed James McManis his account. including all the costs and charges in laying out the "County-seat," amounting in all to \$128,25. The first "State case" before the Court of "Common Pleas" was that of Cornelius Quick, indicted for horse stealing, tried before Pleas" was that of Cornelius Quick, indicted for horse stealing, tried before the following jurors, viz.: David Wright, Daniel Hodgson, William Butler, Charles Mann, George Haworth, Joseph Havnes, Simeon Ballard, John McKinsey, Thomas Gillan, Peter Dicks, Thomas McMillan, and Daniel Dillon, who found the defendant guilty, and the Court ordered that "he be

whipped on his naked back, fifty stripes, on Saturday, Oct. 27th, 1810, at 2 P. M." and that he pay a fine of twenty dollars and the costs of the prosecution, and be imprisoned ten days; that the owner of the horse (James School, and Daugherty) recover of the defendant the sum of \$2.25, damages assessed by

December 31st, the name of the seat of justice was changed to "Mount Pleasant," and, on the 11th of February, 1811, was again changed to "Wilmington," from Wilmington, North Carolina. The first "tavern license" granted in the County was to James Birdsall, February 19th, 1811, and another to Walter Armstrong, the same day. June the 4th, 1811, the Court granted Larkin Reynolds a license to "keep tavern" in Wilmington; and James Montgomery was allowed \$60.00 per annum for his services as prosecuting attorney. The old Court House was sold at public auction, March 7th, 1838, when George Fallis and John B. Posey became the purchasers for the sum of \$240.00. Jefferson Township was organized, March 5th, 1839. New Court House finished and received by the Commissioners, June 1840. Adams Township was organized in May, 1849, from Chester and Vernon Townships, the first election being held at the shop of John H. Moore, in Sligo, on the 12th of May. August 6th, 1850, a new jail was contracted for by the Commissioners). August 6th, 1850, a new jail was contracted for by the Commission ers, with Peyton Burton, for the sum of \$1,975.00, for the carpenter work; and Isaac Underwood and Levi Shepherd, for the brick and stone work, at \$3.50 per perch for the stone, and \$8.50 per thousand for the brick work. Wilson Township was on the 20th of August, 1850, stricken from Richland, Union and Liberty; the first election being held on the 7th of September of the same year, at the tavern of H. H. Bruce, at Lewisville. New Vienna incorporated June 6th, 1853. April 21st, 1856, the Commissioners purchased of Jesse Hughes, Jr., fifty acres of land adjoining the "County Farm," paying for the same \$2,600.00. PERSONAL SKETCHES.

ROBERT WAY.

ROBERT WAY was born at Newberry, York County, Pennsylvania, on the 17th of July, 1788. In 1794 his parents removed to Bedford County, Pennsylvania, where he grew up to manhood. In company with Joseph and Thomas Whinery he came to Ohio in the early part of October, 1813, and commenced a school on Dutch Creek, three or four miles north-west of Wilmington in Newborn of that your America his students were the Wilmington, in November of that year. Among his students were Jeremiah Reynolds and Judge Abner Haines. He spent the summer of 1814 among his friends and relatives in Pennsylvania, and returned to Ohio in the fall, and during the winter of 1814-15 taught a six months' school at Dutch Creek school-house. In his autobiography he says: About this time I found a warm friend in my patron, Robert Eachns; at his suggestion, his neighbors joined with him and built me a school-house on Stony Ridge, about two miles north-west of Wilmington. I christened the same Todd's Fork School house. I conducted a large rehool in that house during the

In the period from November 1817 to April 1818 he taught a six months' school at Dunning's Creek, Pennsylvania, and a quarter school in the Beech Grove woods, north of Isaac Wales, Warren County, Ohio; and in the winter of 1818-19, a quarter school at Springboro, same County. During the latter part of 1818 he took three degrees of Masonry, and was for lifty-three years a Mason, one of the oldest, if not the oldest, in Ohio. From June, 1819, until January, 1821, he was a student at Ohio University, Athens. After leaving the University, he remained with his friends at Dunning's Creek, Pennsylvania, until October, 1821, when, in company with Edwin Vickroy and Samuel Hammond, he again came to Ohio, the three embarking in a skiff at Pittsburg, and designing to land at Cincinnati, but when they reached Belpre, twelve miles below Marietta, they sold skiff and provisions, and made a journey on foot to Springhoro, Warren County, where, in a short time, he took charge of a large school, with Mr. Vickroy as assistant. On New Year's Day, 1823, he was married to Abigail Williams, who continued the partner of his joys and sorrows until her decease, February 24th, 1869. For a period of twelve years he taught school in the several localities of Clear Creek, Leesburg and Hillsboro. During the agitation and division in the Society of Friends in 1827 and

1828, he was disowned by the Orthodox. In 1839 he removed to Cincin-1828, he was disowied by the Orthodox. In 1659 he removed to Chiennati, and, with his brother-in-law, Williams, engaged in milling, which proved disastrous, and involved him in debt. He removed to Clinton County in 1844, and taught school at Martinsville. In 1851-2 he taught in Clark County. In 1854 he located in Wilmington, where he resided during the remainder of his life. He was engaged in teaching sixty years; fortysix years of his life were actually spent in the school-room. Died September 25th, 1871, in the eighty-fourth year of his age.

JESSE HUGHES, SR.

JUDGE HUGHES was born in Berkley County, Virginia, January 22d, 1767. His ancestors were from Wales, and emigrated to this country at an early day, and settled in Chester County, Pennsylvania. In 1780 Judge Hughes removed from Virginia to Western Pennsylvania, where he resided until 1784, when he removed to Kentucky and settled in Jefferson County. He soon after became a member of the Baptist Church, of which he was a member for a period of sixty-five years. He was with General George R. Clark in his last campaign against Vincennes. In 1805 he removed to Ohio, and settled on the farm two miles east of Wilmington, where he resided until his death. In the organization of Clinton County he was appointed one of the first Associate Judges, and served in that capacity twenty-eight years. He died on the 9th of August, 1853, in the eightyseventh year of his age.

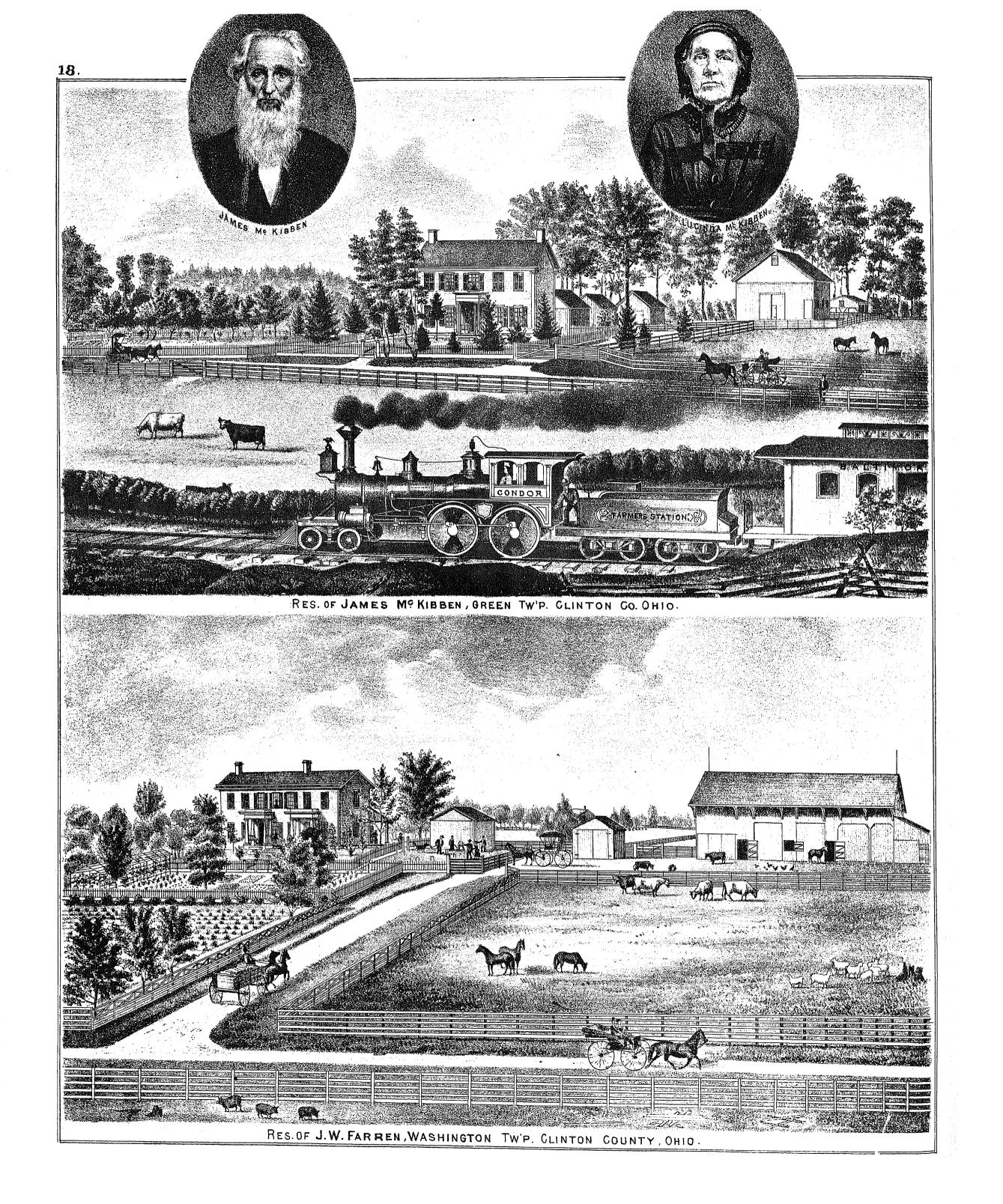




RES. OF C.M. BOSWORTH, WILMINGTON, CLINTON GO. OHIO,

HISTORY OF THE PRESS.

In 1812 the first newspaper published in Clinton County was issued by Mr. Rice Gaddis, bearing the name of "The True American." It was a warm supporter of the administration of Mr. Madison, and advocated the war policy of that President. This paper continued to be published for five or six years. The press upon which his paper was printed, together with the type, etc., were brought by Mr. Gaddis from the East.

The second paper published in the County was "The Galaxy," the publication of which began in 1820, by George Denny, father of the present editor of the "Wilmington Journal." Mr. Denny continued to publish the "Galaxy" until 1823, when he died. The material upon which the paper was printed was then purchased by the Hon. Jeremiah Reynolds, who changed the title of the paper to "The Wilmington Spectator," and published it for one year, when its publication ceased. The fourth paper published in the County was the "Western Argus," the publication of which was begun in 1825 by John McManus and Benjamin Hinkson, who, after conducting it about one year, sold it to John B. Seamans, a practical printer, who changed its name to "Wilmington Argus," under whose direction it was continued four years longer, when he removed it (1830) to Lafayette, Indiana.

The sixth paper published in the County was the "Clintonian," by W. H. P. Denny, in 1829, who continued to publish it until 1831, when he sold it to John Crihfield, who changed the title to the "Constitutionalist," which he published for one year. In 1833 Messrs. Cameron and McKibben issued the first number of "The Democrat and Herald," which was in a short time taken by Messrs. John and Thomas McKibben, which they continued until the close of the campaign of 1840, when its publication ceased. In 1838 the "Western Whig" was commenced by Messis Truesdell and Drake, Subsequently R. B. Harlan took an interest in it, and became the editor of the paper. In the same year (1838) "The Clinton Republican" was established by Robert R. Lindsey, and was continued by him until the beginning of the year 1846, when he sold the establishment to David Fisher Subse quently Mr. Lindsey commenced the publication of another paper called the "People's Press," but failing in his anticipations, he removed his establishment to Mt. Sterling, Kentucky. In 1850 F. Corwin and W. B. Fisher purchased the "Republican" of Mr. D. Fisher, and conducted the paper until the 1st of July, 1852, when Mr. Corwin sold his interest in the paper to A. P. Russell, who in 1866 sold his interest to David L. Way. Novem ber 1st. 1870, W. B. Fisher sold his interest in the paper to the Browning brothers, who with Mr. Way continued to publish the paper until the latter part of the year 1875, when the Messrs. Browning purchased of Mr. Way his interest in the paper, and still continue the publication of the same.

In 1844 Messrs. John and Thomas McKibben began the publication of a

paper, advocating the election of James K. Polk to the Presidency, called the "Democratic Star" the publication of which the "Demogratic Star," the publication of which closed with the campaign of that year. The next paper published in the County was the "Weekly Empyrean," William T. Tillinghast, editor and proprietor, the first number of which made its appearance February 7th, 1850. October 31st the paper came out under the name of "The Herald of Freedom," with J. W. Chaffin as editor and proprietor. After publishing the paper two years, he sold to James Gibson, who continued until February 17th, 1854. ton Watchman" was started in January, 1856, with Franklin Bayhane an Isaac Wright as editors. February 20th, 1857, the "Watchman" made its appearance, with Isaac S. Wright editor and proprietor, who published i until June 5th, 1857, when the paper changed hands, Messrs. Doan, Tillinghast & Co. succeeding. October 16th, 1857, the paper came out in the names of R. E. and A. W. Doan. March the 12th, 1858, J. D. Hines associated himself with the paper, and R. E. Doan retired. May 7th, 1858 the paper appeared in the names of II. S. Doan and J. S. Whinnery, and August, 1858, in the name of H S. Doan, as editor and proprietor. February 4th, 1859, C. B. Lindsey associated himself with the paper. April 23d, 1859, Doan retired, and W. S. Foos took his position. Mr. Foos continued until September 27th, 1859, when he retired and the paper continued by Lindsey until February 16th, 1860, when D. J. Tillinghast associated himself with it, but only continued for a short time, leaving the paper in charge of C. B. Lindsey, who continued until October 4th, 1860, when H. S. Doan took charge of the paper as editor, and Lindsey as publisher until April 11th, 1861, when R. E. Doan assumed the duties of political editor, with C. B. Lindsey as local editor and proprietor. July 11th, 1861, Lindsey sey severed his connection with the paper, when W. P. Reid became editor and proprietor, conducting the same until May 1st, 1862, when J. D. Thurs-

ton became editor and proprietor, and published the paper until the 1st of October, 1863, when the office and material was purchased by the Democratic party of Clinton County for the purpose of establishing a Democratic paper in the County; accordingly, the "Clinton Democrat" made its appearance October 22d, 1863, and continued until April 1st, 1864, making in all twenty-four numbers, when its publication ceased. The "Wilmington Journal" was established by J. H. Garvin in 1860. He subsequently sold the office to Messrs. McVey & Co., who continued until 1871, when they sold it to W. H. P. Denny, the present editor and proprietor. Mr. Denny was also publisher of the "Western Star" at Lebanon, from April, 1836, to October, 1850, and subsequently publisher of the "Dayton Daily Gazette" and the "Circleville Union," the latter from 1861 to 1866. On the 24th of March, 1870, S. R. Nickerson began the publication of the "Blanchester Herald" at Blanchester, and continued eighteen months, when he sold to James S. Turk, who in a short time changed the name of the paper to the "Marion Independent," the publication of which ceased about the first of October, 1872. On the 6th of November, 1874, Mr. Nickerson began the publication of the "Sabina Telegram," at Sabina, using the same press and material on which the Blanchester Herald was printed. The publication of the Telegram was continued by him until April 8th, 1876, when he sold to E. L. Mann.

EARLY RELIGIOUS HISTORY,

CENTER.

This neighborhood received its first settlers about the years 1803–4. Almost from its first settlement this vicinity was selected as a place to worship

The ground where Center meeting house is located was donated to the Society of Friends in the year 1803, by James Murray of Maryland, who owned a large body of unimproved land in this vicinity at that time. The amount donated to the Friends here was fifteen acres. In 1806 a log building was erected on the land, which was used as a house of worship for some time, when a larger log building was erected, which was occupied until 1828, when the present church building was erected. Among the members of this society were, Nathan Linton, Robert Eachus, Benjamin and Thomas Farquar, Thomas and Henry Babb, Thomas and Joseph Whinnery, Isaac Perkins, James Moon, John, Jacob, Jonathan, and Joseph Haines, William Doan, Nathan Hines, James Oren, Azariah Wall, Marion, Enoch, and Spencer Ballard, Wm. Wickersham, Samuel and Nathan Schooley, Wm. Birdsall. The first interment in Center burying-ground was twin-children by the name of Hodson. The first adult was John Vestal; second, Susannah Haworth.

DOVER MEETING-HOUSE.

About the year 1808 the settlers made request of Center Monthly Meeting for an indulged meeting, which was granted. This meeting was held for some time at the house of Ezekiel Frazier, and from this circumstance was called "Frazier Meeting." After this it was held for a while in a vacant house in the neighborhood. The people now concluded to purchase a lot for a church and burial purposes, and bought one acre and a half of Amos Hodson, for the sum of two dollars and twenty-five cents, upon which the present Dover Meeting-House and burial ground are situated. The first building erected was of round logs, with a clap-board roof. For want of lumber with which to lay a floor, they covered the ground with chips of wood, and the congregation seated themselves on the sleepers.

After some time they procured lumber and made a floor and seats. Their heating apparatus consisted of a stove hearth in the floor, with a stone pillar three or four feet high on each corner of it, and upon these pillars a stick-and-clay chimney was constructed, which carried the smoke away from the fire on the hearth. After a period of about five years a Preparatory Meeting was granted, and was christened "Dover Meeting" by Jesse Dillon.

It was held as a Preparatory Meeting, subject to Center Mouthly Meeting, until 1824, when it was established as a Monthly Meeting. Their first re-

It was held as a Preparatory Meeting, subject to Center Monthly Meeting, until 1824, when it was established as a Monthly Meeting. Their first record commences by stating, That "Dover Monthly Meeting was opened and held the 4th of 9th month, 1824. Gayer and Susannah Starbuck were appointed Clerks. The first item of business of importance transacted by the meeting was the following: 'Dover Monthly Meeting, 11th month 6th, 1824. Zachariah M. Bangham and Elizabeth Johnson laid their intentions of marriage with each other, in writing, before this meeting, and Hannah Shields and Mary Baily are appointed to inquire into the young woman's clearness relative to marriage engagements with other persons. A similar committee was appointed by the men's meeting to inquire into Zachariah's clearness relative to marriage engagements. Reports being favorable, consents of parents given, they were allowed to solemnize their marriage.' The first interment made in the cemetery at Dover was on the 9th of March, 1811; the person buried was Ruth Oren. In many localities throughout the

The first interment made in the cometery at Dover was on the 5th of March, 1811; the person buried was Ruth Oren. In many localities throughout the County, the meetings were held in groves and private houses for many years.

ADAMS TOWNSHIP.

This Township was organized May 1st, 1849, the territory which now composes it formerly belonging to Chester and Vernon Townships. The first election held in the township was held at the shop of John H. Moore, in the village of Sligo, on the 12th of May, 1849.

The settlement of this township began in the year 1804, when Samuel Lee built a log cabin on the land of Isaac Harvey, in the vicinity of Springfield Meeting-house. In the fall of 1805 Archibald Edwards and Peter Dicks settled in the same neighborhood, and built a small cabin. In the fall of 1806, Eli, Isaac, Caleb, and Joshua Harvey, brothers, emigrated with their families from North Carolina, and settled near where Springfield Meeting-house now stands. About the same time Nathan and William Harlan came from North Carolina, and located one mile from Springfield. During the year 1806 John Harlan, with his mother, emigrated from North Carolina to the vicinity of Hillsboro, Highland County, where they remained during the winter of that year, removing in the spring of 1807 to what is now Adams Township, Clinton County, and settled on the land now owned by Milo Hale. The family consisted of a mother and eleven children, eight boys and three girls, only two of whom are now living.

Preserved Dakin emigrated from the State of New York in 1806, and settled in this vicinity, on the land now owned by Edward Davis Dakin purchased 2200 acres of land that now lies within the limits of Chester Township. James Birdsall and Joshua Nickerson, also from New York, settled here about the same time, Birdsall on the land now owned by Harrison Mullen, and Nickerson on the land where Nathan Mullen now lives. David Ferris settled in this township as early as 1805 or '06. Jonathan T. Hadley emigrated from North Carolina to Clinton County in 1810, and settled in Chester (now Adams Township) on the land where he resides; but little improvement has been made in this locality up to this time. Mr. Hadley erected a log cabin which was considered superior to the average dwellings in those days. He married Rebecca Harvey, (daughter of Isaac Harvey), who had settled in the vicinity some years previous. Amos and Daniel Freestone were at this time living on leases taken from James Har-

ris and James Austin, the same land being now owned by Jonathan Hadley and William Stackhouse. Jehu Pyle was born August the 5th, 1766, in Chatham County, North Carolina. About the year 1815 he removed to Washington County, Indiana, and remained there until 1823, when he removed to Clinton County, Ohio, and settled in Adams Township, on the land now owned by William S. Riley. He had a family of six children, viz., William, Sarah, John, Jehu, Mary and Edith, only two of whom came to Ohio with him, and none now living. Jehu settled in Adams Township, on the land now owned by John Pyle's heirs. Jehu Pyle, Sr., died in the year 1846; Jehu, Jr., died in 1859. William died July 20th, 1875, aged 88 years.

In the year 1808 a log school-house was erected on the land of Isaac Harvey, which was the first building erected for this purpose in the township, and in which the first school of the vicinity was taught during the same year by William Holliday. In the year 1809 the Friends of Harvey settlement, as it was called, requested the privilege of holding an indulged meeting, which was granted by Center Monthly Meeting, which was held in the above-named school-house. The first traveling Friend that preached here was Abel Thomas, from Pennsylvania.

In 1812 a small church was erected on the present site of Springfield Meeting-house, and the privilege of holding a Preparatory Meeting was granted the same year. The ground on which the house was built, and also a lot for a grave-yard, was donated by Isaac Harvey. The first death that occurred in this neighborhood, and the first burial in Springfield grave-yard, was the wife of Isaac Harvey, who died March 2d, 1813. In the spring following the wife of Joshua Harvey died, and was buried here. In 1818 the privilege of holding a Monthly Meeting was granted the Society. In 1817 the Friends' Church on Lytle's Creek was built, where the Society continued to worship until 1869, when they purchased a new building, erected by the Methodists, at Ogden, and changed their place of worship to that place. Union Chapel, near the village of Sligo, was erected during the year 1866.

The township contains three churches, viz., two Friends, and one Christian Union. The following names were among the early ministers of Springfield Church, viz., Abel Thomas, Mary Witchell, Ruth Hackett, John Simpson, Hannah Yarnell, Elisha Dawson, Christopher Anthony, Gideon Mullenix, Horton Howard, John Hale, William Williams, Caleb McComber, Mahlon Hockett, Rowland Green, Elizabeth Patterson, Clayton Brown, Daniel Quinby, John Litchworth, Daniel Haviland, Jacob Ong, Aaron Coppick, Nathan Huntley, Rebecca Hubbs, Huldah Seers, Isaac Hammer, Charity Cook, Susannah Hollingsworth.

Among the second pioneers of this vicinity were John Hadly, Jacob Hale, William Harvey, John Holiday, Nathan Mendenhall, John Newlin, Eli and George Madden, Nathaniel and George Carter, David and Jonathan Harlan, Henry and Samuel Andrew. Reuben Green, Thomas Kersey, John Talbot, John Fallis, Isaiah Fallis, Jesse Hiatt, Joseph Stratton, William Osborn, John Johnson, Jonathan Fallis, Mahlon Stratton, Samuel Harvey, Thomas Rich, John Sheridan, Samuel Chew, Adam Reynard, Isaac Stout. Ogden, on the C. & M. V. R. R., and Sligo, on the Clarksville and Wilmington Turnpike, are small villages in this township. The township contains thirteen thousand eight hundred acres of land, valued at four hundred and eighty-five thousand six hundred and ninety-seven dollars. Chattel property to the amount of one hundred and sixty-eight thousand six hundred and seventeen dollars, making a total value of \$654,314. The township has an enumeration of \$23 school children, and a voting population numbering two hundred and eleven.

CHESTER TOWNSHIP.

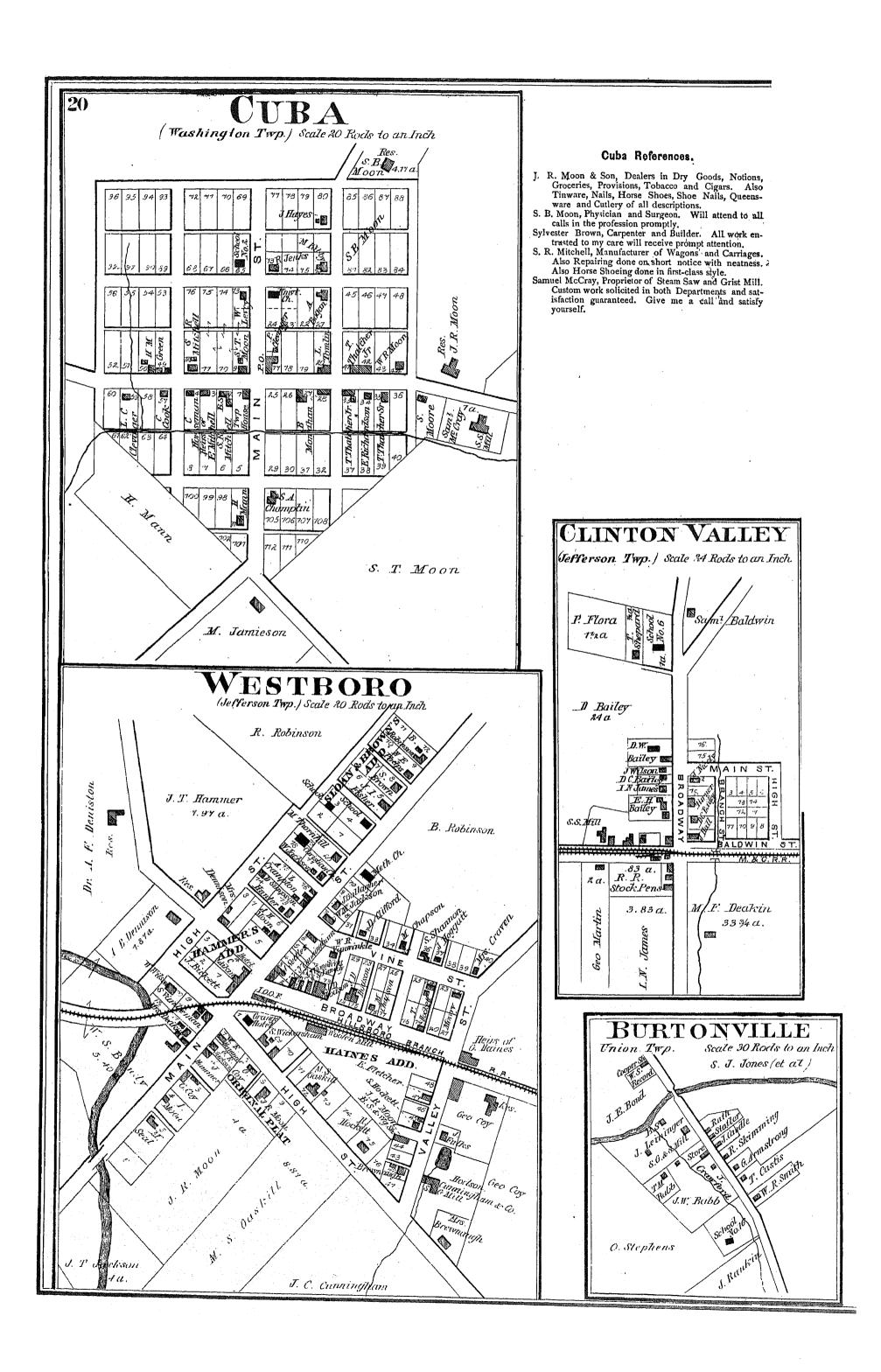
This Township, situated in the north-western part, is one of the original Townships of Clinton County. James Hawkins was born in London County, Virginia, during the year 1756. When arriving at manhood, he left his native State, and located in South Carolina, where he remained until the spring of 1806, when he emigrated to Warren County, Ohio, and in the fall of the same year removed to Chester Township, (then a part of Warren County), and settled on the land now owned by his son, Amos Hawkins. Mr. Hawkins was married while in South Carolina, to Sarah Wilson, who was born in Union County, in that State, on the 19th of May, 1773. They had a family of five children, two of whom are now living near Indianapolis, Ind. Clark and Artemus Nickerson were at this time living in the Township; they having emigrated from the State of New York to this neighborhood in the year 1804. Amos Hawkins, Sr., was born in Union District, South Carolina, in the year 1772. In 1807 he removed to Warren County, Ohio, and on the third day of June, located in Chester Township, on the land now owned by his son, Henry Hawkins, he purchasing ninety-nine acres of land, for which he paid \$2.50 per acre. The first winter Mr. Hawkins spent here, he "camped out," or, having no means of erecting a dwelling, he erected a rude structure, from the branches and bark of trees, in which he spent the winter.

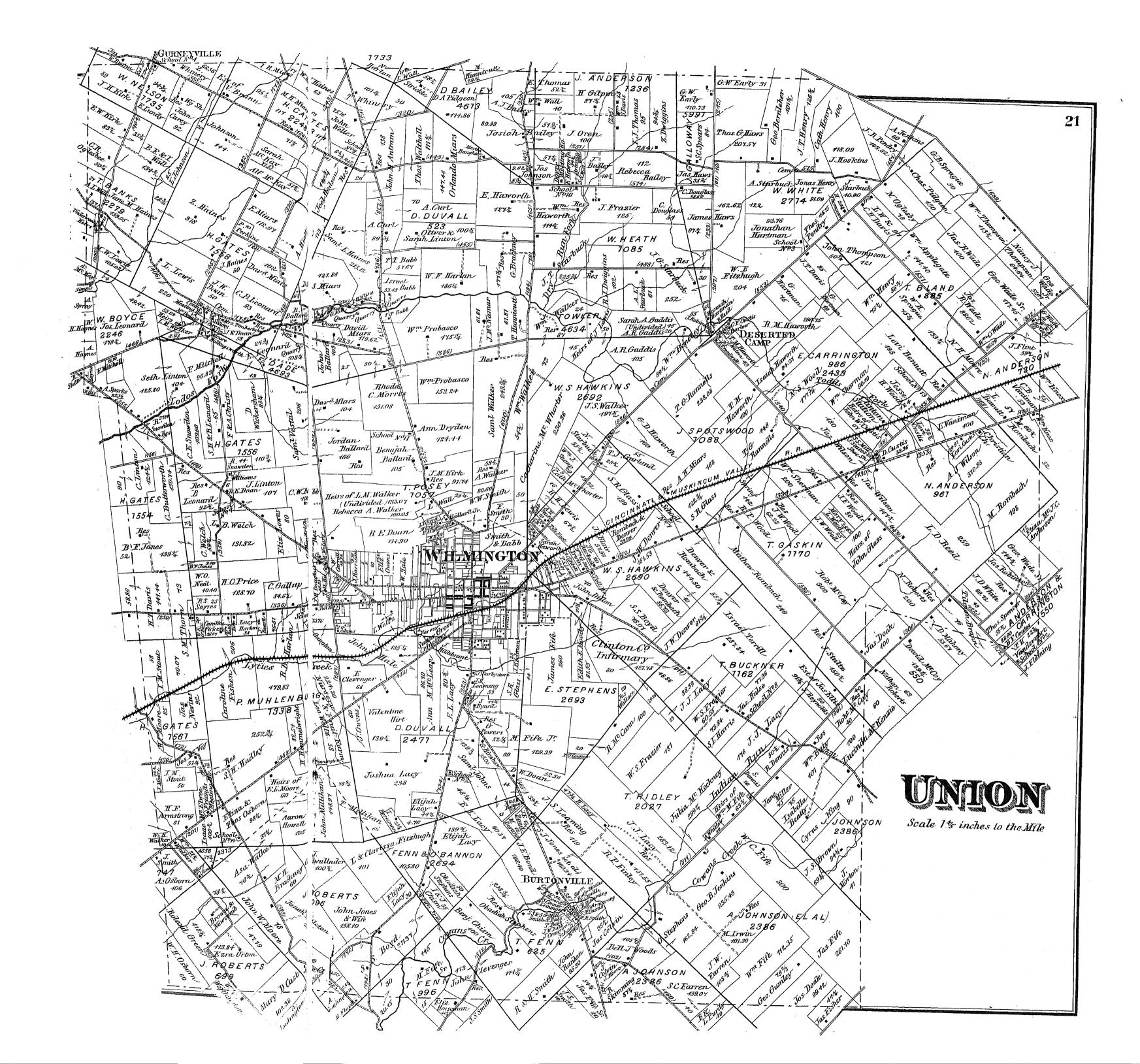

There were living within the limits of Chester Township at this time,
David Whitson, Henry Millhouse, Mordecai Spray, George Arnold, Robert
Millhouse, Thomas Lewis and John Furnace, all of whom were from South
Carolina, and who settled in the Township during the years 1805-6.

Joel and William Sanders from the State of Georgia, settled here about

the same time. William Bailey was born the 30th day of October, 1781, in Amelia County, Virginia, and removed to Ohio at an early day, and settled in Chester Township prior to the year 1810. Samuel Spray, was born in the State of Pennsylvania, in the year 1758. When but a child he some years he removed to South Carolina, where he remained a short time and from there to Warren County, O., near Waynesville, where he remained three years, and finally settled on Cæsar Creek, in 1806. Mr. Spray owned a tract of one thousand acres of land, the largest portion of which Webb's Survey, in Warren County. Eli Haines now owns the land where Samuel Spray settled. He brought with him a family of six children when he came to Ohio: four boys and two girls, only two of whom are now living, viz.: James Spray, aged 82 years, now living near Waynesville, and Jesse Spray, aged 75 years, now living near New Burlington, in this Township Jonathan McMillan emigrated to Ohio, from York County, Pennsylvania, in 1806, and settled in Chester Township, on the land now owned by his son, Newton McMillan. David McMillan, a brother of Jonathan's, had settled in the neighborhood one year previous to Jonathan's coming. After remaining a few months, Jonathan returned to Pennsylvania, and brought out his father's family, which consisted of the father, and two sisters. The came by wagon to Pittsburgh, and from there to Cincinnati, in a flat boat, the father dying in a few weeks after their arrival here. Thomas, William, and Henry, brothers of Jonathan and David, came some years afterward, and settled in this same neighborhood. When Jonathan and David came there were living in the vicinity, James Moon, a native of North Carolina, who had located on the land now owned by Zimri Haines. Jacob Haines, a brother-in law of Moon's, on the land now owned by his sons, Joshua and Zimri, Isaac Perkins from North Carolina, John Stout, John Odell. Layton Jay, Robert Reese, all of whom had settled in this locality in 1804-





5. The first school taught in this neighborhood, was taught in the house of Jonathan McMillan, in 1809, by Margaret Foulke, who afterwards married George Hatton, a minister in the Friends Church. The first school house built in this vicinity, was built on the land now owned by John Hawkins, about the year 1810.

John Coulter, Sr., was born in Ireland, in the year 1778. While a young man, he was enlisted a soldier in the British army, and during an interval of release from military duty, he came to the United States in 1805, and was one of the pioneers of Clinton County, of which he was a citizen forty

years. He died February 13th, 1853.

Daniel Collett, was a native of the State of Virginia, from whence he emigrated in the year 1811, and purchased a large amount of land in Clinton County. During the next year, (1812), Aaron, a son of Daniel, came to Ohio from Virginia, and first settled near Claysville, on the Miami, until he might improve the land given him by his father, in Chester Township In 1814, he removed to his farm in this Township, where he spent nearly forty years of his life, an industrious and enterprising citizen, and an eminent member of the M. E. Church. He died in the month of January, 1854, aged 65 years. John Wall, a native of York County, Penna, was among the early settlers of this Township. He settled here in the year

1811. Died January 8th, 1857, aged 70 years.

Judge James Dakin, a prominent settler of this Township, emigrated from the State of New York as early as the year 1810. Clinton County is ndebted to Judge Dakin for his exertions in the organization of the County

indebted to Judge Dakin for his exertions in the organization of the County. He died February 13th, 1857, aged 65 years.

Isaac Collett, a native of Jefferson County, Virginia, emigrated to Chester Township, in 1824. He had been engaged for a number of years, prior to his coming to Clinton County, in publishing a newspaper in his native State. He was for a number of years Justice of the peace, and at one time Judge of the Court of Common Pleas in Clinton County. The first Church organization in Chester Township, was that of the Friends, on Casar Creek. The church was organized, and a small log building erected in 1805, with the following named persons with their families, from Chester Township, comprising a part of the membership, viz.: James and Amos Hawkins, David prising a part of the membership, viz.: James and Amos Hawkins, David Whitson, Henry and Robert Millhouse, Mordecai Spray, George Arnold, Thomas Lewis, John Furnace, Joel and William Sanders. In 1807, a larger log building was erected, which served the Society until 1849, when it was replaced by the present frame building, now standing on the site of the old one. The first building erected was also used for school purposes the first school being taught in it by Samuel Whitson. In 1808, a school-house was erected on the land of Robert Millhouse, (the land now owned by Margaret Colvin). The "Bullskin" state road was the first regularly laid out road in the Township—laid out in 1807. Chester Township contains twenty thousand one hundred and twenty-three acres of land, valued at seven hundred and seventeen thousand three hundred and ninety-six dollars; chattel property valued at two hundred and eighty-three thousand four hundred and eighty-two dollars; making a total value of one million seventeen thousand one hundred and fifty-nine dollars. An enumeration of three hundred and twenty-eight school children, and a voting population of three hundred and thirteen

NEW BURLINGTON.

This village was laid out about the year 1830, Alexander Jay being the original owner of the land upon which the village is located. G. B. Haws was the first person engaged in any kind of business in the village, he being engaged in selling dry goods, as early as 1830 or 31. His house was the first building erected in the village. Mr. H. was followed in the same business by John Grant, in the spring of the year 1833, who still continues his business. In 1833 the first school was taught in the village, by Sarah Hollingsworth, in a log building, in what is now the south part of the town. Asa Fisher, a wagon maker, was the third extler in the village. Asa Fisher, a wagon maker, was the third settler in the village. In 1833, the M. E. church was organized, and for a period of two years, meetings were held at private houses. In 1835, a frame church was erected, which was replaced in 1874 by the present frame building. In 1839 the Post Office was established. In 1844 the Wesleyan Methodists erected a frame church, which was, on account of the society becoming reduced, sold to the

The village now contains two dry good stores, one grocery, one mill, two churches, one school, two blacksmith and one wagon shop, one tannery, two physicians. The village has connection with Spring Valley and Wilmington by mail. Population 275. Value of real estate \$16,281.

CLARK TOWNSHIP.

THIS Township was organized July 14th, 1817, out of territory taken Trownship was organized July 14th, 1817, out of territory taken from Greene and Vernon Townships; surveyed by Nathan Linton. This Township lies in the southern part of the County. The northern part of the Township is watered by the "East Fork" of "Todd's Fork," while the south-eastern part of the Township is watered by the "East Fork" of the Little Miami River. The Cincinnati and Marietta Railroad, and the Hillsboro branch of the same, both pass through this Township. The soil is

generally good, and produces excellent crops of grain, grasses, etc.

John Wright emigrated from South Carolina, and settled in what is now Clark Township, Clinton County, O., in 1806, on a part of the land now within the corporation of the village of Martinsville. Mr. Wright raised a family of eight children, two of whom are yet living, viz.: James and Sameson. When Weight came here there was living in the vicinity. When Wright came here, there was living in the vicinity, Thomas Johns, who is supposed to have been the first settler within the present limits of the Township. The nativity of Johns, and date of settlement in this neighborhood is not known. The first religious meeti in the neighborhood, were held at the house of James Wright.

Samuel Moon emigrated from "East Tennessee," in the year 1809. During the year 1808, and spring of 1809, the Moon family, numbering forty-three in all, including the family of Samuel's father, came to this Township, and settled east of the present village of Martinsville. At this time, there were living in the Township, Isaac Miller, Thomas Johns, Samuel McCulloch, Isaac Vanmeter, John Jones, John Wright. Joseph Moon, the father of Samuel, died during the year 1834, at the age of 84 years. Samuel Moon died during the year 1846, aged 65 years. Of the original number (45) there are nine still living, five of whom are in Clinton County, viz.: Thomas, William and Henry, Joseph R. Moon,

The first church organization was that of the Friends, at "Newburry." and the first school in the Township, was taught in the building erected here, by Jonas Wright, from South Carolina. There are now six churches in the Township, viz: two M. E., one M. P., one Friends, and one Universalist. Clark Township contains 23,058 acres of land, valued at versanst. Clark Township contains 25,008 acres of fand, varied at \$676,682, with real estate in villages valued at \$25,107, chattel property to the amount of \$303,909, making a total value of 1,005,698. A voting population of 415, number of youth enumerated, (including Martinsville separate school district, 163) 578.

MARTINSVILLE

Was laid out in the year by _____ ---. It is located in the north-western part of the Township, on the "Cincinnati and Marietta Railroad," and eleven miles from Wilmington.

Lewis Garrett and Robert Grant were the first men of business in the village, they being engaged in merchandizing, and who having failed, after a short period of time, were followed by John Wright in the same business. The town now contains seven stores, nine shops, one saw and grist mill, one hotel, a graded school, one livery stable, two churches, two physicians. The M. E. Church was erected in 1874

The village contains real estate valued at \$25,107.

FARMER'S STATION. On the C. and M. R. R., two miles east of Martinsville, is a small village this Township.

GREEN TOWNSHIP.

This township lies in the south-eastern part of Clinton County. Cowan's creek and the "east fork of the Little Miami" have their sources in this township The surface is "rolling," and the soil very fertile, making the township one of the most desirable for agricultural purposes in the County. Stephen Hussey, with his son Joshua, emigrated from Randolph County, North Carolina, to Highland (now Clinton) County, Ohio, and settled in Fairfield (now Green Township), in the year 1807. Stephen purchased one hundred, and Joshua four hundred acres of land in Survey No. 1078. Joshua brought with him three children, viz.: Thomas, Stephen, and Drusilla; William, Nathan and Sarah were born after coming to this State.

Stephen Hussey died in the spring of 1812, and the land he had previously purchased became the property of his son Joshua, who afterward (1824) divided the 500 acres between his four sons. Thomas took his share the southwest corner of the Survey, and erected a house in the place of he log cabin built by his grandfather, and on this land he laid out the town

of New Vienna in the year 1827.

Micajah Nordycke and his three sons, viz.: Micajah, Elias and Henry, migrated from Lost Creek, Tennessee, and settled in this township. Mica-ah, Sr., bought a tract of three hundred acres of land, and settled on the nd now owned by John Malone, in Abraham Buford's Survey, for which he paid \$2.50 per acre. Mr. Nordycke donated three acres of his land to the Friends, who built a log church upon it in 1808, the same being the first church erected in the township. This organization, consisting of nineteen members, has since increased to 180 members, the place of meeting being now at New Vienna. The old church lot has been converted into a cemetery. When Mr. Nordycke settled here, the whole country was almost a wilderness; bears and wolves were numerous, and often caused trouble with the domestic animals. The settlers lived so far apart that it was necessary at times to go six or eight miles in order to get help at the "log rollings," or raising of buildings. Micajah Nordycke had a family of twelve children in all, and lived to see them all married and settled around him, his offspring at the time of his death numbering eighty persons.

Among the early settlers in the southern part of the Township were Joseph Anthony, from Virginia, on the land now occupied by Henry Nordycke; Abner Van Meter and Samuel Clevenger, on the land now owned by Isaac Posegate. Morgan Van Meter, a native of Morgantown, Virginia, settled in the vicinity of Snow Hill in the year 1800, on the land now owned by Z. Spears. Van Meter's purchase was 200 acres of land, on which he erected a double log cabin, the first of the kind in the Township.

He died in a few years after settlement in this place.

Charles Harris was the next settler in this neighborhood. He was born

in Worcoster County, Maryland, in the year 1775. In 1804 he emigrated to Campbell County, Ky, and settled on the Licking river, where he remained one year, when he removed to Brush Creek, Adams County, Ohio, and remained there another year, at the expiration of which he moved to Highland (now Clinton) County, and purchased one hundred acres of land of Judge Pope, for which he paid \$3 per acre. J. Dakey now owns the land where Mr. Harris settled. Mr. Harris had a family of eight children, only where Mr. Harris settled. Mr. Harris had a lamily of eight enforce, only one of whom (Elisha) are now living. Following Harris were William Noble, from Adams County, Ohio; Israel Nordycke, from North Carolina, who settled on the land now owned by Elisha Harris; Thomas Cox, from North Carolina, who settled on the land now owned by Mrs. Hildebrant.

Thomas Thatcher was born August 23, 1774, in Frederick County, Va. His father died while he was quite young. At the age of seven years he was bound out to David Lupton, with whom he remained until he became of age. After remaining in his native State for several years after arriving at manhood, during which time he was married, he emigrated to Ohio, and settled in Greene County in 1805. In 1807 he removed to what is now Clinton County, where he purchased a tract of 1,000 acres of land in what Clinton County, where he purchased a tract of 1,000 acres of land in what is now Clark Township. Unfortunately his purchase proved to be a "bogus" one, and he was compelled to re-purchase it of the real owner, after having paid a part of the first purchase money. Mr. Thatcher raised a family of ten children, four boys and six girls, six of whom are now living, two of whom are living in the State of Illinois, the others in Clinton County. He was a member of the Society of Friends until the troubles of 1812, when they disowned him on account of his political views. He died January 25, 1867, aged 92 years.

George Hoskins, a native of North Carolina, settled in this Township in 812. He died March 28, 1867, aged 80 years.

Adam Beaver, a native of New Jersey, was born 1778, and removed to

Clinton County in 1818. Among other early settlers in the northern part of the Township were

Paul Hulse, William Polk, Jonah Vandervert and Samuel Harvey.

The first school-house in Green Township was a log house, erected on the land now owned by Henry Swingley. The first school taught in it was ught by an Iris There are five churches in the Township (not including New Vienna), viz.: one M. E., one Buptist, one Friends, one Christian, and one Universalist. Green Township has a school enumeration of 912, a voting population of 620, and a taxable valuation of \$1,597,412.

NEW VIENNA.

Tiris town, second to Wilmington in size, is located in the south eastern part of Green Township, on the Marietta and Cincinnati Railroad, was laid out in the year 1827 by Thomas Hussey. William Reese and Stephen Hussey were the first men of business in the town, they being engaged in merchandizing. Jonathan Haworth and Thomas Reese started a carding machine the same year, and about the same time Joshua Hussey and his son Thomas erected a tread mill for grinding corn. During a space of four or five years, Zion Rains had started an oil mill, John Spears a blacksmith shop, Ralph Mortimer a tan-yard, while in the meantime Reese and Hussey had sold their store to Thomas Hussey and Henry Kennedy. The first school-house was a log building near the site of the present school building. Mr. A. S. Amberg is one of the oldest business men of the town, having been engaged in the dry goods business for a number of years. The town contains one large flour and saw mill, six dry goods stores, two drug stores, four groceries, two boot and shoe stores, two harness shops, two carriage shops, agricultural store, chair shop, sash factory, lumber yard, two livery stables, several blacksmith shops, three merchant tailors, two hotels, one graded school, one publishing house, four physicians, four churches, viz.: M. E., Friends, Christian and Baptist. New Vienna has communication with Wilmington by a hack, making tri-weekly trips. The taxable valuation of the town is \$94,846,

NEW ANTIOCH.

A SMALL village, situated about half-way between New Vienna and Wilmington, containing a church, school, two stores, and several shops, post-office, and about one hundred inhabitants.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF E. HARRIS.--My father, Charles Harris, came from Maryland, and settled half mile east of Vanmater's on the Col. lege Tp. Road, in the year 1806, which was cut out in 1800. I was born in a cabin in the woods, in the year 1808. My father bought the woods where Snow Hill is in the year 1822, where he moved during the same year, and where I have lived ever since. There were plenty of deer, turkeys, Indians and wolves here at that time, all have disappeared, and railroads, telegraphs and crusades have taken their places. My father commenced keeping tavern one mile east of Snow Hill in the year 1808, until he moved to Snow Hill, where he kept hotel until the year 1836. I then bought him out, and have been keeping tavern ever since, which now makes sixty-eight years of hotel life

JEFFERSON TOWNSHIP

This township, lying in the southern part of Clinton County, was organized by an act of the Commissioners March 5, 1839, from territory belonging to Clark and Marion townships. The surveying of the township was executed by Peyton West, with John Smith and James West, chain carriers, and David Wright, marker.

The first election held in the Township was held on the first Monday in April, 1839, at the house of William Sinclair, in the village of Westboro, William Hammer emigrated from the State of Tennessee, in the year 1808, and settled near Hillsboro, Highland County, Ohio. In the year 1819 he removed to Clinton County, and located in Vernon (now Jefferson) township, and settled on the East Fork of the Little Miami river, on the land now owned by John Simeox. There were living within the limits of the township at that time John Thornhill and William Starr, near the present site of Westboro. Soon after Samuel Jackson settled in the vicinity, on the land now owned by John Holliday.

Joseph Hockett, a native of North Carolina, from which State he

removed to Tennessee, and from there to Highland County, Ohio, in 1804, In 1817 he removed to Clinton County, and settled on the East Fork of the Little Miami, in what is now Jefferson Township. He had a family of seven children when he came to Clinton County, four of whom are still living, Jesse Hockett being the only one now living in Clinton County, and who is now in his 74th year.

Nathan Hoggatt, from Tennessee, settled in the township in 1830, on the Nathan Hoggatt, from Tennessee, settled in the township in 1850, on the land where he now lives. The first church organization in the Township was the West Fork Friends' Church, organized in 1826. The Township has a school enumeration of 470, voting population of 202, and a taxable

Elisha Hammer opened the first store in the place, at the beginning of the year 1839. Samuel Clark was the next man of business, he having a drug store. CLINTON VALLEY.

A STATION on the C. & M. R. R., is a small village, containing two stores, a mill, a few shops, &c.

LIBERTY TOWNSHIP.

Trus township lies in the northern part of Clinton County, bordering on Greene county. Anderson's Fork of Cesar's creek flows through the entire length of the township cast and west. The surface is rolling, and the soil good, producing all kinds of grain in abundance.

William Hoblitt was born in Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania, on

the 19th of March, 1783. From Pennsylvania he went to Woodford County, Ky., in the year 1800. In 1806 he came to Clinton County, and for some time made his home with Timothy Bennett, a brother-law. On the 30th of March, 1809, Mr. Hoblitt was married to Margaret Shields. In 1812 he was drafted into the army, but was unable to go, so he procured a substitute. During the same year he purchased 150 acres of land on Anderson's Fork of Cesar's creek, in what is now known as Liberty township—the land now owned by his son. Jesse Hoblitt. Mr. Hoblitt had a family of twelve children, four boys and eight girls, all of whom are now living; the youngest (Joshua C. Hoblitt) is a Baptist preacher, living in Minnesota. William Hoblitt died in the year 1871, at his home in Liberty township. John Johnson, a native of Virginia, settled in this township in the year 1810, on the land now owned by Silas Mathews. About the same time Zachariah Moreman came from Virginia and settled on the land now owned by Joshua Brown, and others. Micajah Johnson came to Ohio in 1813, and lived for a short time in a log cabin in Greene County. In March, 1815, he moved on to Charles Clifton's land, in Highland County, County, Ky., in the year 1800. In 1806 he came to Clinton County, and for March, 1815, he moved on to Charles Clifton's land, in Highland County, where he remained until the spring of 1816, when he removed to the "English" house, ready-built, to take a lease, but failing to complete the contract, he in the fall of the same year moved to Thomas Bennett's farm, near New Lexington, where he remained until 1819, then moving to the land of Daniel McPherson, raised one crop and gave In the fall of 1821 he went back to Greene County and spent the winter near Jamestown. In 1823 he removed to Clinton County and lived in an old school-house, near Port William, in Liberty township, until 1832, when he removed to Indiana.

Among the early settlers of this township were Samuel Miller, Joseph Copeland, David Shields, and Benjamin Bangham. Joseph Copeland was a native of one of the Carolinas; Benjamin Shields, a native of Tennessee. Among the settlers of a more recent date were Ashley Johnson, from one of the Carolinas, John Johnson, Peter Ogan, and Peter Stevens, Sr. Daniel, Solomon, and Anthony Early emigrated from Adams County, Ohio, to this township in 1833. The first religious organization in the township was that of the Baptists, one mile southeast of Port William, on Anderson's Fork. Previous to the erection of a church services were held at private houses, such as William Hoblitt's, Jesse Hughes', and others. The next church organization in the township was that of the Methodists, who erected a church north of Port William in 1829. Among the members of this organization were Philip Wickle and wife, Peter Ogan, and Philip Rumbough. The place of worship was changed and a new building erected in Port William in 1843. Liberty township contains 15,460 acres of land, and a taxable valuation of \$806,096; a school enumeration of 300, and a voting population of 275. Port William was laid out in the year 1825, Among the early business men of the village were Samuel Johnson, tanner; a Mr. Unthank, miller; Garland Johnson, merchant; Addison Mills grocer; Anson Massie, saddler. Other early settlers in the vicinity not before mentioned were Samuel Mowman, Baker Grimes, Samuel Ferguson, Marshall Jenkins, William Higgins, William Irwin, Peter Bowermaster, Christopher Ellis, J. S. Hoblitt, and Jonathan Perkins.

MARION TOWNSHIP

THIS township, lying in the southwest corner of Clinton County, was organized by an Act of the County Commissioners, August 5th, 1830. The first election held in the township was held at the house of Tobias Benard, on the 4th of September, 1830. The surface of the township is mostly level, and the soil variable. Stonelick and Second creeks, both of which

are small streams, have their sources in this township.

Jonathan Baldwin was born in Uniontown, Pa., November 30th, 1784.
In 1792 his father, Benj. Baldwin, removed to Monongahela County, Va., where he resided until the year 1804, when he emigrated to Ohio and settled in Guernsey County, where he remained two years and then removed to Warren County, near the town of Morrow (where he worked by the month until 1811). In 1811 he was married to Harriet Blancet, and in the same year he removed to the old Sawyer farm, near the village of Springborough. In 1812 he enlisted in the army, and served during the campaign of that year, after which he returned to his home, near Spring Lorough, where he remained until 1814, when he removed to Marion (then Vernon) township, and settled on a tract of land consisting of 130 acres, on Second creek, which he had previously purchased of Gen. Lytle; the land now owned by Thos. B. Baldwin. Mr. Baldwin was married twice during his life, and raised a family of sixteen children. He is supposed to have been the first settler within the limits of Marion township, his nearest neighbor at the time of his locating here being in Warren County, and four miles distant. Galvin Morrison, from Pennsylvania, was the next settler (1815) in the township. Mr. Morrison located on Second creek, on the land now owned by Jonathan Jerald. He was followed by Elisha Whitaere, who settled on the land now included in part in the town of Blanchester. Recompense Stanbury, from New Jersey; Hiram Anderson, Wm. Siston, and Edward Crossen were early settlers in this vicinity. Jeremiah Rowan is also an old resident of this township. He was born in York County, Pennsylvania, on the 19th of June, 1784. In 1802, at the age of 18, he came with his father to Ohio, landing above Cincinnati at the present site or Columbia. He lived for nearly twenty years near the town of Montgomery, Hamilton County, from which place he came to Clinton County and settled on a farm in Marion township, and was for a number of years Justice of the Peace in this township. John B. Gustin, from Whiteley County, Pa., settled in the township during the year 1836, on the land now in the possession of Harvey Smith and others. John Cooper was born in Bucks County, Pa., n the year 1776. About the beginning of the year 1802 he emigrated to Highland County, Ohio. In 1803 he was married to Rachel Moore, and in 827 he removed to Marion township and settled one-and-a-half miles east of Blanchester, where he remained until his death (1832). His wife still survives him, she having reached the advanced age of 90 years, being the oldest person now living in the township.

The first church built in the township was the M. E. Church, on Lick-Run. built on the land of John Salsbury, in 1842. This denomination as an organization has since become extinct in the township; the old church has been taken down, and the land where it stood is now owned by John M. Wright. The first school in the township was taught in a log-house near the present town of Blanchester, by James Cochran, a soldier in the "Revolution." Marion township contains 15,819 acres of land, valued at \$382,002;

value of real estate in villages, \$75,532; value of chattel property \$263,396; making a total value of \$720,930. A population of 1,60 inhabitants; a school enumeration (including Blanchester, 232,) of 564, and a voting population of three hundred and thirty.

Blanchester was laid out in the year —, by ————. The town is situated in the southwest corner of Marion township, on the Cincinnati and Marietta R. R, at the Junction of the Hillsboro' branch with the C. and M. R. R. Joseph Blancet was the first to engage in business in the village, he being engaged in merchandizing. His place of business was in a hewed log house, on the present site of John Simonton & Son's harness shop. Mr. Blancet was followed in the mercantile business by Isaac Frasee and Wm. H. Baldwin. Frasee's store was built of logs, and stood on the site of Moon & Strawn's drug store. Baldwin's location was out of the present corporation, on the north of the town, the land now owned by the Baldwin heirs. William Bundy was the first blacksmith having a log shop on the lot now owned by James Gustin. Bryant Trickey was the first wagon maker. He operated in a log shop on the lot where John Simonton's livery stable now stands. Milford Cusick, from Warren County, was the first physician to locate in the village. Gustavus Greely taught the first school in a log house built on the hill south-east of the town. Baptist Church built 1844; Universalist, 1852; Catholic, 1874. The town contains a hotel, livery stable, several stores, a graded school, and quite a number of shops of various kinds—population 700.

RICHLAND TOWNSHIP

This Township is one of the three Townships of which the County was composed at its organization in 1810. It lies in the north-east part of the County, bordering on Fayette and Greene Counties. Anderson's Fork of Cesar's Creek, flows through the west part of the Township, while Wilson's branch, Bentley's Fork, and Grasse branch of Rattlesnake Creek, flow through the north and eastern part. The soil is mostly fertile, and well adapted to cultivation, producing excellent crops of all kinds of grain. The original Township embraced the territory now within the limits of Richland, Wayne, Wilson, and part of Union Township. Thomas Hardwick and sons, Charles and William, with his son-in-law James Palmer and John Nelson, from Tennessee and Kentucky, made the first settlement in what is now Richland Township, in the year 1808. This settlement was made in the vicinity of the present village of Reeseville, on the land now ment are now living within the limits of Clinton County.

This settlement was followed by that of Elisha Doan, and David Osborn, cast of Sabina, about 1809 or 1810. Doan was a native of North Carolina; the land where he located is now owned by Smith and McClintock. Osborn settled on the land now owned by McElwain's heirs. None of the families t Doan or Osborn are now living in the Township. In a short time after the last named settlement, a man by the name of Mills located on the land now belonging to Smith & McClintock. Of his nativity, or what became of him or his family, nothing is now known. Richard Thornburgh, from Tennessee, was the next settler in this neighborhood. Lewis Arnold, from , came here at an early day, and located on the land owned by Smith & McClintock. Among the early settlers in this immediate neighborhood, were Francis Wining, Michael Myers, and his son Henry. James Gallaher was born in Monmouth County, New Jersey, on the site of the battle-ground at Monmouth, in the year 1764 He had two brothers who took a part in the battle fought there. In 1785, he emigrated to Allegheny County, Pa., where he remained twelve years, at the expiration of which time, he removed to Ohio, and settled in what is now Hamilton County. Remaining there two years, he removed to what is now Warren County, an settled near the present site of Lebanon. While living here he assisted in building the first house that was erected in the village of Lebanon. In 1814, he removed to Richland Township, Clinton County, where he remained until his death. Mr. Gallaher had a family of six girls and two boys, three of whom are now living, viz,: Charles P. Gallaher (near

Sabina), aged 75 years, and his two sisters, Nancy Sabina, and Lucinda

Gallaher, who now reside in Wilmington.

James Douglass, was born in York County, Penna, Oct. 8th, 1769, and was the cighth child of a family of ten, four boys and six girls. He was the son of William Douglass, who was born in Ireland, and emigrated to America when a youth; married and raised his family in York County, Pa The Douglass family originally came from Scotland, and are there traced back several centuries, where the name is recorded among the chivalry of the land, including some notable chiefs. James Douglass married Mary Taylor, of York County, Pa., October 27th, 1795, and moved to Columbiana County, Ohio, in 1801, having but one child at that time, and remained there until the close of the war 1812, then moved down the river to Cincinnati, in the fall of 1814, staid one year in Warren County, Ohio, then removed to Clinton County, in April, 1816, and settled on "Hinkson's Prairie," Anderson's Fork, and remained there until his death, August 21st, 1835, aged nearly 66 years; the wife died in November, 1854, having nine children, only two of whom are now living, (Thompson, and Steel Douglass). John Jacks was born in Union District, S. C., August 27th, 1777; was married to Phœbe Halierts, and emigrated to Ohio in 1807, and settled near Waynesville in Warren Caunty, where he remained one mained there until the close of the war 1812, then moved down the river and settled near Waynesville, in Warren County, where he remained one year, and in 1808, removed to Clinton County, locating on Cowan's Creek, three miles south of Wilmington, and lived there untill 1819, when he moved to Richland Township, and settled on the "McClintock" farm, two miles north of Sabina, where he remained until the fall of 1837. He died in Grant County Indiana March 1001, 1860. in Grant County, Indiana, March 19th, 1860. Mr. Jacks held various offices in Richland Township, served in the war of 1812, under Colonel Cox and General Harrison. In 1827 he erected a "horse mill" on his place, which proved a great benefit to the settle s, they coming for many miles to have grinding done. He raised a family of nine children, seven of whom are still living. William, his oldest child, was born September 3d, 1803, in Union District, S. C. He remembers distinctly, when his parents came to what is now Clinton County, and attended the first sale of town lots in Wilmington. He was married July 181, 1824, to Phebe Burris, daughter of William Burris, Sr. He says, "When we came to Richland

raised a family of nine children, and have seen them all married and settled but one, who still resides with her parents. Thomas N Adams, of Reesville, was born in Sussex County, Delaware, in the month of September, 1771. He had two half brothers who served in the colonial army during the war of 1812. In 1805, he came with his parents to Ohio, and settled in Ross County near Chillicothe, where he resided until the year 1812. In the war of 1812, he served as a soldier in Captain the year 1812. In the war of 1812, he served as a soldier in Captain Harvey's company, belonging to Colonel Clark's regiment. In 1817 he was married, and removed to Richland Township. Clinton County, near the present town of Sabina. His father, Thomas N. Adams, died in 1827, in Wayne Township, at the age of 106 years. His mother died at the age of 82. Thomas N. Adams, Jr., died in Richland Township, during the summer of 1875, aged 103 years. Was laid out in the year 1831, by Warren Sabin. Andrew Love was the first man of business in the village, his business being that of tavernkeeper; he was also the first post-master in the village. William McMillan and Warren Sabin were partners in the first store opened in the village, McMillan having the oversight of it. John L. Perkins succeeded Loye as tavern-keeper and post-master. In 1834 the first school was taught in the villags, by Cornelia Williamson. In 1845 the first church ("Christian,") was erected. The M. P. and M. E. churches were erected in 1862. The town now contains five dry goods stores, five groceries, one hardware, and three drug stores, two harness shops, two banks, one carriage and one wagon shop, two blacksmith shops, one clothing store, one hotel, two milliner stores one livery-stable, tailor shop. gunsmith, four physicians, one newspaper, Masonic, I. O. O. F. and Good Templar lodges, and one graded school population 800, taxable valuation \$53.081.

The Sabina Union Agricultural Society was organized in the year 1874. The grounds are pleasantly located on the Washington turnpike, adjoining the village.
The C. & M. V. R. R., passes through the town.

REESVILLE.

A small village, located in the Western part of the Township, on the Cincinnati and Muskingum Valley Railroad, was laid out in the year ---, by _____ The village contains a church, school, three stores post-office, two blacksmith shops, and has a population of about 100 inhabitants, a taxable valuation of \$13,306.

Richland Township contains 21.197 acres of land, valued at \$713.868. Value of real estate in villages, \$66,387; Chattel property, \$346,643, with a total value of \$1,126,898; a school enumeration, including Sabina, (273) of 763, voting population, 479.

UNION TOWNSHIP.

Union Township was organized by an act of the Commissioners, August 21st 1813. The western part of the Township, including the town of Wilmington, was originally a part of Chester, and the eastern part, originally a part of Richland Township. Todd's Fork, Lytle and Cowan's Creek, the tributaries to the Little Miami pass through this Township. The surface of land is rolling, sufficiently to give it draining, and the soil for the most part fertile. It is supposed that the first settler within the limits of Union Township, was Timothy Bennett. Mr. Bennett was a native of the State of New Jersey, born January 27th, 1765. Upon his arrival at manhood, he left the State of New Jersey and went to Westmoreland County, Penna.. and here, at the age of twenty-four years, he was married to Elizabeth Hoblitt, a lady of German descent. In 1789 he emigrated to the State of Kentucky, and settled in Woodford County, near the present town of Versailles. In 1799, he purhased a tract of land consisting of two hundred acres, in the Virginia Military District, survey No. 2,000. In the year 1800, he left Kentucky, and emigrated to Ohio, with a family consisting of wife and six children. On his route, he came via Cincinnati, at that time a small village containing but few inhabitants. He proceeded to Montgomery County, Ohio, where he found a small settlement, made by some of his friends, who had preceded him. He remained here one year during which time he raised a group of corn, and by the aid of others had succeeded in finding his land he had previously purchased, and which was located near Todd's Fork, about one and a half miles north-east of Wilmington, in Union Township. During the

winter of 1801, he erected a cabin upon this land, and in the spring of the same year moved his family to it, where he resided until his death, which occurred some time during the year 1827.

Nathan Hines was born in Sussex County, Delaware, in the year 1770. While he was yet a young man he removed to North Carolina, and located in Guilford County, where he remained until the year 1803, when he removed to Ohio, and settled in what is now Clinton County. Here he purchased a tract of land in the woods, built him a cabin, and began the opening of a farm, on which he resided until his death in 1858. Mr. Hines was one of the first settlers in Union Township.

George Haworth was born in Bucks County, Pennsylvania, in the year 1748, and at an early day left his native State and went to Frederick County, Virginia. Remaining there but a few years, during which time he was married, he then removed to North Carolina. In 1773, George Haworth, his brother James, and a few others, accompanied Daniel Boone on one of his explorations to Kentucky, with the intention of making that State their future homes, but apprehending trouble with the Indians, they determined not to settle there, and subsequently returned to North Carolina. About the year 1784, George Haworth removed to Greene County, Tennessee, taking his family, consisting of wife and two sons, viz., Mahlon and John. Mr. Haworth remained in Tennessee, until 1803, when he left that State, emigrating to Ohio, and settled in Clinton County, north of the present town of Wilmington. In 1804 Mahlon Haworth left Tennessee and came to what is now Clinton County, and located on Todd's Fork, about two miles from Wilmington.

Joseph Doan was born in Chatham County, North Carolina, October 28th, 1759. When arriving at manhood he married Jemima Vestal. In the year 1804 he emigrated to Ohio, and settled near the present town of Wilnington, Clinton County, buying 250 acres of land in Posey's Survey, No. 1057, the land now being in the possession of his son Jesse Doan and others. Mr. Doan had a family of twelve children, viz., Thomas, born July 17th, 1781; John, born September 10th, 1783; Ruth, November 10th, 1785; William, August 13th, 1789; Elizabeth, November 21st, 1791; Joseph, May 21st, 1794; Jesse, July 8th, 1796; Jonathan, July 11th, 1798; Jacob, January 8th, 1801; Rachel, October 27th, 1803; Elisha, August 19th, 1806; Mary, November 12th, 1809. Of the twelve children only three are now living, viz., Jesse, Elisha, and Rachel. Joseph Doan died May 28th, 1838, aged 79 years. His wife died August 7th, 1832. Jesse Doan, the eldest member of the family now living, is in his 80th year, having always been a resident of Union Township.

John Vestal, a native of the State of North Carolina, came to the Northwest Territory in 1799, and settled on the Sciota river. In the spring of 1804 he purchased 600 acres of land in Survey No. 1,556, on Todd's Fork, on which he erected a cabin, and settled there during that year. Mr. Vestal had an only son (Samuel), who was born in Chatham County, North Carolina, October 26th, 1796, and came with his father to what is now Clinton County, in 1804. Samuel Vestal was married to Edith Ballard, April 3d, 1825.

Spencer Ballard, of Tennessee, came to Ohio in 1803, and settled in what now Highland County. In 1806 he removed to the neighborhood of Wilmington, having purchased from the agent of Gen. Posey 250 acres of land in Survey 1,057, near the present town of Wilmington.

Jacob Haines was born in the State of Pennsylvania, February 19th, 1778. While he was quite a youth his parents removed to Guilford County, North Carolina. In the year 1800 he was married to Mary Leonard. In the year 1803 he emigrated to Ohio, stopping in Waynesville during the winter of that year, and in the spring of 1804, moved to what is now Union Township, Clinton County. He had a family of wife and one child when he came to the County. The land where he settled is now owned by his son, Zimri Haines. Jacob Haines died June 17th, 1854, aged 77 years.

Thomas Reich was born in Virginia July 4th, 1785. In 1787 he went to North Carolina, where he resided until the year 1809, when he came to Clinton County, and settled on Lytle's creek, west of Wilmington. Isaac Perkins emigrated from North Carolina in 1801, and settled in Warren County near Waynesville, and remained there until 1803, when he removed Clinton County near Center, where he resided until his death. Hezekiah Hiatt was born March 23d, 1786, in Guilford County, North Carolina. He came to Clinton County in 1808, and located near Center Meeting House, He was married in July 1810, to Ann Perkins, daughter of Isaac Perkins. John J. Lacy, one of the earliest settlers in Union Township emigrated from Virginia in 1809. Moses Frazier, from Tennessee, settled in this Township in the vicinity of Doyer in 1806. William Shields of North Carolina, Gideon Tiser, John McWhorter, Jacob Strickle, and Jacob Hale, were also

early settlers in this Township.

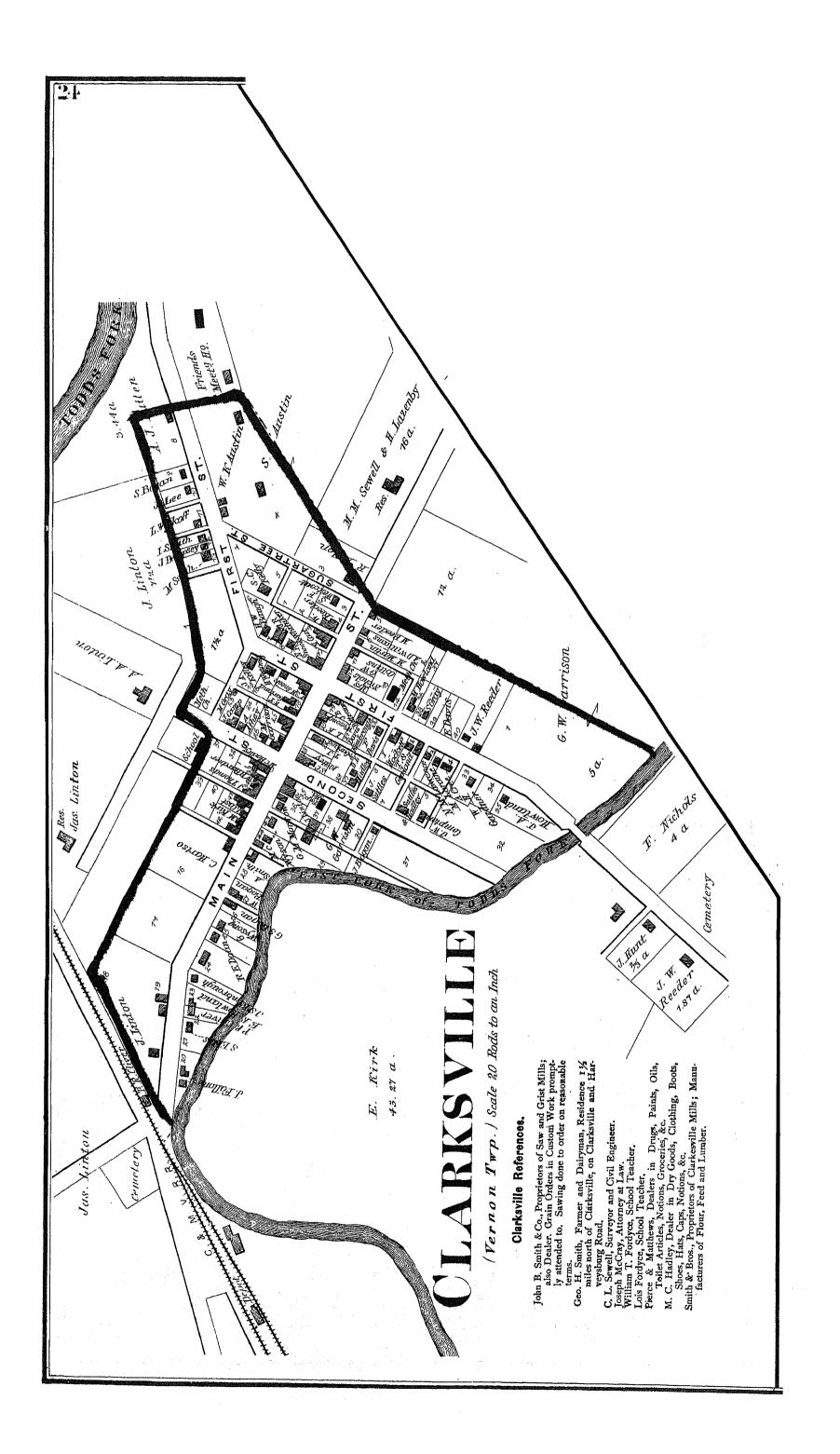
Gayer Starbuck was born on the island of Nantucket, in the year 1777. In 1785 he emigrated with his parents, to Guilford County, North Carolina. In 1799 he was married to Susannah Dillon, and in 1807 they emigrated to Ohio, settled in Union Township, Clinton County, near Dover in 1810. Mr. S. lived in this Township during the remainder of his life. He died December 30th, 1866, aged 90 years.

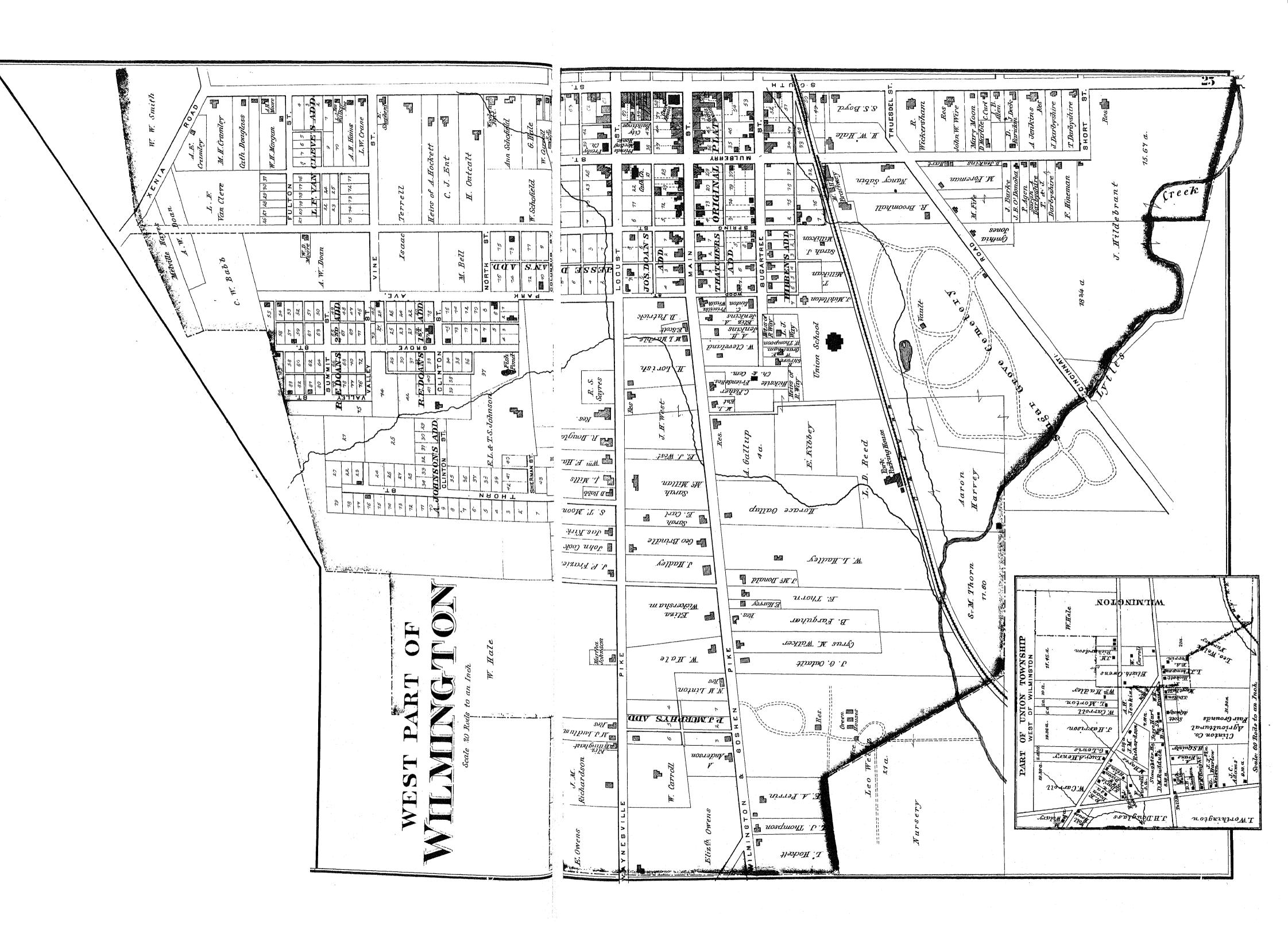
The first school taught in Union township was a subscription school, taught at Center, in the year 1806, by Peter Dicks, a native of North Carolina. The next school in the Township was at the same place by Gideon Tiser. The building in which these schools were taught, was the building milt and used as a Church at this place.

Voting population, 1,032. WILMINGTON.

Wilmington was laid out in 1810 by James McMannis, who had bee appointed "Director" by the Court of Common Pleas, and whose duties were to obtain titles to the land selected for the County-seat, and lay the same off in lots. The land upon which the town is located was donated to Clinton County by David Faulkner and Joseph Doan. The first sale of lots took place on the 6th of August, 1810. The town was first called "Clinton," then "Armenia," subsequently "Mount Pleasant," and finally Wilmington, from Wilmington, North Carolina. The first building erected in this village was a log house built by William Hobson. June 4th, 1811, a license was granted by the Court to Larkin Reynolds to "keep a tayern" in Wilmington. On the 8th of July, 1811, Isaiah Morris and William Ferguson were granted a license to "keep store" in the village, this being the first store in the place. October 10th, 1811, a "tayern license was granted to Warren Sabin." February 10th, 1813, Asa Halcomb began business in merchandising in the village. Samuel Hale, from North Carolina came to Clinton County at an early day, and was for many years a prominent merchant of Wilmington. In 1812 a post-office was established, with Isaiah Morris Post-master. In 1813 Richard Pierce, a native of Delaware, and a "hatter" by trade, located in the village. The first school taught in the village was in 1813, taught by Isaac Garrison, in a log house that stood "Sugartree Street," near where the planing mill now is. The house was built by Joseph Doan. The school was a "subscription school." Mr. Garrison was a native of Pennsylvania. The building in which the school was taught took fire and was burned before the "term" had expired. James Fife, a native of Ireland, came to Ohio in 1817 and located at Lebanon. In





1819 he came to Wilmington, and engaged in merchandising on Main Street, property now owned by Ir. Martin. At that time Smart & Gaskins, Isaiah Morris, Samuel Hale, Stephen Bosworth, David Birdsall, and David Stratton were the "business men" of the town. William and Thomas Hibben came soon after. Nearly all of these men had buildings erected. In 1827 Mr. Fife built a "business house" on the corner where the "First National Bank" now stands. William Hibben built where Dr. Jones now lives. Lewis Wright built on the corner of Main and South Streets.

Mr. Fife and Thomas Carothers were the first engaged in "banking." They were followed by Charles M. Bosworth, who kept a "private bank" ing the present "First National Bank." In 1870 the "Clinton County National Bank" was organized, with a capital of \$100,000. In 1872 Messrs. Fife and Bosworth built the present building occupied by the "First National Bank." January 20th, 1870, the Union school building was completed. The building is of brick, with tin roofing, and measures 80 feet square on its foundations, its height from the foundation to the highest point is 129 feet. It is three stories high, the first two being 15 feet in height each, and the third 19 feet. The building contains fifteen rooms. It stands 124 feet above the natural surface, presenting an imposing appearance. "Wilmington College," established a few years since by the "Friends," is situated just east of town, and is in a prosperous condition. The building is of brick, three stories high, and stands on a lot nicely undulating, containing about ten acres. Wilmington contains nine dry good stores, twelve groceries, one hardware, and one book store, three livery stables, seven churches, two newspapers, two carriage shops, one grist and one fulling mill, two sash factories, one Iron Bridge Company, four blacksmith shops, four drug-stores, two merchant tailors, three millinery stores, one union school, two banks, two hotels, two pork-houses, gas works, six physicians, Odd Fellows, Masonic, Good Templar lodges. Population, 3000

BAPTIST CHURCH OF WILMINGTON.

The first church built in Wilmington was by the Baptists. There being no records of the first organization, it is not definitely known when the organization took place, or at what time the first church building was erected. After worshiping here for a number of years, this denomination became weakened, and finally ceased to exist, and for a number of years Wilmington was without a church of this organization. The present Baptist church was organized August 6th, 1853. Delegates from the following churches were present: "Cassar's Creek," "Jonah's Run," "Port William," "Xenia," "Spring Valley," "Washington," and "Cowan's Creek." The exercises of organization were conducted by O. B. Stone, Bros. Woodruff and Marshall, and James Hoblitt. J. K. Sparks, Robert Wood, William Williams were appointed "trustees" The following persons constituted the membership at that time, viz., James S. Hoblitt, J. K. Sparks, Robert Wood, William Williams, James Phillips, J. C. Dowden, Sterling Bartlett, Rhoda Morris, Mary Hoblitt, Mary Woods, Elizabeth Darbyshire, Olive Bartlett, and Hannah Griffith. The present church building was erected in 1853.

CHRISTIAN CHURCH.

This church was organized in the year 1830, by David S. Burnett. Among the first members were Jesse Hughes and wife, George McMannis, William Runnels and wife, James Wilson, William R. Cole and wife, Morris R. Chew, Samuel Adsit, Jacob and Annie Strickle, James Strickle and wife, William Hibben and wife, and Uriah Farquar and wife. The first church building used by the society was one previously creeted by the Baptists, on the corner of Columbus and High Streets. In the year 1834 a brick building was creeted on Mulberry Street, which they used until 1873, when it was sold to Charles Taylor, who converted it into a carriage shop. After disposing of this building, the society worshiped in the town hall until October, 1874, when the present church building was completed, corner of

"FRIENDS' CHURCH."

The first meetings of this denomination were held in private houses. About the year 1825 a regular meeting was established and a small building erected in the west part of the town. In 1828 the Society was divided, and the Hicksites retained possession of the church property, but both parties continued to worship in it for some years. In 1839 the "Orthodox" division occupied a brick building, previously erected for school purposes, ir which they worshiped until 1863, when they returned to the "old building' until 1867, from which time until 1870 they made use of "Preston Hall at which time they purchased the building which they now occupy on Locust Street. Among the early members of the church were Joseph Doan, Thomas Thatcher, William Walker, Mordecai Walker, Timothy Bennett, Joseph Smith, David Forkner, and George D. Haworth. The "Hicksites" still retain their organization and occupy the "old building."

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

This church was organized in 1834 with the following members, viz. William Walter and wife, Isaac Collett, Samuel Miller, William Bloom, John Laughead, Thomas Hibben, Charles P. Gallaher, and Caleb Smith. Services were held at private houses for some time, when the society procured the Baptist church, in which they worshiped until 1839, when the present church was erected. David Monfort organized the society, and served as minister for the congregation for two or three years; he was sucserved as muster for the congregation for two or three years; ne was succeeded by William Worrell, who was the pastor for a few months; being in bad health, he was takendown, and died before the expiration of his first year. His place was filled by Joseph Irwin, and subsequently by C. A. Hoyt. The congregation has been without a regular pastor since Mr. Hoyt left in 1850.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH (COLORED),

Was organized in 1833 by Wiley Runnels, of Cincinnati, at the house of William Brown, on the corner of South and Sugartree Streets. Among the members at that time were John Thompson, David Ladd and wife, Abraham Henson and wife, Mary Bosworth, William Brown and wife, James Wheeler and wife, Willis Crane and wife. The meetings were held at private houses until 1838 when a log church was built on Lincoln Street, which served them until 1852, when the present church building was erected.

METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH,

Was organized in 1814. For a number of years the congregation worshiped in an old frame house, that had been converted from a mill into a place of worship. In 1833 a church building was creeted, which served the congregation until 1865, when it was taken down to give place to the pred edifice. The building was erceted and the Lecture Room finished, 1866 which served the society until February 12th, 1871, when the building was finished, and dedicated by Dr. Wiley. (Cost, \$18,000.),

VERNON TOWNSHIP

THIS Township is one of the original three, of which Clinton County was composed, at the time of its organization. It then included Marion, Jefferson, Clark and Washington Townships. Vernon Township is situated in the western part of the County bordering on Warren County. Todd's Fork, Cowan's Creek and the East Fork of Todd's Fork, tributaries to the Little Miami river, pass through this Township. The land in the vicinity of these streams is broken and hilly. The soil for the most part is good, and generally adapted to cultivation.

The first settler in Vernon Township, and perhaps the first in what is now Clinton County, was David Sewell He was born in Loudon County, Virginia, in the year 1746. In 1768 he was married to Mary Tullis. David Sewell raised a family of three children, viz.: Hannah, John and Aaron. Hannah, the oldest child, was married to Peter Burr, July 10th, 1790. John was married in the month of April, 1792, to Priscilla Hendricks. Aaron was married April the 5th, 1798, to Rebecca Hendricks, a sister of his brother's wife. In 1798, the Sewell family, in company with Isaac Tullis, Mary Hendricks, and some of the Cowans, emigrated to Ohio; coming to Pittsburgh in wagons, and there embarked in a flat-bottomed boat, and then proceeded down the Ohio river to the present site of Columbia. From this point, Mr. Sewell proceeded to Warren County, stopping at a place called Bedell's station, near the present town of Union Village. Mr. S. had exchanged a small farm in Virginia, for one of Archibald Campbell's surveys, No. 2,250, and which he experienced some difficulty in finding, upon his arrival here, having to employ a surveyor for this purpose. During the latter part of the summer of 1798, he had erected a log cabin upon his land, into which he moved his family, and perhaps was the first cabin erected in Clinton County, the same being built near the residence of Cyrus Sewell in this Township. At the time of Mr. Sewell's settlement in this Township, there were no persons living nearer than the vicinity of Lebanon, distant ten miles. David Sewell died in 1816, aged seventy years; his wife died 1838, aged 86 years. John Sewell, the oldest son, raised a large family of children; he died in 1822, his wife having died in 1815. Aaron, the younger son, raised a family of six children, viz.: Elizabeth, Ezra, John, David, Aaron and Mary, three of whom, David, Aaron

and Mary Fordyce, are still living.

William Hadley emigrated from North Carolina, in the year 1810, and settled in Vernon Township, on the land now owned by Martin P. Marshall, of Kentucky.

Thomas Austin, came from North Carolina in 1809, and located in Vernon Township, on the land now owned by Evan Hadley. He had a family of several children, part of whom are still living.

In 1811, William Austin, a brother to Thomas, came from North Carolina, and located in the Township, on the land where David and William (his sons) now live. William Austin was born in Prince George's County Maryland. In 1805 he was licensed to preach in the M. E. Church, in which he proved an earnest laborer, during the remainder of his life. He was married a short time previous to his coming to Ohio, and raised a

tamily of seven children, three of whom are now living. He died January 17th, 1860, at the residence of his son, D. A. Austin, in this Township.

James Harris emigrated from Loudon County, Virginia, in the year 1809, and settled on Todd's Fork, near the present village of Clarksville. He purchased 300 acres of land, upon which he erected a log cabin, the same now owned by William Stackhouse. Mr. Harris became the owner of a large quantity of land in Clinton and Warren Counties. He had a family of ten children, seven of whom are now living. Mr. Harris was for many years Justice of the Peace, and was a member of the State Legislature three years. He died in the year 1845, at the age of 69 years.

James Villars, from Pennsylvania, came to Ohio in 1806, and located in Warren County. He came to Clinton County and settled in Vernon Town ship, about the year 1813.

Josiah Briggs, Lemuel, John, and Parson Garrison, and David Ferris. were early settlers in this Township. The first church organization was that of the Presbyterians, at the house of David Sewell, about the year 1812, the minister being a Mr. Pittinger from the vicinity of Hillsboro. In 1812, a school was taught in a log house, on the land now owned by Mary Fordyce, which is supposed to have been the first school taught in the Township. David Sewell was the first Justice of the Peace in the Township. ship. In 1868, James Villars, Jr., erected, at individual expense, a commodious church edifice, on the Clarksville and Cuba turnpike. The build ing is of brick, with a basement for Sabbath-school purposes, the upper room for church purposes. The building is "free to all Christian denominations," and cost, when completed, about ten thousand dollars. The Township contains three other churches, viz.: one M. E., one Protestant Methodist, and one Friends' church. The Township contains 17,886 acres of land, a school enumeration of 615, a voting population of 347, and a taxable valuation of \$813,144.

CLARKSVILLE,

In the Western part of Vernon Township, on the C. & M. V. R. R., was Ephraim Keibby was born at Columbia, at the mouth of the Little Miami river, on the 9th of December, 1795, his father having settled there in 1789. In 1800 the family removed to what is now Warren County. While in this County, Ephraim learned the tanning business. In 1817, having married, he removed to Clarksville, and engaged in his occupation at this place. At the time of Mr. Keibby's settlement in the village, there were but three families living in it, viz.: Samuel T. Louden, John Keenan, and Joseph Thompson. Among the early business men of the village were and Joseph Thompson. Among the early business men of the village were Samuel Louden, tavern keeper, who had a small log tavern of one and a half stories high; Ephraim Keibby, tanner; John Hadley, saddler: Eli and Samuel Hale, merchants, Jacob Longstreth, Merchant. Joseph Wysong, a native of Virginia, located here in 1818, and soon after opened a tavern. He was also post-master in the village for a number of years. In 1811 the Baptist Church was organized by Joshua Carman, at Philip Titus, in Warren County, a few miles below town. In 1823 a church was built by this congregation, in Clarksville. The village contains a school, two churches, five stores, two wagon, and three blacksmith shops; a population of about 300 inhabitants, a school enumeration of 260, and a taxable valuation of \$42,205.

WASHINGTON TOWNSHIP

This Township was organized by an act of the County Commissioners. June the 4th, 1835. The territory which comprises it was taken from Clark and other Townships. Cowan's Creek, and the East Fork of Todd's Fork, pass through the Township. The surface of the land is generally rolling; the soil fertile and productive. James, Asa, and David Brown, from Virginia, Isaac Wilson, Peter Lieurance, James Trimble, Matthew Calloway, Johnson Lacy, William Briggs, and Harvy Gallaher, were among the

ay, outson Lacy, witham Driggs, and Trarvy Gartaner, were among the rely settlers of this Township.

Jacob Mann was born in Rockingham County, Virginia, in the year 1766. From Virginia he went to Nicholas County, Kentucky, where he was married in 1796, to Catharine McDaniel, by whom he had a family of nine children, six girls and three boys, eight of whom lived to be grown, viz : George, Henry, Elizabeth, John, Mary, Margaret, Rhoda, and Melinda. In the year 1810, he emigrated to Ohio, and settled in Clinton County, near New Burlington, where he remained two years, and then removed to Clark (now Washington) Township, in the Spring of 1813, and settled about one and a half miles east of the village of Cuba, on the land now owned by his son, George Mann. Jacob Mann died in 1840, his wife having died two years previous (1838). The sons are still living in the Township; one of the girls (Mary Brown), in Clark Township, Margaret Bobbett, in Lynchburg, and Rhoda Dalby in the State of Texas. Nathaniel Hunter, from Kentucky, settled in the fall of 1813, on the land purchased by his father, Benjamin Hunter. Jesse Grimes, an early settler, located one and a half miles east of Cuba.

Edward Bond was born 1776, in Berkley County, Virginia. In 1823, he emigrated to Clinton County, and settled in this Township, one and a half miles north-east of the village of Morrisville, on the land now owned by William Baker. He had a family of eight children, seven of whom are now living; two in Illinois, two in Indiana, and three in Clinton County.

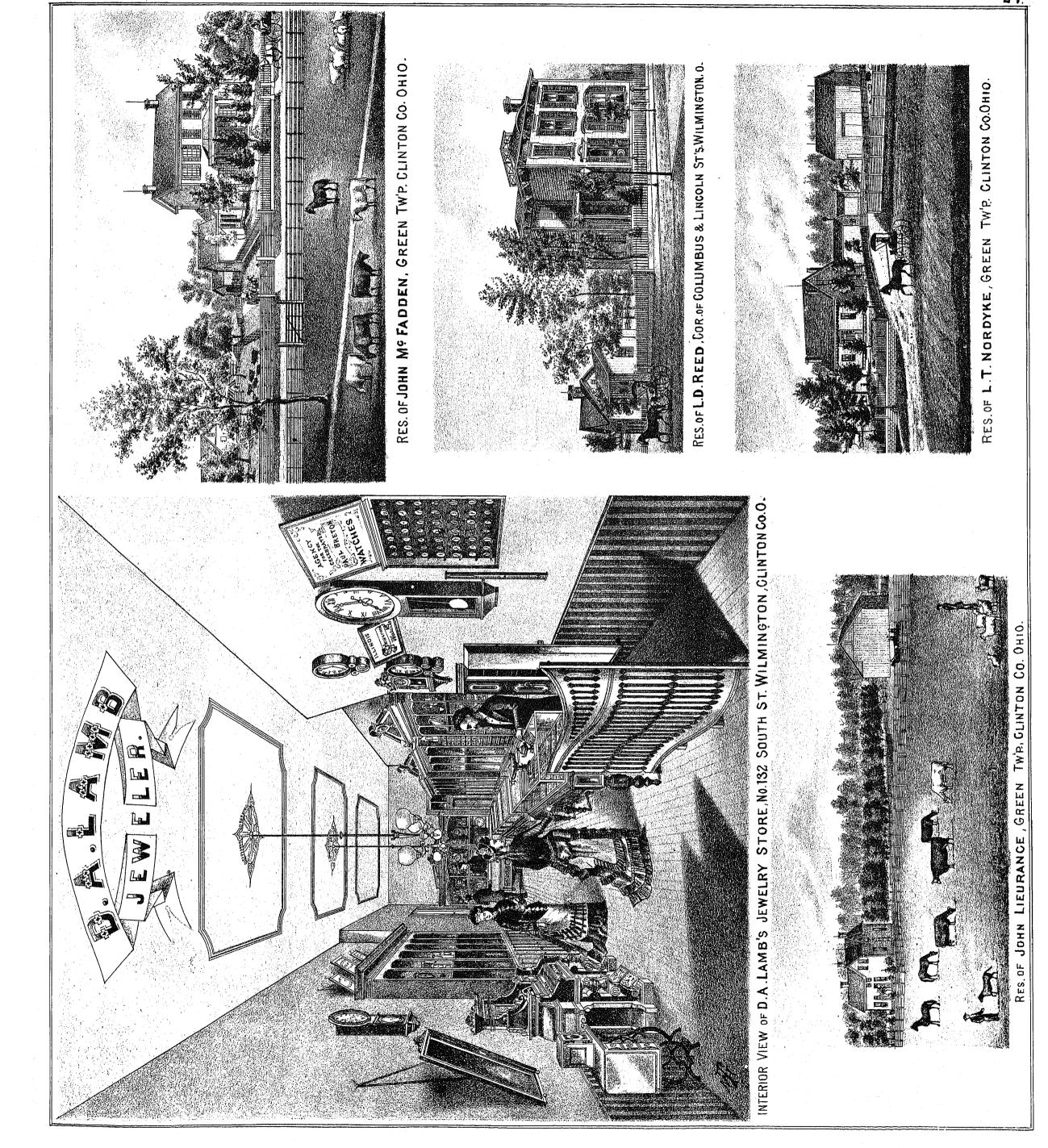
A small village in this Township, was laid out by Isaiah Morris, who owned the land where the village is located.

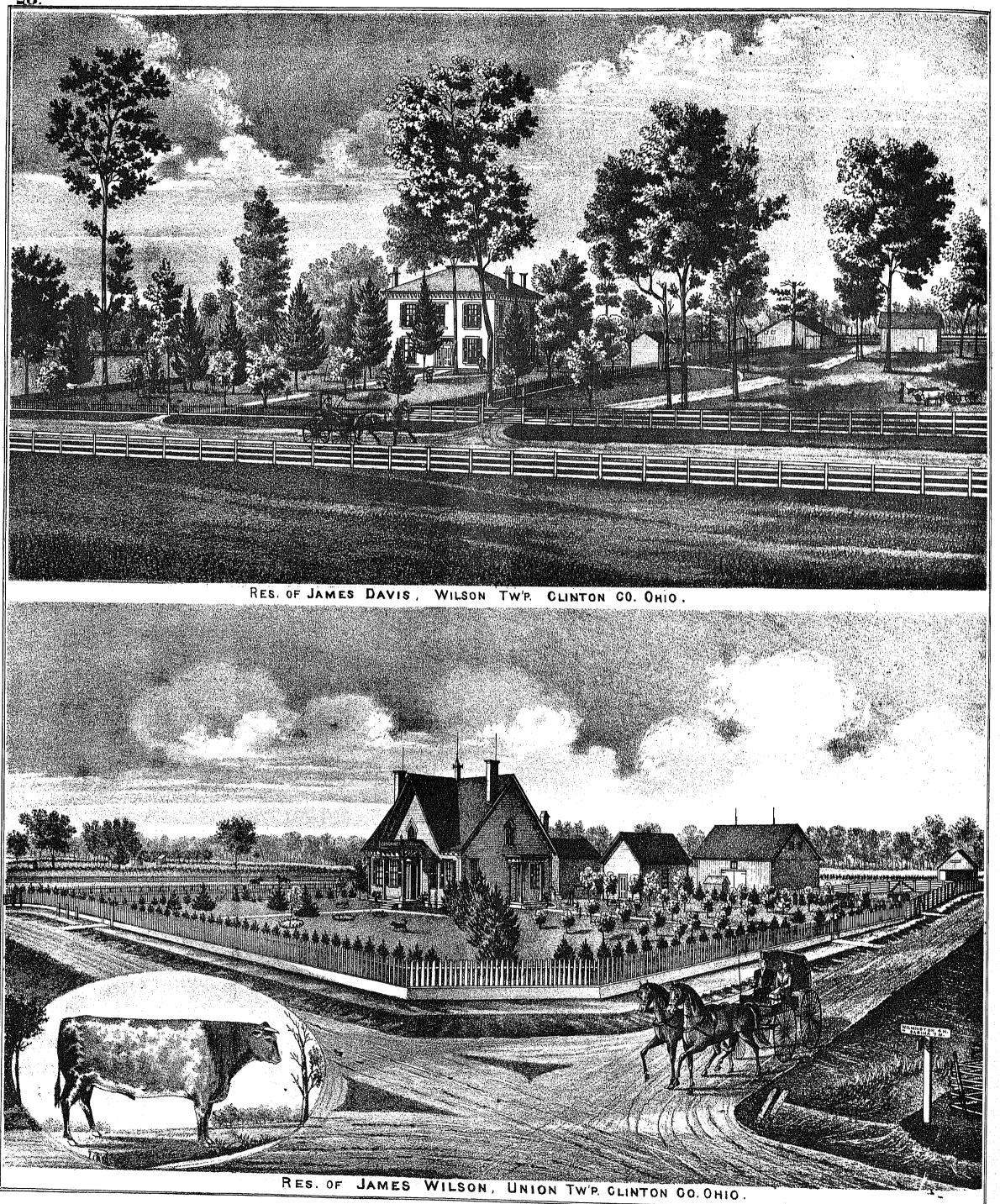

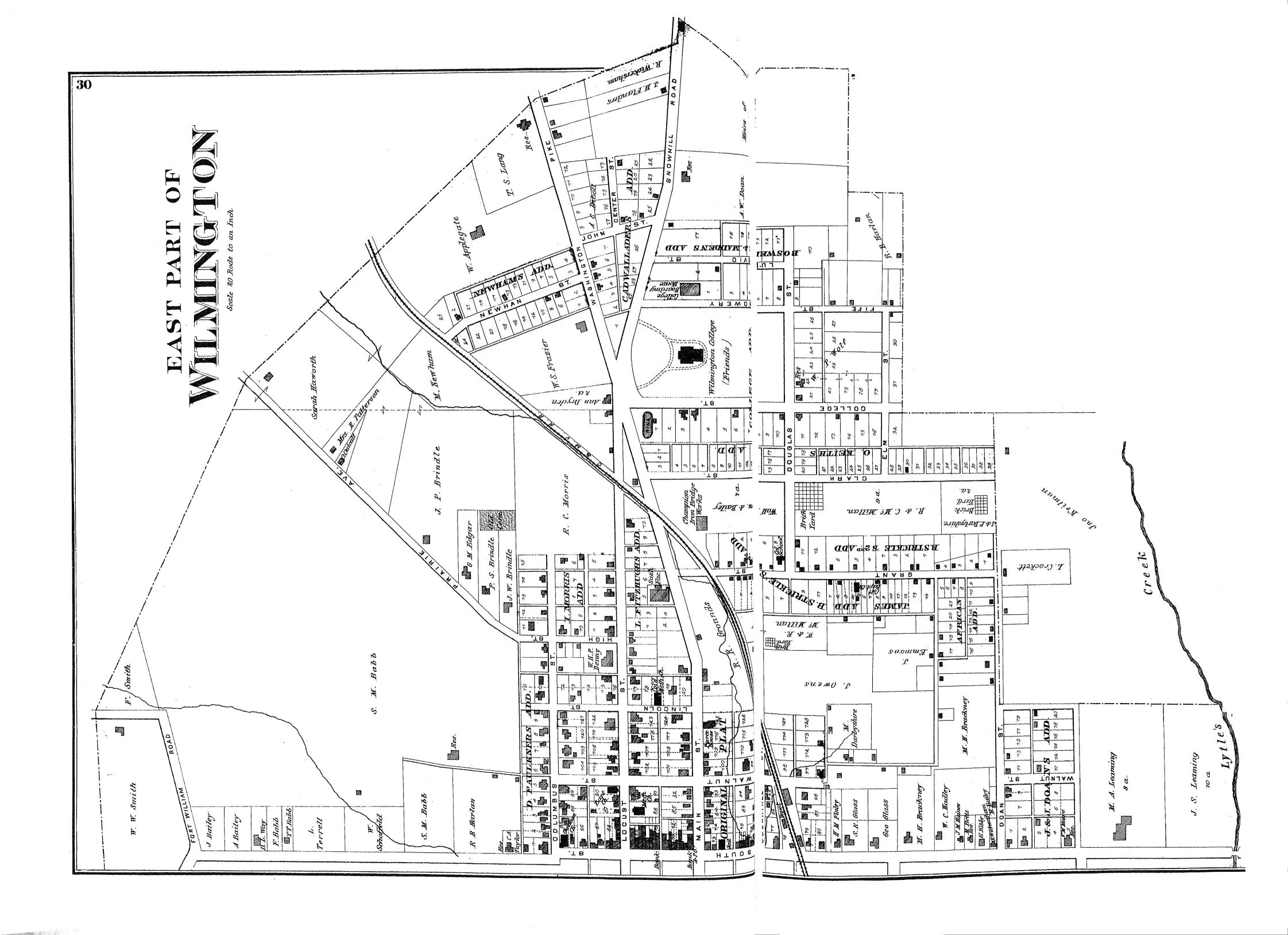
WAYNE TOWNSHIP.

WAYNE township was established in March, 1837; the territory of which t is composed being taken from Green and Richland townships. Andrew Rhonenus emigrated from "Harper's Ferry," Va., to Ross County, Ohio at an early day, and after remaining here a short time removed to Clinton County and settled in what is now Wayne township, in 1812, and settled on the farm now belonging to Absalom Steel. Mr. Rhonenus had a family of five children; four boys and one girl. In 1826 his son, Christian Rhonenus who had remained in Virginia, emigrated to Fairfield County, Ohio, and after remaining there one year moved to Wayne township, Clinton County, and settled near the village of Centerville; the village now being on a part of the land. He had a family of six children—four boys and two girls—three of whom are still living. Among those who settled in the township about the years 1808–10 were John Jackson, Edward Curtis, John township about the years 1808-10 were John Jackson, Edward Curtis, John and Henry Grice, Joseph Rooks, Thomas Still, David Reed, John Oxley, Stephen Martin, Thomas Draper, John Allen, Jesse Boxley. "Memphis" and Centerville are small villages in this township. The township contains 19,834 acres of land, valued at \$714,567; real estate in villages, \$8,695; chattels, \$257,698. Total value, \$980,960. Number of youth, 434. Voting population, 300.

WILSON TOWNSHIP The first settlers in this township were Amos Wilson and James Mills who are supposed to have settled here in the year 1799. Amos Wilson emigrated from Kentucky to Ohio in 1791, and at the time above mentioned removed to what is now Wilson township, and settled north of the present removed to write is now written township, and settled norm of the present village of Reesville, on the land now owned by Alfred Coulter. Mr. Wilson purchased 200 acres of land in this neighborhood, but in making a settle, ment he, through a mistake, settled on the land afterward owned by Thomas Hinkson, where he remained one year; when discovering his mistake he again located, and again made a mistake; he at this time locating on a tract of land lying in Survey No. 732, afterward owned by Cyrus Reed, where he remained one year, then locating on his own land— Joshua Carman, of whom he purchased, making him a present of an additional fifty acres of land to that which he had already purchased. Mr. Wilson was married four times, and was the father of fifteen children. James Mills emigrated from Kentucky and settled in Wilson township at the same time as Amos Wilson (his brother-in-law.) They built their "log-cabins" at the same time, both being "raised" on the same day, getting assistance for this purpose from the settlements on "Caesar's Creek," and below Clarksville. Mr. Mills had a family of six children, only two of whom are now living. The land where he settled is now owned by his son, James R. Mills. Col. Thomas Hinkson, a native of Westmorehand county, Pa., was born in the year 1772. In 1790, at the age of 19 years, he removed to Kentucky, and settled in Harrison County, settling on a farm inherited from his father, where he remained until 1806, when he removed to Ohio, and in 1807 he settled in Wilson township, Clinton County, purchasing 256 acres of land in Eggleston's Survey No. 886, and about the same number of acres in an adjaining accuracy. county, purenasing 200 acres of land in leggieston's Survey No. 886, and about the same number of acres in an adjoining survey, No. 743, making about 500 acres in all. There were living at that time in this vicinity Amos Wilson, James Mills, and George W. Barrerre, each of whom had previously located on the land of Hinkson through mistake. Mr. Barrerre was from Kentucky, from which State he came to Ohio, and after living awhile on the "Miami" he came to this township (1803) and located on awhile on the "Miami" he came to this township (1803) and located on "Wilson's Improvement (subsequently Hinkson's property). In 1804 he removed to "New Market," Highland County. The first school taught in this neighborhood was in a log house on land in Lindsey's Survey, now owned by Hezekiah Oliver, and was taught by Samuel Anderson, at \$2.00 per quarter for each pupil. The first blacksmith shop was erected by Thomas Hinkson, on his land, who employed a man from Cincinnati to do the smithing. Thomas Hinkson was the first "Justice of the Peace" in the smithing. Thomas Hinkson was the first "Justice of the Peace" in the township—subsequently Associate Judge for the term of seven years. He had a family of ten children, viz.: John, Benjamin, Thomas, William, Mary, Elizabeth, Melinda, Huldah, Margaret, and Harriet; five of whom Mary, Educate, Mehman, Hudan, Margaret, and Harriet; live of whom are yet living. Benjamin is still living on the "old homestead" farm, at the age of 75 years. John Coulter, a native of Ireland—born 1777—emigrated to the United States, in 1805; came to Clinton County in 1809, and grated to the United States, in 1800; came to United County in 1800, and settled in Wilson township, on the land now occupied by members of the family. He had a family of twelve children, seven of whom are yet living. Enoch Hankins, a native of the State of New Jersey, removed to Pennsylvania in 1780. In 1809 his son (Romoth Hankins) made a trip "out and purchased one hundred acres of land for \$2 00 per acre, it David Walker's Survey No. 743, on which he erected a cabin. In the fall of the same year he returned to Pennsylvania, where he remained during the winter. In the spring of the following year he left Pennsylvania, and on the 7th of May, 1810, arrived at his "Western home," with his family consisting of wife and two children. His crop the first year consisted of three acres of corn, but little of which he saved on account of the squirrels. Mr. Hankins had a family of eight children in all, three of whom are yet living. John Watson (a "squatter") settled in the township in the Spring of 1810, on land in McCall's Survey, now owned by Dr. Isane Telfair. He was a native of Ireland; had a family of six children. Watson remained on this land until his death. Wm. Fannan came into this neighborhood about the year 1807, and settled on the land now owned by the heirs of Absalom Douglass. He had a family of 5 boys and six girls, who in after years became separated, and nothing definite is known in regard to them. The "old folks" died, some years since, on the same farm where they settled. Among those who settled in this neighborhood about the year 1810 were John Peele, Wm. Gallimore, Jasper and Thomas Babb, Absalom and Samuel Reed, and Thomas Greer. The first religious organization is this vicinity was that of the Baptists, at the house of Amos Wilson, as early as 1809 or 10. The Wilsons, Hawkins, Hoblitts, and Mills were members of that church. The "Friends" erected the first church building in the township. The township now contains four churches, viz.: one "Friends," one M. E., and two Union. The first horse mill was built by Elijah Jessup. The township contains 15,753 acres of land; has a voting population of 237 and a taxable valuation of \$779,489.
