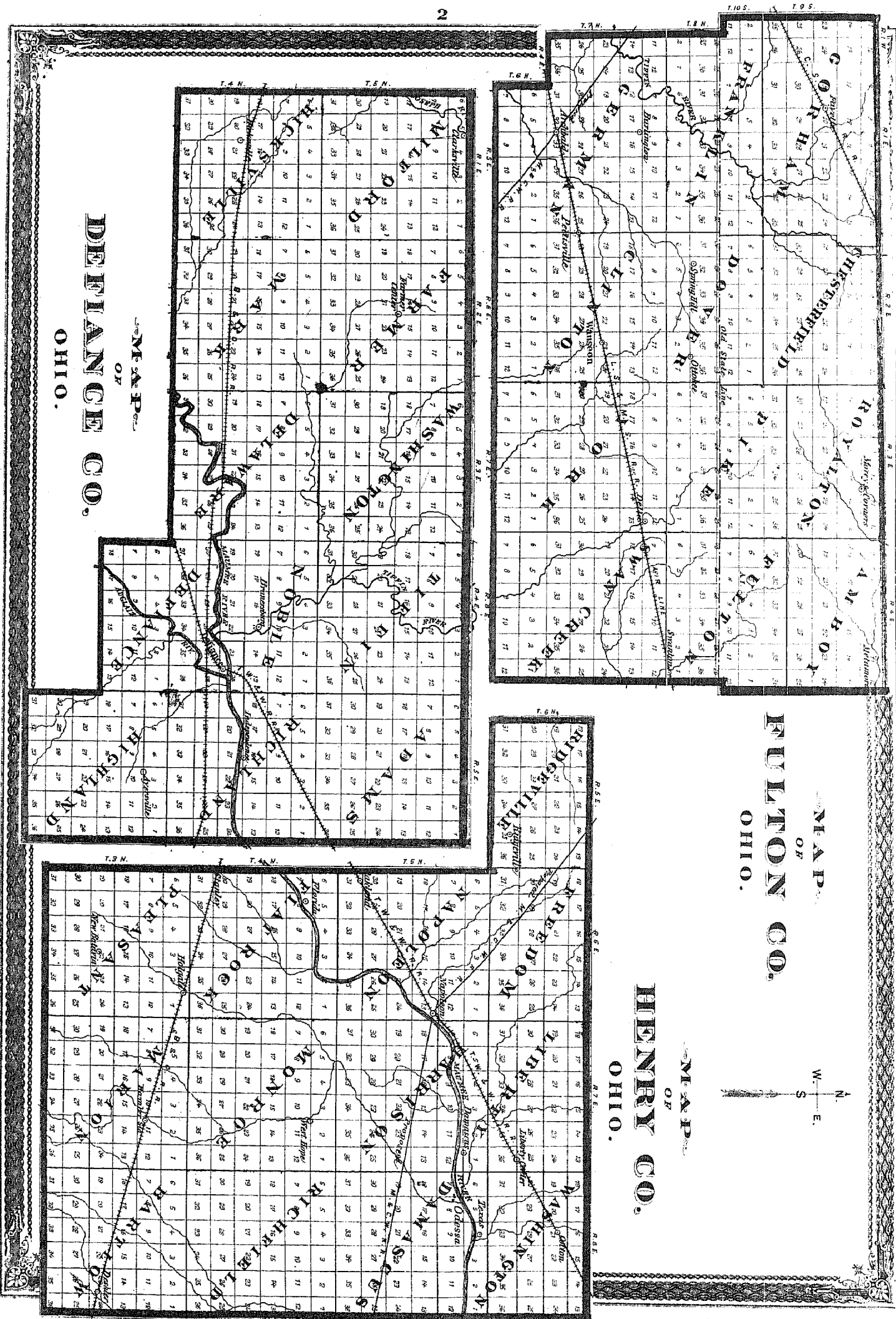
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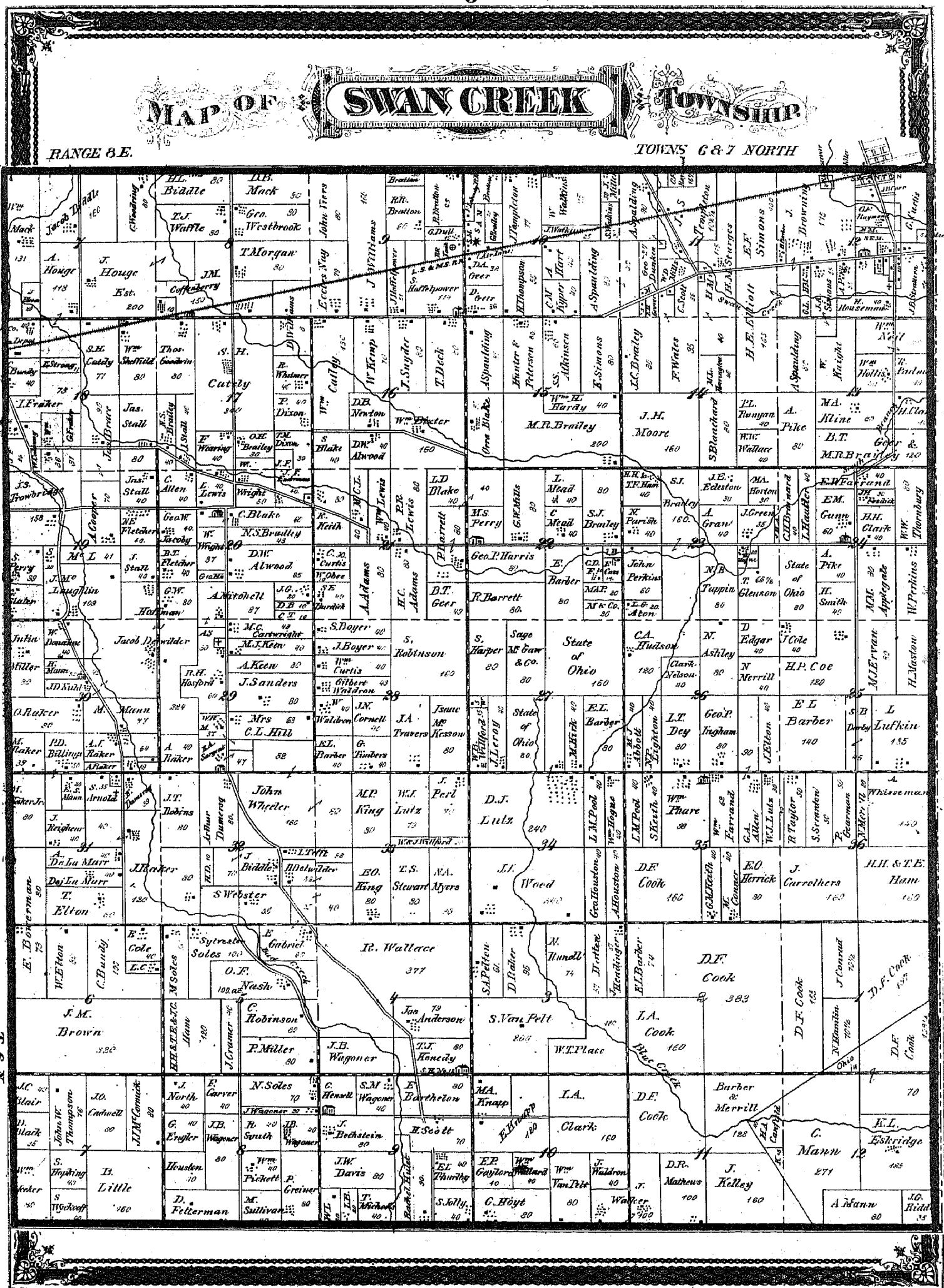
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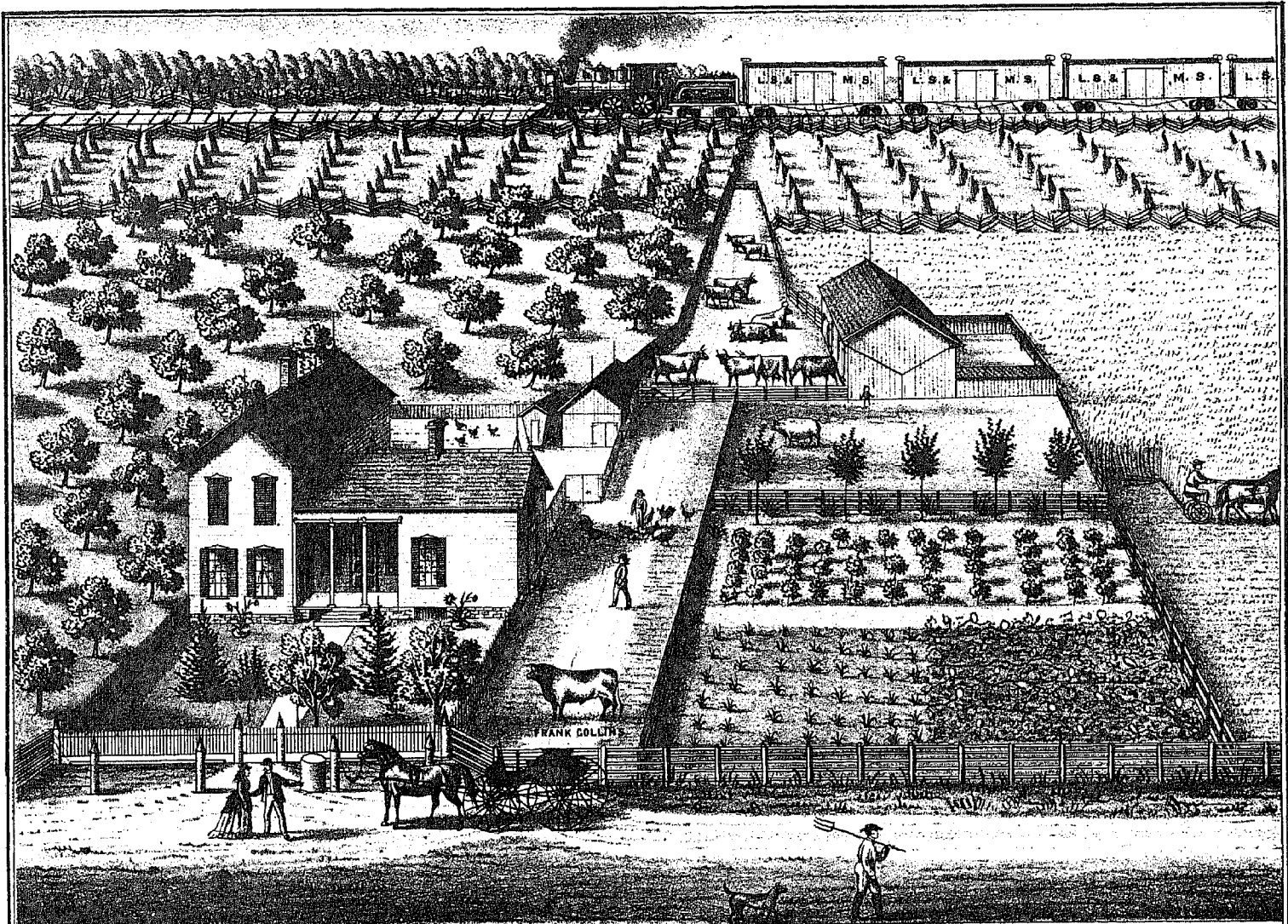
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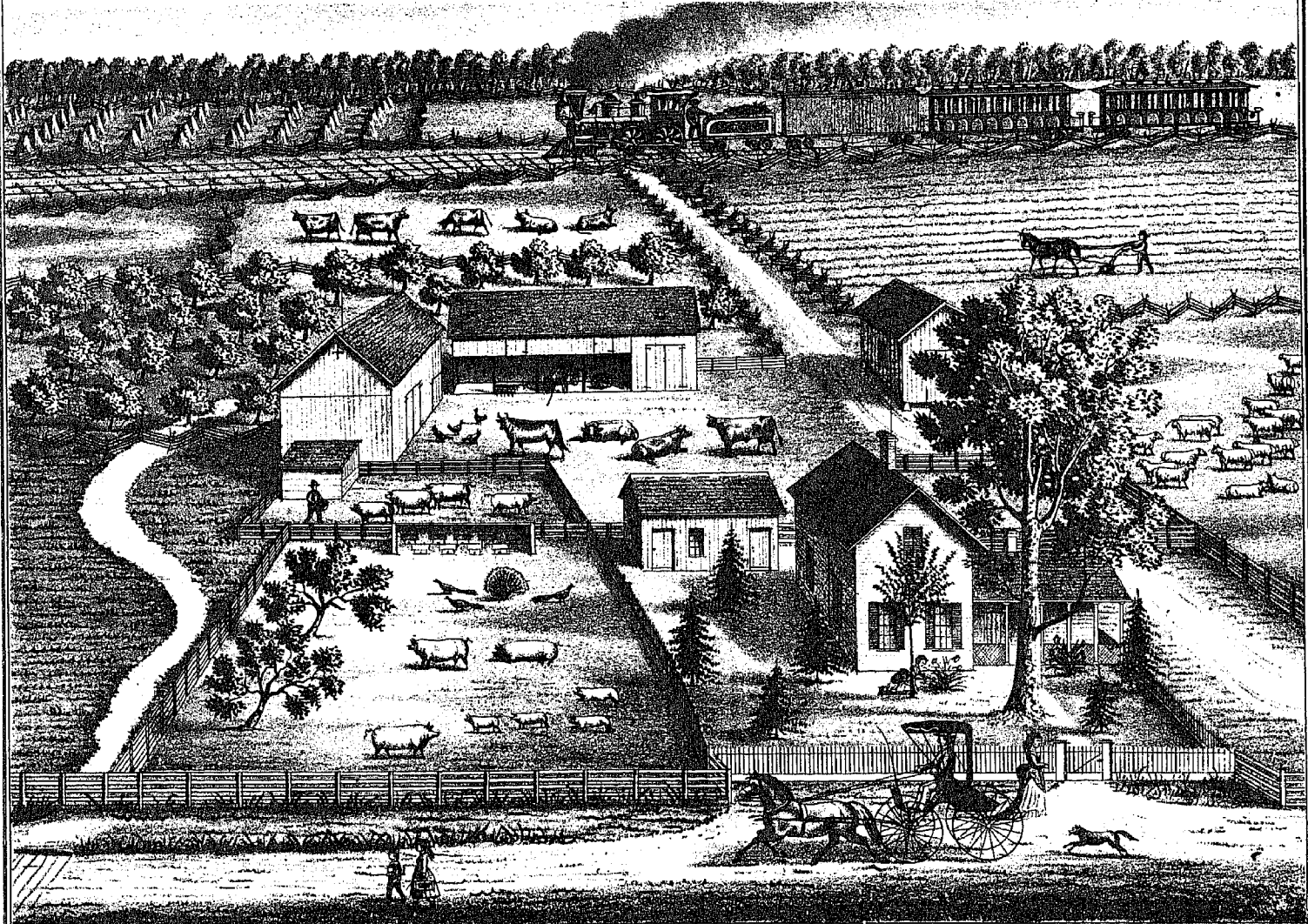
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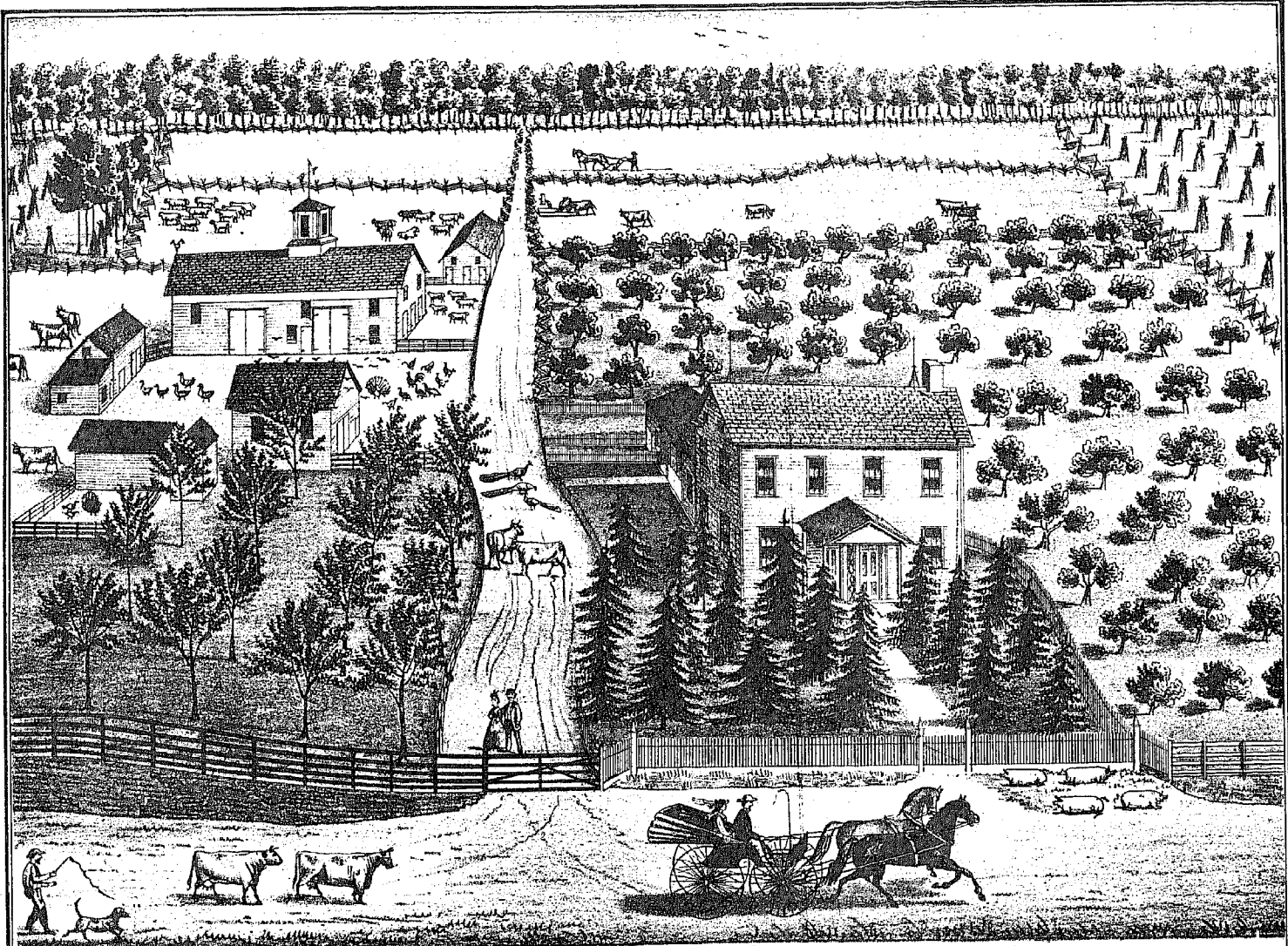




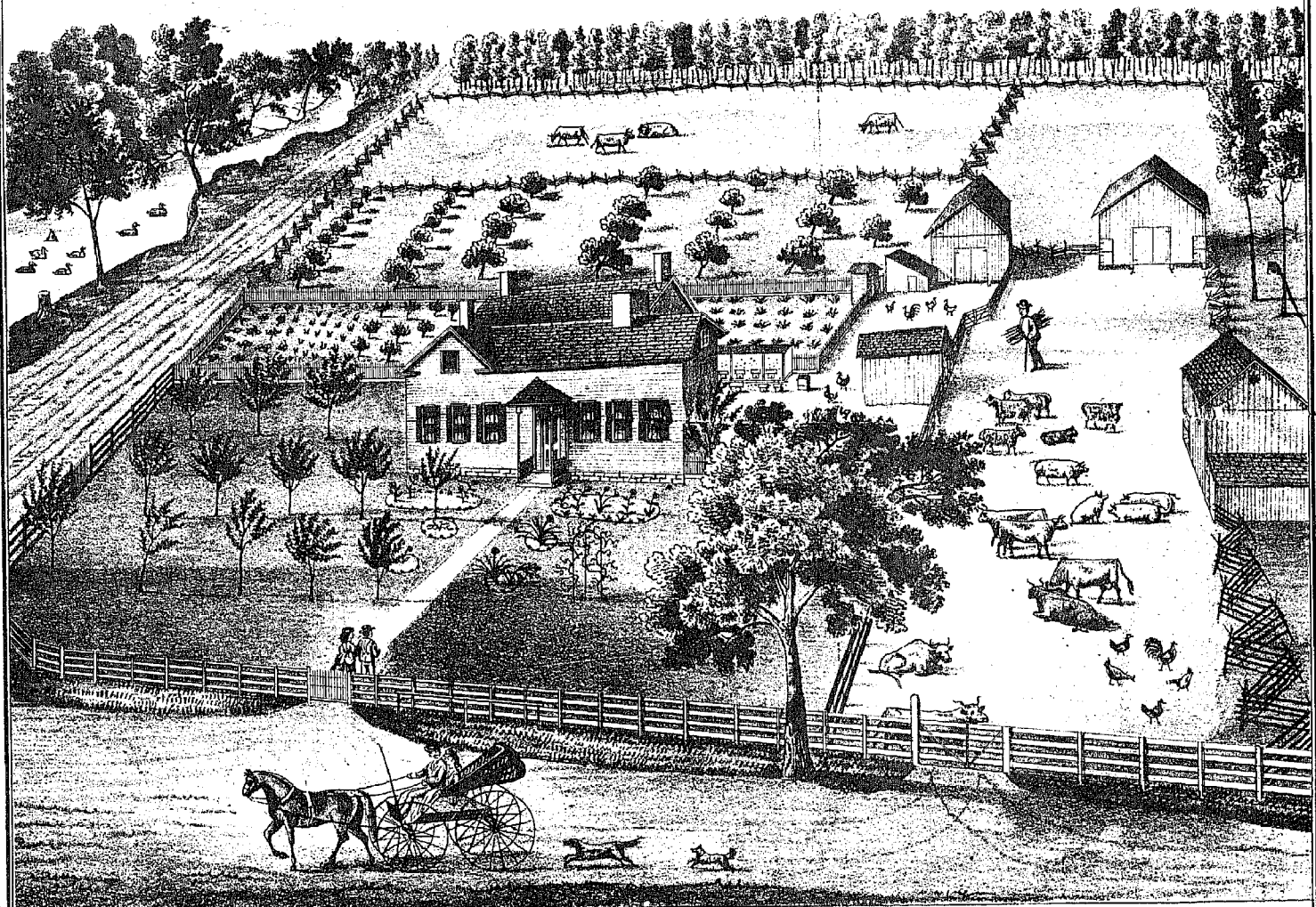
FARM & RESIDENCE OF CORNELIUS TROWBRIDGE, ESQ. YORK T^P, FULTON CO., OHIO.



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FARM & RESIDENCE OF **S.B. DARBY, Esq.**, FRANKLIN T^p, FULTON CO., OHIO.

In the year 1849 there arose a demand for a new county in Northwestern Ohio the projectors of which were such prominent men as Nathaniel Leggett, William Hall, A. C. Hough, Stephen Springer, Michael Handy and Mortimer D. Hibbard, to be composed of parts of Williams County, Henry County, and Lucas County; accordingly the necessary legislation was had, and in the Winter of 1850, February 28, the Legislature of Ohio set off and created into a new county, the following described territory. Beginning on the state line, between the States of Ohio and Michigan, at the northeast corner of township nine, south of range four, east of the Michigan Meridian; thence south on the township line, to the southeast corner of township ten, south of range four east, on the Fulton line; thence west on said Fulton line to the northeast corner of township eight north of range eight east; thence south to the southeast corner of section number twelve in township six, north of range eight, east of this survey; thence west on section line to the southwest corner of section number seven, in township six, range five, east on the county line between the counties of Henry and Williams; thence north on said line to the southeast corner of township seven, north of range four east; thence west on said township line to the southwest corner of section number thirty-five in said township seven north of range four east; (leaving the County of DeKalb intact) thence north on section line to the Fulton line (being the original line of the State of Michigan); to the southwest corner of section number eleven, in township ten south of range one west of the Michigan Meridian; thence north on section line to said state line, called the Harris line; thence easterly with said state line, to the place of beginning, and named the County of Fulton.

The greater portion of this territory was originally from Lucas County, when created into the new County of Fulton. The act of February 28, 1850, creating the County of Fulton, gave all civil and criminal suits, which were and should be pending in the Counties of Lucas, Henry, and Williams, on the first Monday in April, 1850, to the respective counties; and were to be prosecuted to final judgment in said counties as though the said County of Fulton had not been created. All justices of the peace were to hold their offices until their services expired, or until their successors were elected or commissioned for the County of Fulton.

All writs or other legal process were to be styled as of the County of Fulton, on and after the first day of April, 1850.

The legal voters residing within the limits of said county, were to assemble on the first Monday in April, 1850, to elect officers of the county to serve until the next annual election in October, 1850, and the courts were to be held in the Township of Pike, at some convenient house—(place to be designated by the associate judges of said county) until a permanent seat of justice should be established within and for the said county.

Laurance Dewey of Franklin County, Matthias H. Nichols of Allen County, and John Riley of Carroll County, were appointed by the Legislature of Ohio commissioners to fix and locate the seat of justice in said new County of Fulton. Pending said location, the associate judges, who were John Kendall, A. C. Hough, and William E. Partridge, fixed the courts at the house of Robert A. Howard. After the creation of the County of Fulton, until the change in the Constitution of Ohio, Nathaniel Leggett, John Kendall, Socrates H. Catley, Alfred C. Hough, Wm. E. Partridge, and H. W. Fickelinger, severally served as associate judges of the Court of Common Pleas.

The locating commissioners appointed by the Legislature of Ohio, in the Summer of 1850, came to the county for the purpose of designating the county seat, there being several points to them presented. The points named were: the center of county, Robert A. Howard's place, Rinn, Fuhatt's Corners, Delta, and Spring Hill. The commissioners, after carefully examining all the points presented, and hearing the statements of the citizens pro and con, decided upon the center of the county, and accordingly struck the stakes, and at the instance of D. W. H. Howard, named the place *Ottawa* (after an Indian chief of that name who once resided on the territory). After two months by the people of the county, the action of the commissioners were confirmed, and Ottawa was established as the seat of justice of the county, and suitable buildings were forthwith erected for the county offices and the holding of courts.

In 1852, the commissioners of the county caused to be built a large and commodious court house, and for a time Ottawa seemed to bid fair for a large county town, but the construction of the Michigan Southern and Northern Indiana Railroad, to check its growth, and Wauseon became a prominent railroad point in the county, four miles south of Ottawa, and thereafter was a rival for the county seat.

In the Winter of 1864 the Legislature of Ohio passed an act fixing the seat of justice at Delta, and the submission of the question to a vote of the people, which in October of said year was largely defeated. During the contest between Delta and Ottawa the court house was burned, together with all the records of the county; the fire occurred about midnight of July 15 and 16, 1864, and was supposed to be the work of an incendiary. That same season the commissioners constructed a brick building for the officers of the county, and on December 7 of the same year, the several officers of the county took possession.

In the Summer of 1863, the commissioners caused to be erected a new court house of brick.

In the Winter of 1868, another enabling act was passed by the Legislature of Ohio, fixing the seat of justice at Wauseon. At the October election of 1869, the people decided by a very small majority upon removal; whereupon in the Spring of 1870, the Commissioners of Fulton County, to wit: Joseph M. of Franklin, A. B. Simon of York, and Milton McCaskey of Fulton, fixed upon the present site and commenced the building of the court house at Wauseon, which was completed and devoted ready for occupancy, January, 1872, and all public records, etc., were removed from Ottawa to Wauseon in that month and year.

The townships of Fulton County were all organized by the Commissioners of Lucas County, excepting the Township of York, which had its organization before the erection of Lucas County.

In the earlier history of this territory it was all organized under the title of York Township. Swan Creek was the first organized township aside from York. It was organized somewhere about 1830 or 1835, and was then composed of town seven, north range eight east, and the whole of town eight, north range eight east; and in 1850 two tiers of sections from Henry County, town six, north range eight east, were added to Swan Creek.

Clinton Township was organized at a later period, as early as 1846, from York Township, and was, at its organization composed of town seven, north range six east, and town eight, north range six east, and in 1850, received two tiers of sections from Henry County, town six, north range six east.

German Township was organized about the same time as Clinton, and was composed of town seven, north range five east, and town eight, north range five east, and in 1850 there was added from Henry County two tiers of sections from the north part of town six, north range five east, and from Williams County, the east part of township seven, north range four east.

Franklin Township was organized in 1848, comprising all of town ten, south range one east of the Michigan Meridian, then belonging to Gorham, and all of town eight, north range five east, and one tier of sections of the north side of town seven, north range five east, then belonging to German.

Dover Township was organized in the Spring of 1843, comprising all of town ten, south range two east, then belonging to Chesterfield, and all of town eight, north

range seven east, and one tier of sections from the north side of town seven, north range six east, then called Clinton.

Pike Township was organized some where about 1840, of town ten, south range three east, and one tier of sections of the south side of town nine, south range three east, north of Fulton line, and all of town eight, north range seven east, and one tier of sections of the north side of town seven, north range seven east.

Fulton Township was organized about the same time, from town ten, south range four east, and one tier of sections of the south side of town nine, south range four east, north of Fulton line, also the whole of town eight, north range eight east, and one tier of sections from the north side of town seven, north range eight east.

The Township of Chesterfield was organized in 1837, composed of town ten, south range one and two east, and town nine, south range one and two east, south of the present state line of Michigan.

Gorham was organized in 1838, from the Township of Chesterfield, and was composed of township nine, south range one east, south of the state line, and town ten, south range one east, and in 1850, was added lots A, B, and C, of sections six, seven, eighteen, nineteen, thirty and thirty-one, the west half fractional and two tiers of sections of the east part of town nine, south range one west of the Michigan Meridian, south of the state line from Williams County.

Royalton Township was organized in or about 1840, and embraced the territory originally, of town nine, south range three east, and township ten, south range three east.

Amboy Township was organized the same time, and embraced town nine, south range four east, and town ten, south range four east.

The Territory of Gorham was first settled in 1833, by Levi Crawford and Gorham Correll, and soon after by Eliza A. Baker, Freeman Coffin, and Lucius Ford. Several other families shortly after came into the town, so that in 1840, Gorham had a fair population. It was settled by an industrious and enterprising population, first from the New England States, afterwards from New York, and stands to day the foremost township in the county in point of agricultural industry. In 1870 it had a population of 1,655. It has not many incidents to mark its personal history.

Chesterfield was settled about the same time with Gorham, by Alfred C. Hough, Samuel Gillis, and Robert Clemens. It, like Gorham, was settled by New Englanders and York State people, and had in 1870 a population of 996. The most remarkable feature of the township is its extensive sand openings. It is rising in agricultural power.

Royalton was first settled by Eli Phillips, Jenks Morey, and the family of Richardson. It has personal incidents that are historic. Eli Phillips was the first settler in the new Fulton County; was born in Adams Township, Berkshire County, Massachusetts, December 18, 1806. He, with his father's family, moved to Mendon, Wayne County, 1823, where his father died, 1824, which left the care of the family on the said Eli. December 25, 1829, married Yestia Arnold, and in the Spring of 1832 came to Michigan upon disputed territory, which is now owned by Ohio, and entered his land at the Detroit agency, and on the 10th day of June, 1833, entered upon his land where he now lives, called Phillips' Corners. His first business was to erect a shanty, which he did, 12x18, covered with bark. The trials and privations of his early pioneer life is better told in his own words: "I brought with me one barrel of pork and one of flour. On arrival I bought a cow, which took my last dollar; my cow ran away in about two weeks, and it was two months before I found her, near Waterville, on the Maumee River. You may think it was some lonesome time Summer with pork and bread for breakfast, bread for dinner, and the same for supper; no vegetables whatever were found on the table; we used two pounds of sugar that Summer. I cleared that season about one and one-half acres of land; sowed it to wheat; the birds harvested more than I did. After sowing my wheat, went to work building a log house, did not get into it until snow fell; could get no board for a chamber floor; put on a shako roof; could on any clear night lay in bed and see the stars and moon through the cracks of the roof. My wife cooked out of doors that Summer and Fall, until it was so cold she froze her feet. My nearest place of trade was east eighteen miles, to Sylvania; twenty miles south, to Providence, on the Maumee River; fifteen and a half miles north to Adrian. It was seventy miles west to our nearest neighbor." Here took place a struggle, in 1835, called "the Toledo War." Commissioners were appointed by the Governor of Ohio to run and mark the Harris line (now present line of the State of Michigan). The Michigan troops, under General Brown, of Tecumseh, met them at the said place; some guns were fired; no lives lost; a few of the troops of Ohio and the commissioners were taken prisoners, and confined in jail at Tecumseh, Lenawee County, Michigan. The line, however, was completed. Royalton comprises a territory of five farming lands, is wholly agricultural. It has now a population of eight hundred and seventy-one. Lyons, a fine prosperous village, is in this township.

Amboy was settled at a later period than Royalton. Sullivan Johnson, George Robinson, and David Duncan, were among its first settlers. It has nothing worthy of historic note. It is a heavily timbered township of land, generally level, wholly agricultural. Metamora is the only village in the township; it commenced its existence about 1844, situated near the northeast corner of the township, on the old Vandalia road (commonly called the Territorial road, cut out by the Government of the United States from Toledo to the east line of the State of Indiana.) It had in 1870 a population of one thousand and eighty-nine.

Fulton was settled at the same time with Amboy, of which it once formed a part. Among its early settlers were J. W. Harter, J. Teasworth, John Stair, Levi Merrill, and Nicholas, old man Dowling, and Samuel Dargin. It was rapidly settled, and in 1870 had a population of one thousand three hundred and twenty-eight. It is a township of rich agricultural land, and in time is destined to take the first rank in agricultural power. It now has two quite important villages, Al and Swanton.

Pike Township had for its early settlers D. W. H. Howard, Whitfield Tappan, George Wiers, and Peter Salisbury. It is a township diversified in the features of its soil and timber, the western part being sand openings, and the eastern part timbered. It is without historic note. It had in 1870 a population of eight hundred and seventy-eight.

Dover Township was settled at a very early date. Mortimer D. Hibbard, Jacob Hoffman, J. J. Schall, Moses Ayers, N. Bennett, Elijah Bennett, and Peter Lott were among its first settlers. Peter Lott and wife are now inmates of the Fulton County Infirmary. It has two small villages, Ottawa, formerly the county seat, and Spring Hill. The Fulton County Infirmary, located here, was established in 1874, and opened May 2, 1874. Alvin B. Verity was the first superintendent, and has charge of the poor at this date. The unoccupied court house, jail, and offices, were remodelled for the infirmary, and has a farm attached of three hundred and six acres. In 1870 it had a population of nine hundred and thirty. The township is wholly opening land and quite fertile. It is wholly agricultural.

Franklin Township was settled at quite an early date—record says in 1835, by John Shaffer, Asher Bird, Adam Forreman, S. B. Darby, and John McLaughlin, with others, in 1836. It is almost wholly on the rich alluvial bottoms of Swan Creek (known as Timm River). It was a heavy wooded township. Ransom Reynolds and Polonia Crandall were the first white persons married on said territory. Joseph Ely settled in 1847 in Franklin. Among its personal incidents is a bit of the history of a sister of John McLaughlin's, who, on her wedding day, done a large washing, shelled a bushel of corn, took it to the corn upon her head and footed it to bed's mill got it ground, and carried it back as she came home, two and a half

miles, made it into a pudding, and was married in the evening to a man by the name of Reynolds. Our young women of this day, if called upon to endure the hardships of that early pioneer life in getting married, I fear but few would be found of sufficient courage to undertake the task. Such women will ever be found maintaining the character of true heroic Christian women, commanding the love and respect of all their acquaintances. It is a rich agricultural township, has taken the hardest kind of toll to remove its forest and drain its land. In 1870 it had a population of nine hundred and ninety-nine.

German was settled at an early date. George Kibler, Jacob Bender, ——— Lamb, and J. S. Fleet were among the first, and so unassuming were the first settlers of this township in their social intercourse with each other, when they had nothing but rustic seats and bedsteads for their household furniture, that the introduction of more polished cabinet ware from the East by the friends of A. S. Fleet to his house, his former social circle of friends became offended, and refused to sit in his chairs; thought he was going up in the world, putting on too much pride, etc., and from that time the social feelings of the neighbors began to wane. German is a rich agricultural township, soil heavy clay, and requires a large amount of underdrainage. It is capable of supporting a large population; it has fifty-two whole sections of land, and with its villages had in 1870 a population of two thousand four hundred and seventy-nine, almost exclusively German, with a slight sprinkling of French. No township of the county has a more industrious population than German. Its most important village is Archbold; in 1870 had a population of three hundred and seventy-three.

Clinton Township was settled some where about 1836. Among its first settlers were John Lozore, Eliza Williams, Avery Lamb, and Eliza Huntington. It now contains forty-two sections of land, and is a rich agricultural district. The rapidity of its settlement in these early days was not as marked as some other townships in the county—this energy and enterprise was wanting in its first settlement, and until the railroad built the Town of Wauseon, and by force of circumstances Wauseon became the market town of the county, that then, and not till then, did Clinton put on the air of prosperity and assume a relation of equality with German, Chesterfield, and Royalton on the north. Wauseon, since 1872, has been the county seat. It now has a striving and prosperous population, in 1870, of one thousand four hundred and seventy-four. It is truly the market town of the county, and to-day is the purchaser of two-thirds of the produce of the county. It has an easy outlet by rail to Toledo, and must ever remain the principal market town to this large agricultural district. It was first laid out in 1854 by Nathaniel Leggett, E. L. Barber, and ——— Sargent. Clinton Township, with Wauseon, had a population in 1870 of three thousand two hundred and thirty-five.

York Township was settled about 1836, and among its first settlers were William Trevelick, Eliza Trevelick, James Trevelick, Thomas Wardley, John Harrison, Peter and Samuel Schlappl, and James McQuitting and others. It now contains forty-two sections of land. It, like Clinton, is not marked by a rapid settlement. It is a township of exceedingly fertile soil, and is capable of supporting a large population. It is the oldest township in the county. It required efforts to settle and develop; surface level, and it made up principally of clay soil. It has one quite important village, Delta, the oldest town in the county. Here was first established a Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons in the county. Delta had a population in 1870 of seven hundred and fifty-three. It is now the second commercial center of the county. York Township, including Delta, in 1870 had a population of two thousand two hundred and ninety-nine. It, in 1836, had jurisdiction over the entire territory which was once included in Lucas County.

Swan Creek was first settled about 1835, and among some of the first, Socrates H. Catley, Thomas Gleason, Nathaniel Leggett, Arley Ney, Louman Hall, and David Williams. It is composed of forty-two sections of land. The northern part is quite heavy timbered and rich soil, and is now well settled. The southern part is what may be denominated opening land, and has been considered the poorest township of land in the county, but since the people have called to their aid the law upon alluvial lands, have removed much of the surface water. It is now taking rank with the other townships in production, and bids fair to be unequalled by the others. It has no village of any size, all village points being just out of its borders. In 1870 it had a population of one thousand one hundred.

Many names of early settlers in this county here mentioned have removed to other localities; some have "passed to that bourne from whence no traveler returns"; a few yet remain who are identified in some manner with the business interests of the county.

This county was organized April 1, 1850. It is now a part of the sixth congressional district of the state, forms with Hancock, Henry, Lucas, Putnam, and Wood, the thirty-third state senatorial district, and is a separate representative district.

The population of the county now contains a large number of thirty German, many industrious French, with a slight sprinkling of Irish and Indians. In 1870 the whole population was seventeen thousand seven hundred and eighty-nine. The railroad facilities of this county are the growth of but a few years. The Air Line, from Toledo to Chicago, in this county, was constructed in 1854. The Canada Southern, in 1873, and a road led for the Cold Water and Mansfield, was completed in 1875.

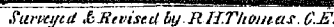
This county, in 1873, raised 258,892 bushels of wheat; 505,354 bushels of corn; 291,001 bushels of oats; 40 bushels of barley; 1,113 bushels of rye; 7,745 bushels of buckwheat; 89,075 bushels of potatoes; 820 bushels of sweet potatoes; 15,033 tons of hay (timothy); 9,712 tons of clover hay; 5,081 bushels of clover seed; 1,020 pounds of tobacco; 553,325 pounds of butter; 589,838 pounds of cheese; 83 pounds of sorghum sugar, and 2,058 gallons of syrup; 508 pounds of maple sugar, and 238 gallons of syrup.

It sheared 111,422 pounds of wool; raised 230,414 bushels of apples; 485 bushels of pears; 480 pounds of grapes, and manufactured 23 gallons of wine.

This county is made up from two surveys, namely Ohio and one by Michigan. The Ohio survey runs to what is called the Fulton line, and the United States survey for Michigan includes the territory north of said line, and is so called by the name of the man who ran it, which was in 1823. Said line so established was based upon the ordinance of 1787, which established the Northwestern Territory, with the privilege of forming two or more states north of an east and west line drawn through the southern extreme of Lake Michigan, east to the most northernmost point or cape of Maumee Bay. The maps of that day represented Lake Michigan as not running as far south as it actually did, which, during the sitting of the convention that formed the first constitution of Ohio, was discovered by a trapper from the lakes, and made known to that body, who represented that an east and west line, drawn from the southernmost extreme of said lake would not touch Lake Erie at all, but at an east and west line would strike Lake Erie south of the said north cape of Maumee Bay, then a line should be run from the south extreme of Lake Michigan in the north cape of Maumee Bay. This caused a new line to be run, called the Harris line, which caused the disturbance in 1835 between Ohio and Michigan, and led to what is called the "Toledo War." Michigan claimed the territory to the Fulton line by the ordinance of 1787, and Ohio, by her constitution. The same was settled by the Congress of the United States, in 1836, during the last term of the administration of Andrew Jackson, President of the United States. Ohio, at the time, gained this demand and assumed jurisdiction.

PERSONAL HISTORIES.

CLINTON TOWNSHIP.

Hon. JAMES H. SHERWOOD, son of Aaron and Maria (Yeomans) Sherwood, the former of Bridgeport, the latter of New York City, was born in Dutchess County, New York, November 4, 1827. He was married in 1861 to Samantha Yates, daughter of William Yates, one of the early pioneers of Williams County, Ohio. Mrs. Sherwood was born in 1831. They have a family of six children, Jennie, Walter A., Maria, deceased, Willie, Anna and Lulu. Mr. Sherwood settled in Fulton County in 1862. Mr. Sherwood had one brother, Isaac Sherwood, in the 11th Regt. O. V. I., in the war of 1861-5. He first served as colonel and afterwards was breveted brigadier-general. Post-office, Wauseon. Business, editor *Northwestern Republican*.

Hon. ALBERT B. SMITH was born in Trumbull County, Ohio, July 15, 1849. His parents were Philander W. Smith, born in New York, who died in 1861, and Martha A. (Freer) Smith, of New York, who died in 1868. Mr. Smith settled in Fulton County in 1859. He enlisted at Wauseon August 2, 1861, in Co. H, 100th Regt. O. V. I. (having served three months previous to this in the 14th Regt. O. V. I.) In September, 1861, he was promoted to first sergeant, in December, 1861, to second lieutenant, and again in February, 1873, to first lieutenant, in August following to captain Co. E., and immediately transferred to Co. H, and breveted major in June, 1865, and lieutenant-colonel in August following, which position he held when war closed. Post-office, Wauseon. Business, associate editor *Northwestern Republican*.

Hon. WILLIAM H. HANDY, son of Michael Handy and Mary A. Bryant, of New York, who settled in Fulton County in 1840, was born in Fulton County, Ohio, January 29, 1817. He was married in Otsego, Ohio, to Isabella, daughter of John and Marietta Van Arsdale, who was born in Wyandott County, Ohio, from whence her parents removed and settled in Fulton County in 1865. This couple have two children, Harry L. and Clive C. Charles F. Handy, brother of the above, belonged to Co. A, 67th Regt. O. V. I., in the war of 1861-5. At the time of his discharge he was captain of the company. William Handy enlisted during the same war in Co. H, 86th Regt. O. V. I., served eight months and received a discharge. Immediately after he joined Co. A, 67th Regt., O. V. I., and served until October 1, 1865, and took part in a number of important battles. Post-office, Wauseon. Business, editor *Democrat Express*.

J. G. ELY was born in Knox County, April 1, 1834. He was married in Fulton County November 12, 1857, to Sarah Masters, who was born in Warren County, Ohio, August 1, 1837. They have a family of four children, Charles S., born March 7, 1859, Alice May, born February 19, 1864, Luella, born February 14, 1871, and George M., born August 3, 1873. George and Elizabeth (Poley) Ely, parents of L. G. Ely, were both natives of Pennsylvania. The former was born in 1812, the latter in 1816. They reside in Williams County, Ohio. The parents of Mrs. Ely are Ezekiel and Mary Masters, both deceased. They settled in Fulton County in 1845. Mr. Ely settled in Fulton County in 1858, has filled the office of justice of the peace twelve years previous to his election as county auditor, in which office he is now serving his third term. George W. Ely, brother of the subject of this sketch, belonged to Co. C, 100th Regt. O. V. I., in the late war of the rebellion. He enlisted in 1862, and was instantly killed in the battle of Atlanta, by a ball passing through the heart. Post-office, West Unity. Business, County Auditor.

JAMES S. BRAILEY is a son of Moses and Sarah (Maxon) Brailey, of Buffalo, New York, who were born in 1817 and 1823, and settled in Swan Creek Township in 1858. He was born in Huron County, Ohio, December 22, 1849. He was married in Fulton County, Ohio, December 29, 1870, to Iona P., daughter of Orra and Catherine (Gordon) Marsh, born in Lucas County, Ohio, October 16, 1847. Their children are Albert C., born April 1, 1869, Freddie E., born May 3, 1872. James Taylor, (deceased) brother of Richard, was in the war of 1861-5 one year. Mr. Taylor was elected county recorder in 1872. Post-office, Wauseon. Business, County Recorder.

RICHARD TAYLOR was born in Canandaigua, Ontario County, New York, July 1, 1838, settled with his parents, Henry and Sarah (Constock) Taylor, in Fulton County, Ohio, in 1863. He was married at Ottosee June 13, 1864, to Cora E., daughter of Julius and Evaline (Gordon) Marsh, born in Lucas County, Ohio, October 16, 1847. Their children are Albert C., born April 1, 1869, Freddie E., born May 3, 1872. James Taylor, (deceased) brother of Richard, was in the war of 1861-5 one year. Mr. Taylor was elected county recorder in 1872. Post-office, Wauseon. Business, County Recorder.

O. M. KEITH, son of Caleb Keith, born in New Hampshire, December, 1777, died February 14, 1858, and Patsy (Stickland) Keith, of Vermont, born in January, 1784, died December 13, 1852, who were born in Huron County, Ohio, August 11, 1817. He was married in Morenci, Michigan, February 26, 1858, to Sarah E. Gardner, born in Erie County, Ohio, February 7, 1835. 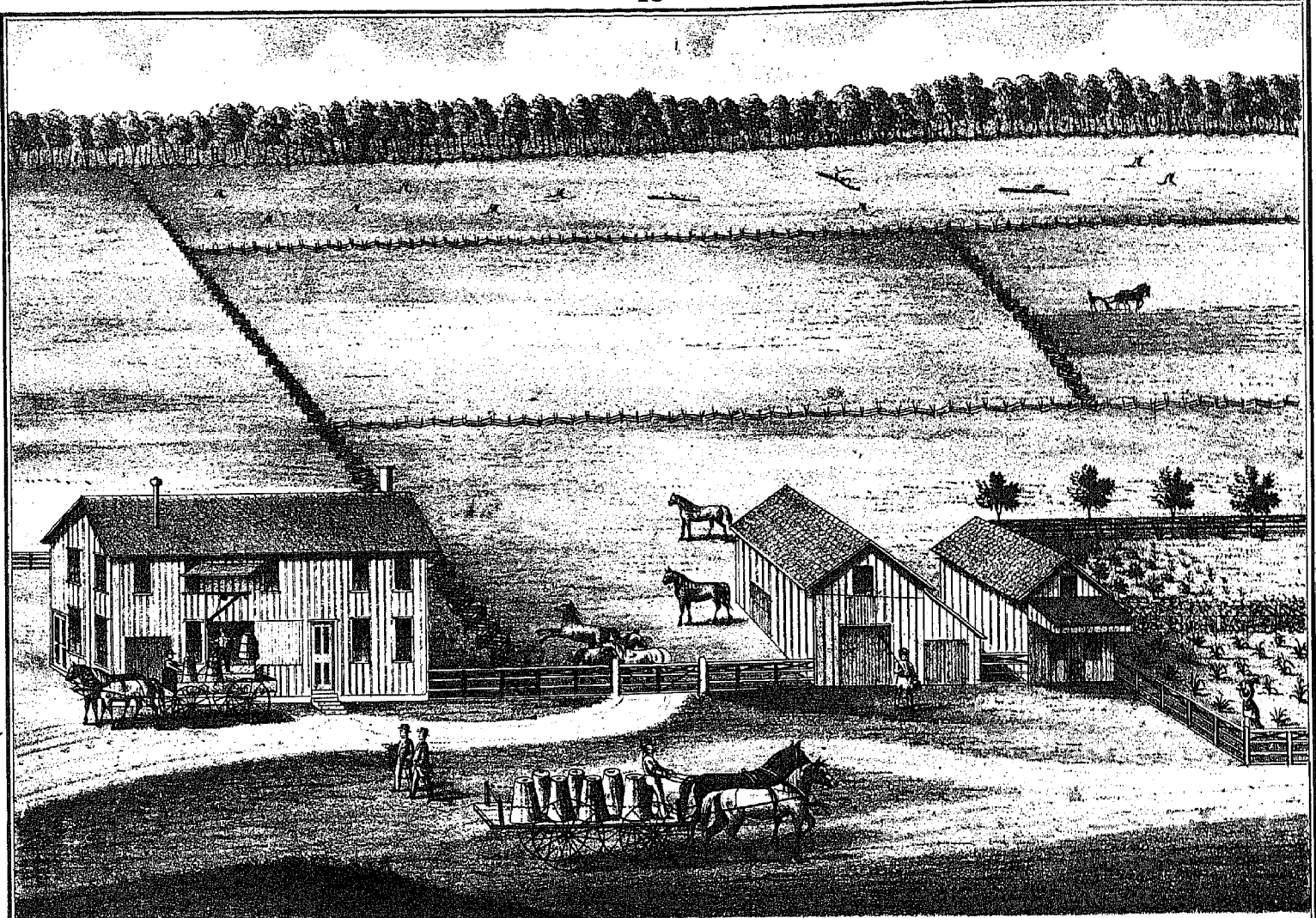

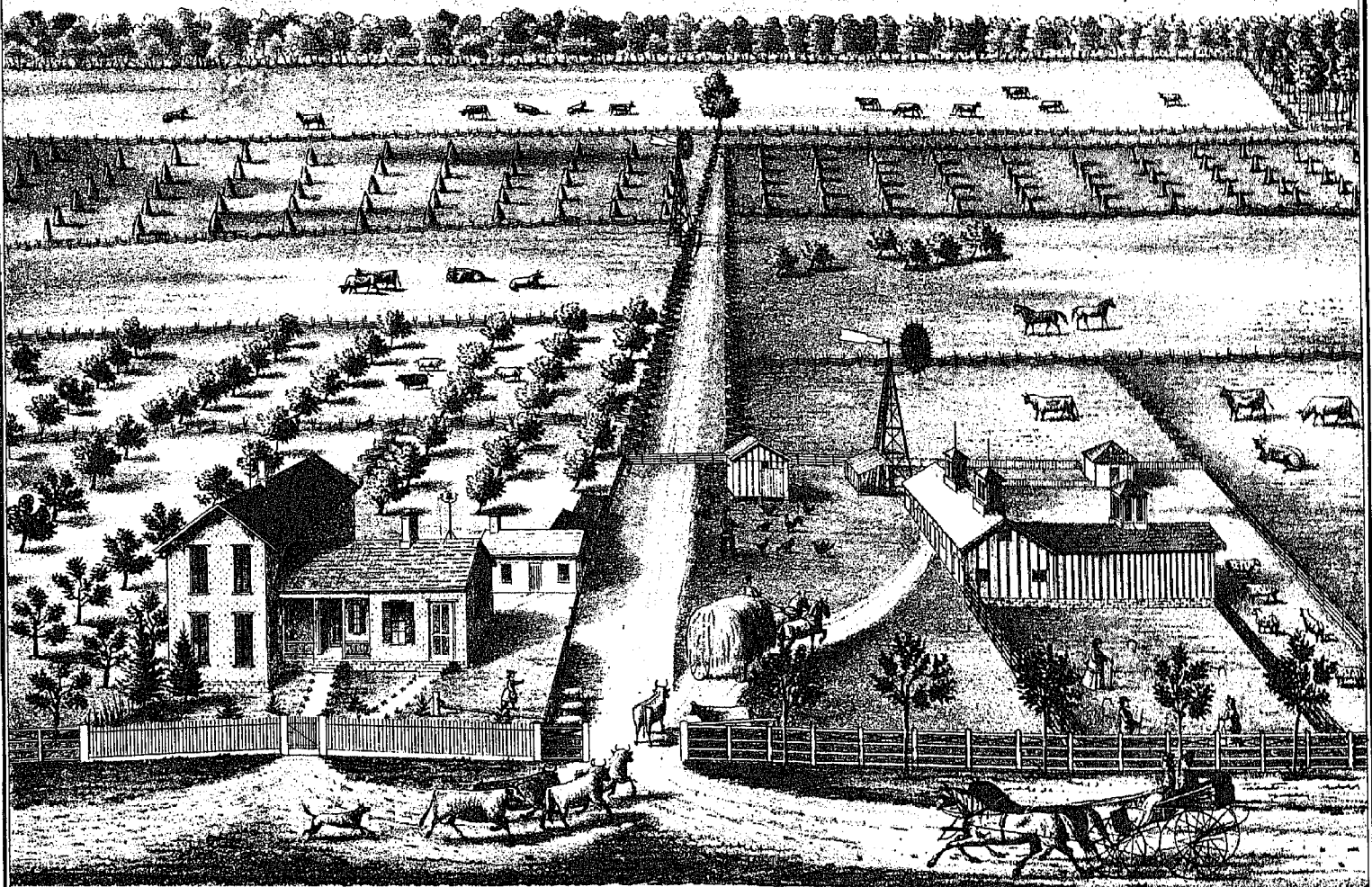

DAVID B. ALLEN and his wife, Maria (Terry) Allen, were born in Connecticut; the former in East Windsor, March 1, 1809; the latter in Enfield, Hartford County, January 1, 1810. They were married in Connecticut, May 7, 1831. Their children are: Mabel M., Elizabeth H., Amelia B., Loretta W., Mary F. (died September 18, 1871), Harriet G. (died October 6, 1848) and Julia A. (died July 17, 1870). Daniel and Submit Allen, parents of David B., were born in Connecticut; the former died in 1847, the latter in 1857. He traveled over five states, viz.: Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, Ohio and Indiana, making observations as a practical bee keeper, for he became at the age of fourteen years, the owner of a colony of bees, in a log gum, and has ever since been experimenting in that line. After trying many patent hives, in the year 1868 he improved and adopted the Langstroth movable comb hive, which he introduced with the greatest success wherever he traveled. For the last ten years he has made a specialty of this business, and has been engaged in raising queens for fifteen years. He settled in Napoleon, Henry County, Ohio, in 1874, and introduced the *Italian Bees*, and his improved frame. He located at Pleasant Grove Ashtabula, where he keeps from fifty to sixty stocks of Italian bees. At least 2,000 of his hives are in use in Henry and adjoining counties. He is now President of the Beekeepers' Association of the Western States, which was elected in 1875, and which society holds its next annual meeting at Philadelphia, on the Centennial grounds, October 25, 1876.

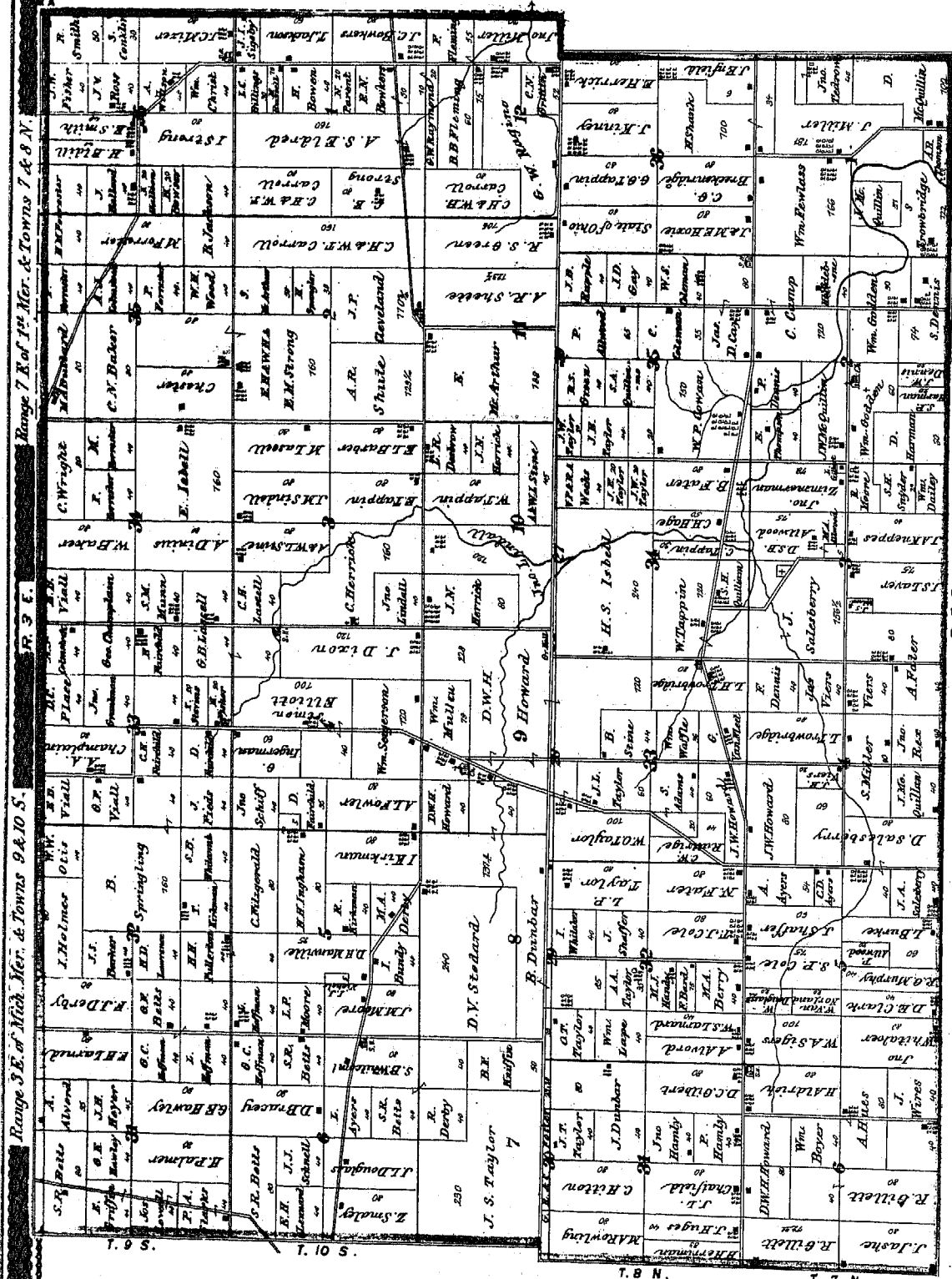

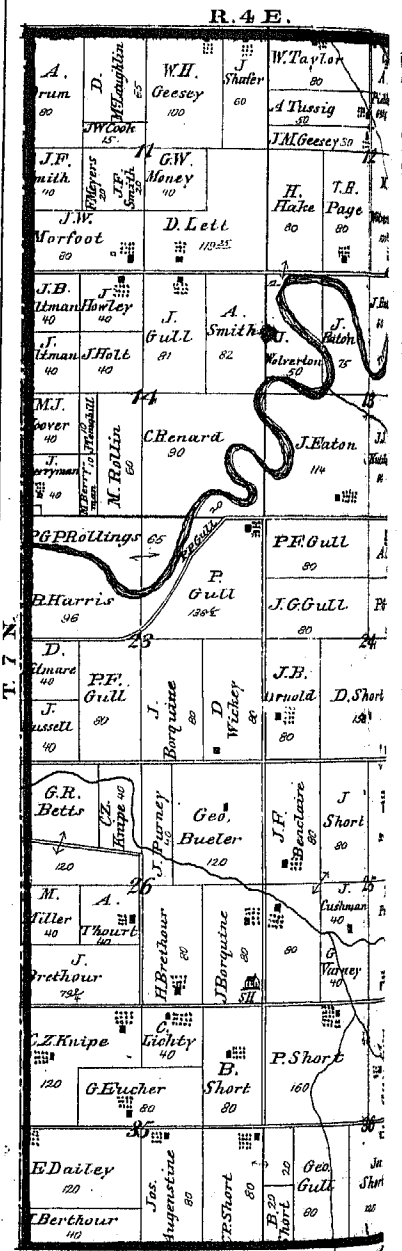

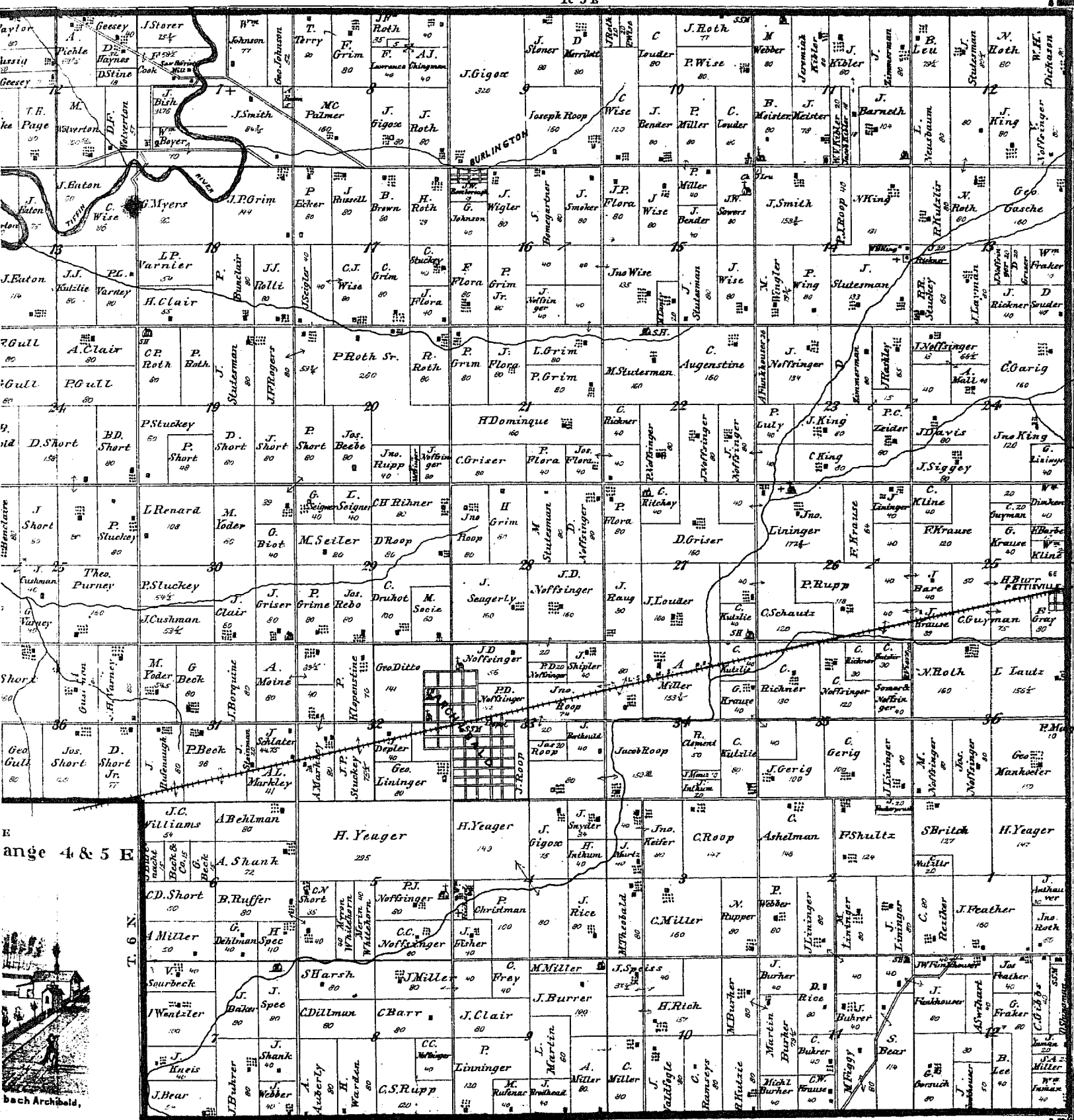
MAP OF PIKE TOWNSHIP



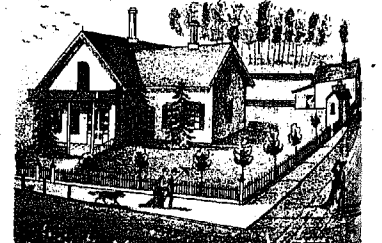
Range 7 N. Mer. & Towns 7 & 8 N.

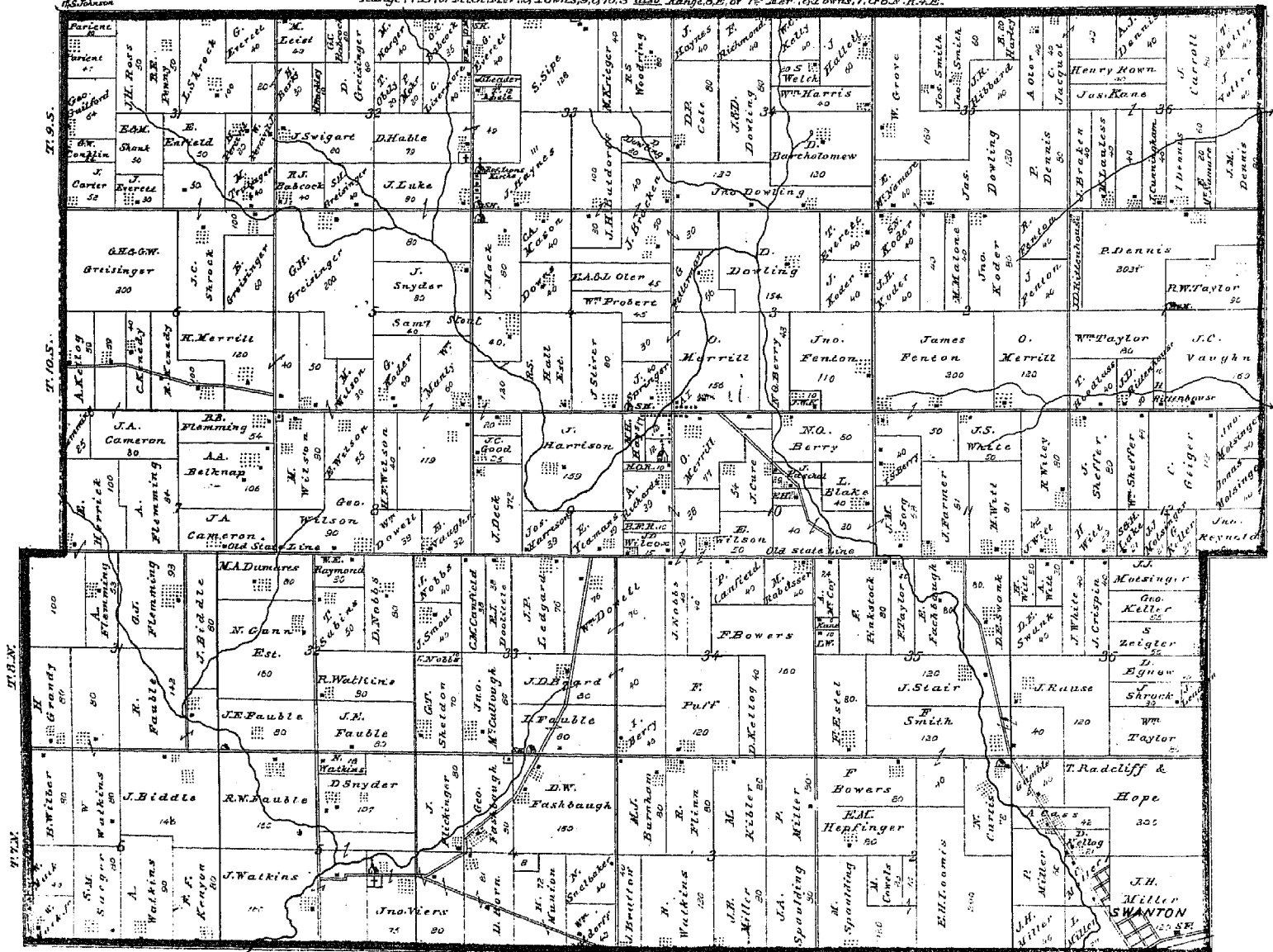

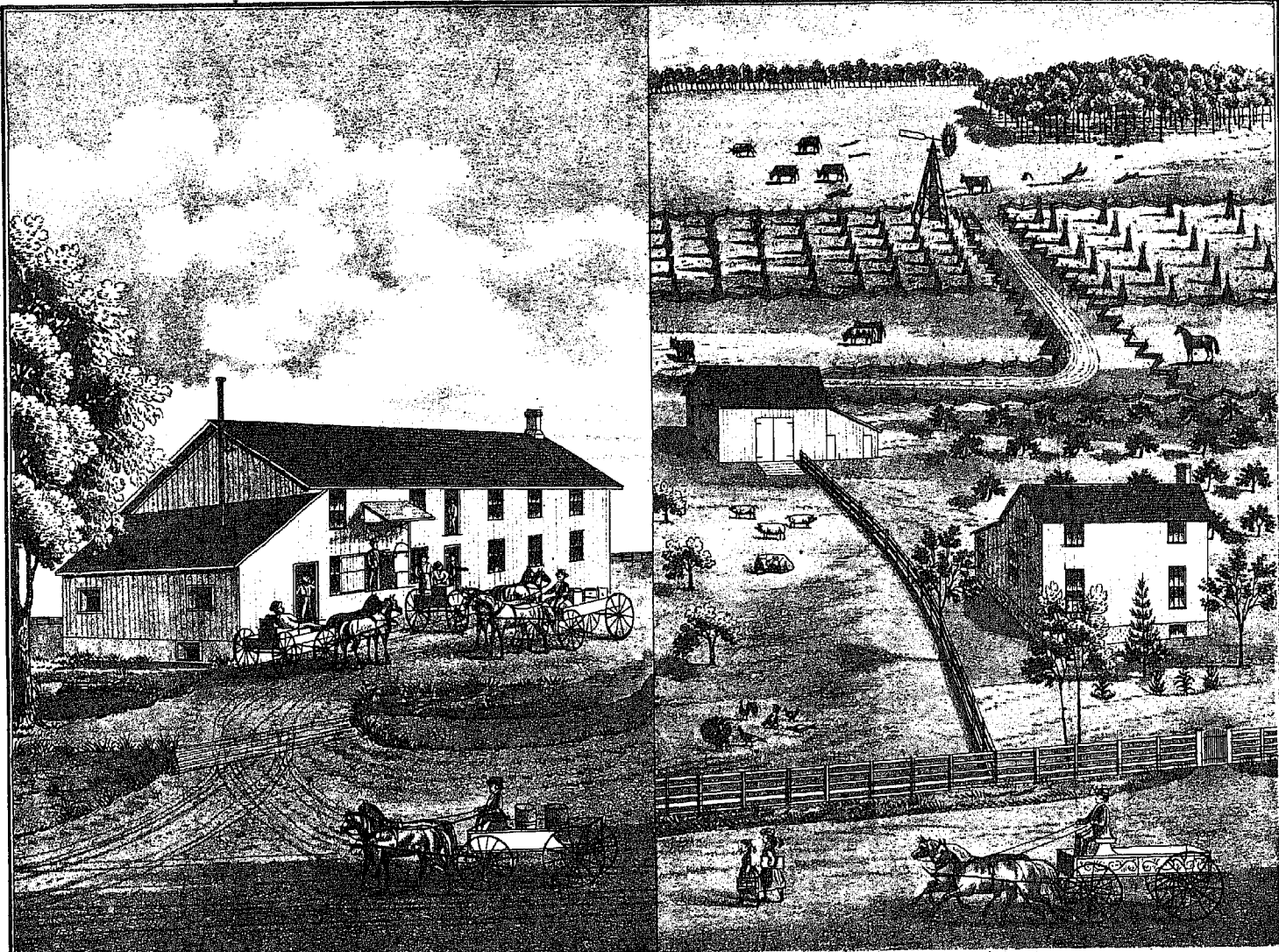
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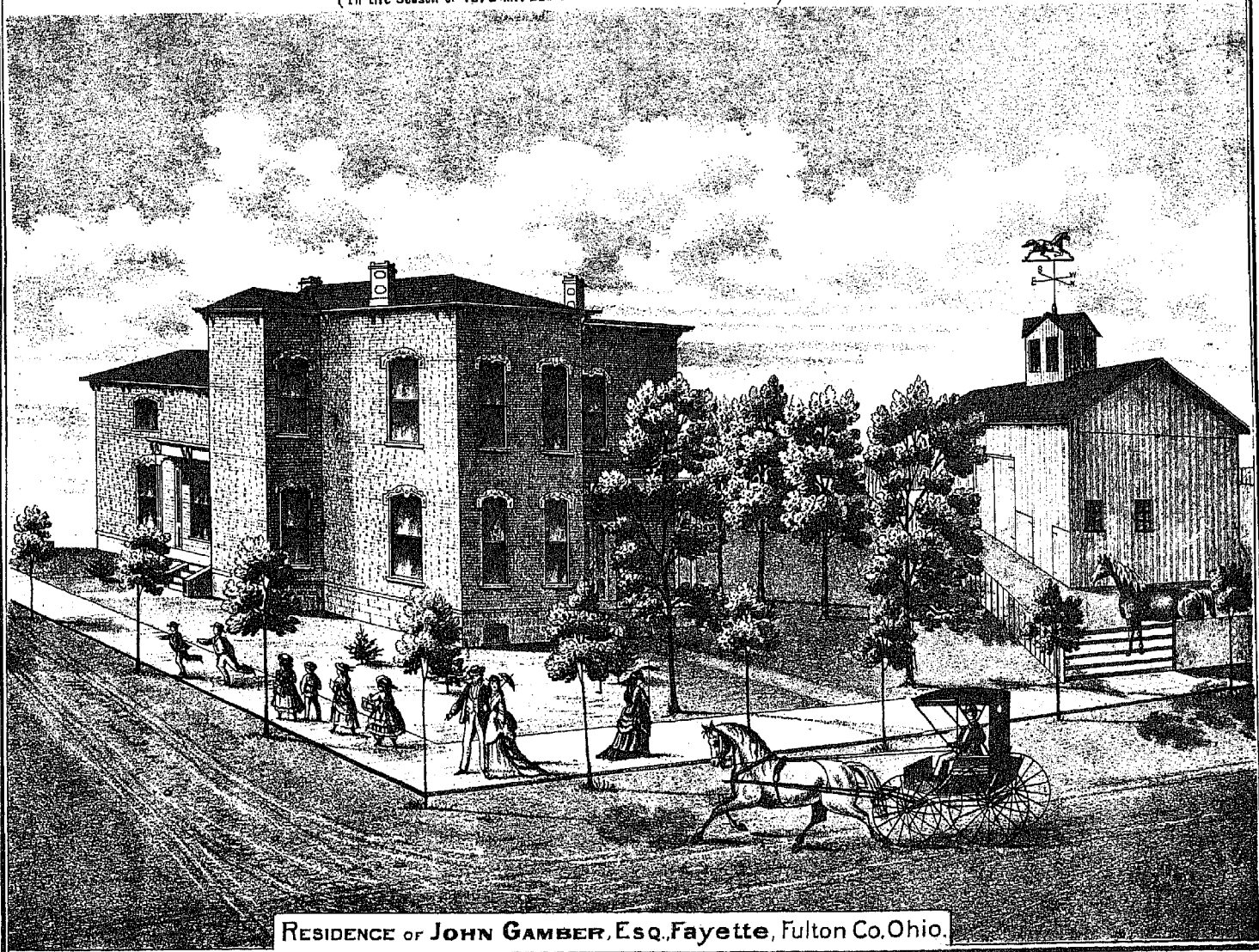

Wood, daughter of David and Edith Wood, the former of New York, and the latter of Massachusetts, who was born in Royalton Township, Fulton County, April 22, 1842. Their children are: David L., Zurella and Alva. Samuel Clark belonged to the first Michigan Engineers and Mechanics, in the war of the Rebellion, served two and a half years, was in the battles of Shiloh, Mill Springs, Ky., and others, and was honorably discharged at the close of the war. Post-office, Lyons. Business, minister and carpenter.

CHARLES E. TROY, and his wife, Elizabeth Troupe, were born in England, the former in Hull, Yorkshire, May, 1818, the latter in Cornwall. They were also married in London, England, October 12, 1867. Their children are: Amelia, born in Missouri, April 1, 1870; Frederick, born in Fulton County, Ohio, March 17, 1873, and Charles E., born February 16, 1875, at Lyons, Fulton Township. Charles E. Troy, son, father of the above, was born in England in 1820, and died in the same country. His mother, Amelia (Plumb) Troy, was born in England, April 1, 1821, and died there in 1852. John and Eleanor Troupe, parents of Mrs. Troy, were born, the former in England, the latter in Missouri. Mr. Troy came from England in 1866. He has two brothers and two sisters: William T. resides in Persia, Asia; Edward C. and Elizabeth Stevens reside in London, and Marian (Whitlock), who resides in Essex County, England. Post-office, Lyons. Business, carriage-maker.

DANIEL S. PHILLIPS, son of Eli and Vesty Phillips, was born in Royalton, Fulton County, Ohio, January 21, 1840. He was married March 21, 1864, to Lizzie L. Drew, daughter of Horace and Clara Drew, who was born in Vermont, October 7, 1818. They have one son, Perry E., born August 10, 1866. Mr. Phillips' father was the first settler in Fulton County. Post-office, Lyons. Business, hotel keeper.

B. M. ROBINSON was born in Dutchess County, New York, March 1, 1812. He settled in Fulton County in 1830, and was married the first time in New York, in 1834, to Sallie A. Cole, of New York. The fruit of this union was five children: Marvin E., Sarah, James, Emma, (deceased), and Hannah. Mr. Robinson was married a second time, June 16, 1853, to Caroline (Carpenter) Foster, of New York. They had three children: Malon W., born March 8, 1857; Emma, (deceased); Cassius C., born February 22, 1859. A third marriage took place September 10, 1865, to Julia Cone, of New York, who died a short time after, and Mr. Robinson was married a fourth time, to Alice A. Shaffer, December 25, 1868. They have one child, Alice A., born September 30, 1871. Mr. Robinson enlisted in the Union army, Company 1, 6th Regiment O. V. I., March 1, 1861, served eleven months, and was honorably discharged. James K., son of the above, enlisted in the same regiment, and served four years. Marvin enlisted in the 100-day service. Mr. Robinson's father was in the Toledo war, called out by General Brown. Post-office, Lyons. Business, farming, section 21.

GEORGE W. WELSH, son of William and Ruth (Orcutt) Welsh, the former of Long Island, the latter of Connecticut, was born in Montgomery County, New York, October 13, 1804. He was married in Niagara County, New York, May 8, 1824, to Mary (Thompson) and Susan Whiting, the former of Vermont, the latter of Connecticut, both of whom are deceased. She was born in Ontario County, New York, June 11, 1808. They had eleven children: Susan, born April 9, 1825; Ruth, born July 21, 1827, died April 3, 1852; Thomas W., born August 8, 1829; Emeline, born November 1, 1834; Butler R., born August 12, 1837; Martha, died July 20, 1866; Alvin, born in 1841, died March 21, 1857; Elias, born January 6, 1843; Addie, died January 4, 1874; Arden and Minerva, died in March, 1854. Elias Welsh enlisted in Company 1, 6th Regiment O. V. I., in 1861, served over three years, was always with the regiment, and was honorably discharged. Butler enlisted in the 100-day service, and served his time. Mr. Welsh has filled the several offices of township trustee, justice of the peace, township clerk, assessor, etc. Post-office, Lyons. Business, farmer and dairyman, section 15.

BENJAMIN DAVIS, Post-office, Lyons. Business, farmer. Native, New York. Settled in Fulton County in 1839, section 12.

A. H. JORDON was born in Windsor County, Vermont. He settled in Fulton County in 1834. Business, farmer and dairyman, section 30, Royalton Township.

ALPHUS FENNER was born in Berkshire County, Massachusetts, July 29, 1813, and married in Michigan, March 6, 1873, to Margaret McGurter, his present wife, who was born in Cuyahoga County, Ohio, July 17, 1817. They had five children: Polly Fitcher, by whom he had three children: Julia A., deceased; infant deceased; and William. The parents of Mr. Fenner were Anthony and Methenia (Aldrich) Fenner, the former born in New York, the latter in Massachusetts. Both died in the State of Ohio. The parents of Mrs. Fenner, Simon and Kate (Hitt) McGurter, were born in Cuyahoga County, Ohio, where the former still resides, at the age of 93. The latter died in 1857. Mr. Fenner settled in Fulton County in 1838, and was one of the pioneers of the county. He has filled the office of constable, and others of trust. Post-office, Lyons. Business, farmer and dairyman, section 10.

Col. ELI PHILLIPS was born in Berkshire County, Massachusetts, December 18, 1806. He was married in Wayne County, New York, December 25, 1828, to Vesta Arnold, daughter of Isaac and Rebecca Arnold, of Rhode Island, who was born in Wayne County, New York, September 24, 1809. The county at that time was a dense forest, inhabited by Indians and infested with wolves, wildcat, deer and other animals. Eli and Rebecca Phillips have a family of five children: B. F. Phillips, born March 6, 1830; Carrie A., born February 18, 1831; Edwin P., born August 25, 1836; Daniel S., born January 21, 1840; Albert G., born April 18, 1848, and Susan, deceased March 23, 1844. Amos and Rebecca (Sherman) Phillips, parents of the subject of this sketch, were born, the former in Rhode Island, the latter in Massachusetts. Both are deceased. The former died in New York, in 1824, the latter in Michigan. Col. E. Phillips was lieutenant-colonel of state militia, and fought the only battle of the Toledo war, in which no one was killed or wounded, only a few very badly scared. Post-office, Lyons. Business, farmer, section 10.

C. H. BARDEN was born in Berkshire County, Massachusetts, February 9, 1801. He was married to his present wife in Michigan, December 21, 1865. Mrs. Salinda Barden was a daughter of Silas and Louise (Butterfield) Allen, the former, born in New York, in 1779, died in Ohio in 1848; the latter, born in New York, died in Ohio, in 1811. Mrs. Barden was married to her first husband, J. C. Herrick, March 25, 1832. Their children were: Marinda, born November 27, 1834, died August 8, 1836; Salinda A., born August 21, 1837; Helen A., born January 15, 1841; Evaline D., born July 18, 1842; Origin B., born February 26, 1849. John and Hannah Herrick, parents of J. C. Herrick, were natives of Massachusetts. Mr. Barden had four sons in the war of the Rebellion. All were honorably discharged at the close of the war. Mrs. Barden settled in Fulton County in 1855. Post-office, Lyons. Business, farmer, section 13.

JAMES K. DODGE was born in Fulton County, Ohio, July 7, 1845. He was a son of Warren and Pernelia (Church) Dodge, of New York, who settled in Fulton County in 1834. They had a family of eleven children: Rufus, David B. (died in Andersonville prison), George

E. (deceased), Daniel B. and James K., Martha (deceased), Mary, Sarah (deceased), Sabry, Elizabeth and Delia. Davis B. belonged to the 100th Regiment, O. V. I., in the war of the rebellion, and served until he was taken prisoner. Post-office, Lyons. Business, farmer and dairyman, section 13.

JINKS M. YOUNG was born in Fulton County, Ohio, May 11, 1844, married in Michigan, July 3, 1864, to Evaline Herrick, daughter of John and Selinda Herrick, who was born in Fayette County, Ohio, July 18, 1842. Mr. Herrick died July 2, 1854. Jinks M. and Evaline Young have three children: Mary A., born July 11, 1865; Helen H., born January 7, 1867; Ann J., born November 16, 1869. Joshua and Mary Young, parents of Jinks M., died in Fulton County, in 1873 and 1862. They were among the first settlers of Fulton County. The subject of our sketch is the only surviving member of a family of nine children: Harriet, Edgar, Charlotte, Edwin, Joseph, Friend, William, Andrew and Jinks. Friend Young belonged to the 67th Regiment O. V. I., served nearly two years, and died of disease. Post-office, Lyons. Business, farmer and dairyman, section 26.

FREDERICK HOLT, son of Diedrich and Maria Holt, of Prussia, was born in Prussia, June 23, 1822, and moved to America in 1840. He settled in Rochester, New York, and soon enlisted in the Mexican war, served until his close, and was honorably discharged. He settled in Fulton County, Ohio, in 1842, where he was married, January 1, 1849, to Jane Gilmore, born in Erie County, Pennsylvania, May 1, 1834. Her parents, Ambrose and Mehtabel (Stebbins) Gilmore, were natives of New York, and died in Royalton Township, in 1865 and 1872. Frederick and Jane Holt had a family of six children: Oliver H., born December 21, 1850; James C., born November 16, 1851; Mary J., born February 16, 1856, died March 28, 1859; Charles C., born May 23, 1858; Hattie L., born March 16, 1862; George A., born June 23, 1867. Mrs. Holt's grandfather was in the revolutionary war. James H. Baxter, a lieutenant, was killed at Fort Wagner. Post-office, Lyons. Business, farmer and dairyman, section 20.

BUTLER RICHARDSON, son of Thomas and Mary Richardson, was born in Ontario County, New York, June 30th, 1806. He was married in Niagara County, New York, October 1st, 1820, to Mary McCumber, daughter of Jonathan and Elizabeth McCumber, both of whom are deceased. She was born in Queensbury, New York, September 28th, 1806. Mr. and Mrs. Richardson have children as follows: Alonzo, born January 20th, 1831; Alphonso, born January 20th, 1831, died when four weeks old; Chapman B., born April 14th, 1838, died February 1st, 1866; Angelina, born June 22d, 1841. Mr. R. settled in Fulton County very soon after Mr. Phillips, in 1834. His son, Chapman B., was murdered in his father's barn at break of day, February 1st, 1866. The barn was set on fire and consumed, and his bones were found among the rubbish. The barn contained nineteen head of cattle, twenty tons of hay, a fine buggy, and one-half the entire farming utensils. The supposed murderer was arrested. Post-office, Lyons. Business, farmer and dairyman, section 14.

MARVIN E. DEWEY was born in Genesee County, New York, April 11th, 1833, and married at Baker's Corners, Michigan, in 1870, to Mattie A. Warner, daughter of Henry and Amanda (Cole) Warner, who was born in Medina County, Ohio, March 6th, 1848. They have two sons: John W., born February 12th, 1871; and Charles H., born April 2d, 1874. Mr. Dewey had three brothers, S. R. C. W., and A. L. Dewey, in the war of 1861-5. S. R. was wounded in an engagement in Alabama. All were honorably discharged. Mr. D. settled in Fulton County in 1870. Post-office, Lyons. Business, carpenter and joiner.

DENNIS N. FENNER and his wife, Sarah C. (Miller) Fenner, were born in Ohio, the former in Lake County, October 21st, 1845, the latter in Fulton County, October 1st, 1848. They were married in Michigan January 1st, 1871. They have one son, Howard, born September 13th, 1873. Daniel and Mahala Fenner, parents of D. N. Fenner, settled in Fulton County in 1847. Mrs. Fenner's parents were John J. and Sarah (Tappan) Miller, settled in Fulton County in 1846. Mr. Fenner and his father, E. M. Fenner, were members of the 130th Regiment, O. V. I., in the war of the rebellion. The latter was lieutenant of his company, and both were honorably discharged at the close of the war. Post-office, Lyons. Business, farmer and dairyman, section 4.

WILLIAM P. DAVOLL and his wife, Eliza P. (Sherman) Davoll, were born in New York, the former in Tompkins County, October 14th, 1824, the latter in Erie County, January 7th, 1829. They were married in Erie County, January 7th, 1849. Their children are: Wm. Alvin, born March 20th, 1850; John A., born October 22d, 1852; Edward S., born June 25th, 1853; Lewis Foster, born June 19th, 1857. The parents of Mr. Davoll were John and Sarah (Foster) Davoll. Mrs. Davoll's parents, Charles P. and Edith P. Wickins, were natives of Massachusetts. Mr. Davoll enlisted in Company D, 100th Regiment, O. V. I., in the war of 1861; served 140 days, mostly in Virginia, and was honorably discharged. His grandfather came from England when four, en drums of age, and was a soldier in the Revolutionary War. He was dragoon major. Mr. D. settled in Fulton in 1852. Post-office, Metamora. Business, farmer, section 16.

CHARLES C. TINEY is a son of Richard and Dorothy (Seward) Tiney, the former born in Maine, February 18th, 1752, the latter in Vermont, Rutland County, August 22th, 1768. They died in Ohio in 1847, and 1839. He was born in Washington County, New York, April 26th, 1809, and married in Orleans County, New York, November 4th, 1834, to Electa Whitten, born in Genesee County, New York, December 28th, 1812. John and Duncan (Viller) Blair, parents of Mrs. C., were born, the former in New Jersey in 1800, the latter in New York. Mrs. C. died November 10th, 1872. Post-office, Metamora. Business, carpenter and joiner, section 15.

ELIJAH F. LUKE was born in Columbiana County, Ohio, September 14th, 1836. He was married in Michigan, November 19th, 1858, to Elbertine M. Brown, who was born in Niagara County, New York, November 3rd, 1834. Their children are: Irving D., born January 14th, 1860; Adie L., born February 6th, 1862; Ernest N., born May 19th, 1871; and Minnie E., born June 14th, 1875. Elijah and Abigail (Barton) Luke, parents of the subject of this sketch, were born, the former in New Jersey, May 17th, 1786, the latter in same State, January 21st, 1793. Mrs. Potter's first wife was Eliza Miller, by whom she had seven children. Calvin and Sarah Potter had a family of three children: Asa C., born April 27th, 1866; Ellis C., born February 24th, 1868; and Esther, born July 24th, 1872. The first wife's children were: Avoline, Leylehena M., Edson, Eva L., Mary S., Emory E., Orange S., Mrs. P.'s children were Eliza G., and Esther. Mary S., and Minerva Potter, parents of Calvin H., were born, the former in Rhode Island, the latter in New York, in 1803. They reside in Fulton County. George and Francis (Drake) Teeple were born, the former in New York, in 1801, the latter in Canada, in 1803. The former died in 1875; the latter still resides in Canada. Harwell Potter enlisted in the Union army in 1864 and died in the same. Peter Teeple was wounded in the first battle of Bull Run, and when taken prisoner he was still fighting with his boots full of blood from the wound. He died in Richmond. Mr. Potter is justice of the peace. Post-office, Metamora. Business, dealer in dry goods, boots, shoes and groceries.

GEORGE W. SCHRIEBER, son of William and Rachel (Williams) Schriber, of New York, was born in Green County, New York, June 16th, 1826. He was married in New York, November 1st, 1847, to Ellen H., daughter of Daniel T. and Hope A. (Hammond) Seamon, of Rhode Island, who was born in Steuben County, New York, May 2d, 1829. They have a family of eight children: Charles E., born January 9th, 1849, deceased; Frederic H., born December 24th, 1850; George W., born October 23rd, 1853, deceased; Lewis E., born April 6th, 1856; William C., born June 28th, 1859; Ellen, born July 2d, 1862; Rachel H., born July 16th, 1865; and George H., born November 6th, 1869. Mr. and Mrs. Schriber each had a brother in the Union army in the war of 1861-5. JOHN CLENDENIN and his wife Phoebe A. Hackett were born in New York, the former in Livingston County, March 10th, 1815, the latter in Rochester, March 4th, 1819. They were married in Livingston County, New York, May 24th, 1837. Their children are: Minerva (Mrs. Wheeler), born March 25th, 1838, married February 28th, 1856; Leverett H., born October 4th, 1840; Ann, born January 4th, 1843, deceased. Matilda (Mrs. Luck) born November 19th, 1850, married April 11th, 1862. The parents of this couple are Jacob and Rhoda (Roberts) Clendenin, of New York; both died in 1859, and Benjamin and Fanny M. (Duncan) Hackett. Leverett Clendenin enlisted September 1st, 1861, in Company 1, 47th Regiment, O. V. I. He first served as private, and was afterward promoted to first lieutenant. He served four years, was not sick a day, and always with his company and regiment. Mr. C. has filled the office of justice of the peace. Post-office, Metamora. Business, farmer and teacher, section 12.

JOHN STILLWILL was born in Richland County, Ohio, May 13, 1824. He was married in Seneca County, Ohio, October 11, 1846, to Susan E. Wise, born in Carlisle, Pennsylvania, February 28, 1824. Their children are: Francis T., born October 10, 1847, died September 18, 1848; Albert N., born February 1, 1849; Lucilla E., born June 2, 1851; Isaac P., born January 26, 1853; John Lee, born October 9, 1856; William W., born February 2, 1859; Elmer J., born December 26, 1861; and Alice, born March 25, 1863. Francis T. Stillwill, father of the above, was born in Vermont, in 1800, April 10, and died in Fulton County, in 1871. He was a soldier in the war of 1861-5, first in the one hundred days service, and afterwards belonged to the 67th Regiment O. V. I. Susannah (Wycoff) Stillwill, mother of the above, was born in Jefferson County, Ohio, in 1800. They settled in Fulton County, in 1854. John and Emily Wise, parents of Mrs. Stillwill, were natives of Pennsylvania, and died in Seneca County, Ohio, in 1835, and 1850. Ma Stillwill enlisted in Company K, 25th Regiment, in 1864. He was in a number of engagements, always with his regiment. His son Albert belonged to the 130th Regiment O. V. I., served four months; both were honorably discharged at close of war. Mr. Stillwill also had two brothers: Henry, who belonged to the 130th Regiment O. V. I., died at Fortress Monroe, August 19, 1864; Francis F., who was a member of the 7th Regiment O. V. White was one of the early pioneers of Fulton County, having settled there in 1834. He was a great hunter, and game was abundant. He cleared and prepared over one hundred and fifty acres of land for cultivation. He has been constable seven years. Post-office, Lyons. Business, farmer, section 7.

Ervin H., born December 11, 1872. Mr. Ham settled in Fulton County, in 1871. Post-office, Wauseon. Business, farmer and real estate dealer, section 34.

H. A. SCUDDER, son of Isaiah and Marg. ret (Hadzel) Scudder, of Pennsylvania, where they still reside, was born in Wayne County, Pennsylvania, February 21, 1859. He was married at Wauseon, December 25, 1875, to Libbie H. Ham, daughter of John C. and Alice M. Ham, who was born in Pennsylvania, February 25, 1855. Mr. Scudder had one brother, Benjamin, in the Union Army, in the war of 1861-5. He enlisted in a Missouri Regiment in 1862, and served as a veteran until the close of the war. George W. and Sophia Wilcox, parents of Mrs. Onweller, were born, the former in Canada, the latter in Michigan, and had a family of seven children: Joanna, Maria, Sophia, Alice H., George W., Ambrose M., and Albert. Samuel Onweller was killed in the battle before Richmond, October 13, 1864. He belonged to Co. Company I, 67th Regiment O. V. I., and was supporting the colors of the regiment when he was killed. Post-office, Morenci, Mich. Business, farmer, section 23.

JOHN S. BUTLER, son of Asa H. and Sarah (Daggett) Butler, of Maine, was born in Wayne County, New York, May 18, 1824. He was married in Michigan, June 14, 1846, to Lovina, daughter of Chesterfield and Fannie Clemmons, of New York, who was born in Lake County, Ohio, July 10, 1828. Their family consists of eight children: Richard A., born April 30, 1848, died March 10, 1849; Wilfred C., born February 4, 1850; Mary L., born November 8, 1851; Eunice E., born May 29, 1853; Sarah, born October 7, 1856, died February 26, 1861; Edward, born March 4, 1862; Ulysses G., born December 31, 1864, and Fannie M., born February 17, 1869. Mr. Butler settled in Fulton County in 1835, and was one of the pioneers of the county. He has been township assessor for a number of years. Post-office, Emery. DUGO was born in Dutchess County, New York, July 9, 1826, and is a son of William and Elizabeth Dugo, the former, born in France, March 9, 1799, and died in Medina County, Ohio, July 22, 1850, the latter was born in New York in 1804, and resides in Chesterfield Township. Mr. Dugo was married in Medina County, Ohio, March 25, 1873, to Mary A., daughter of Andrew S. and Marcia (Powers) Moore, the former born in Ireland, the latter in Rutland County, Vermont. Mrs. Dugo was born in Rutland, Vermont, November 5, 1845. This is Mr. Dugo's second wife. His first wife was Adeline Clark, born in Catusaugus County, New York. His children are: Mary E. Morris was born in Oswego County, New York, February 10, 1814, and married in Fulton County, January 1, 1860, to Lucinda Stutesman, born in Fulton County, Ohio, September 14, 1844. They have three children: Effie A., born February 22, 1867; Melvin R., born July 6, 1870; Lowell L., born November 2, 1872. Mr. Smith enlisted in the Union army in October, 1861, in the 28th Regiment N. Y. V. I., Company D. He served three years, was engaged in eleven battles, and honorably discharged June 4, 1865. He settled in Fulton County in 1864. Post-office, Morenci, Mich. Business, farmer, section 14.

WILLIAM ONWELLER, son of William and Susannah Onweller, was born in Fulton County, Ohio, December 1, 1846. He was married in Morenci, Michigan, January 1, 1868, to Mary A., daughter of Joseph and Jane Shadle, of Dover Township, who was born in Fulton County, Ohio, October 10, 1849. They have a family of four children: Arthur, born January 17, 1869; Oliver, born November 5, 1870; Bertha J., born October 31, 1872; Leroy, born December 5, 1874. Mr. Onweller enlisted in the 120th Regiment O. V. I., for the 100 days' service, in 1864. He was sent with his regiment to the front, and was on duty before Richmond and Petersburg, served his time, and received an honorable discharge. Post-office, Morenci, Mich. Business, farmer and dairyman, section 23.

JAMES ONWELLER, JR., brother of William and Andrew Onweller, whose histories appear in this work, was born in Lucas County, Ohio, August 19, 1855. He has been twice married; the first time in Michigan, November 9, 1856, to Mary Stuart, who was born in England, April 5, 1834, and removed with her parents, John and Elizabeth Stuart, to America in 1856. Mr. Onweller, by his first wife, had seven children: Lucy J., born October 5, 1857; Alfred A., born March 3, 1859; Robert E., born December 27, 1860, and died September 13, 1861; Franklin J., born August 8, 1865; Anden C., born December 16, 1865; James W., born June 13, 1868; Charles D., born March 8, 1868, died August 8, 1870. 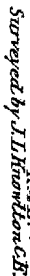

Jacob and Julia Benjamin, parents of Mrs. Nichols, were born in New York, and died in 1842, and 1845. Julia Benjamin's father and uncle were killed in the last battle of the Revolutionary War. Mrs. Nichols had four sons-in-law in the Union army. Mr. and Mrs. Nichols settled in Fulton County, in 1867. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, farmer.

OLIVER TODD was born in Seneca County, Ohio, September 26, 1835, and married in Morenci, Michigan, May 3, 1861, to Lucinda Devereaux, born in Lorain County, April 20, 1844. 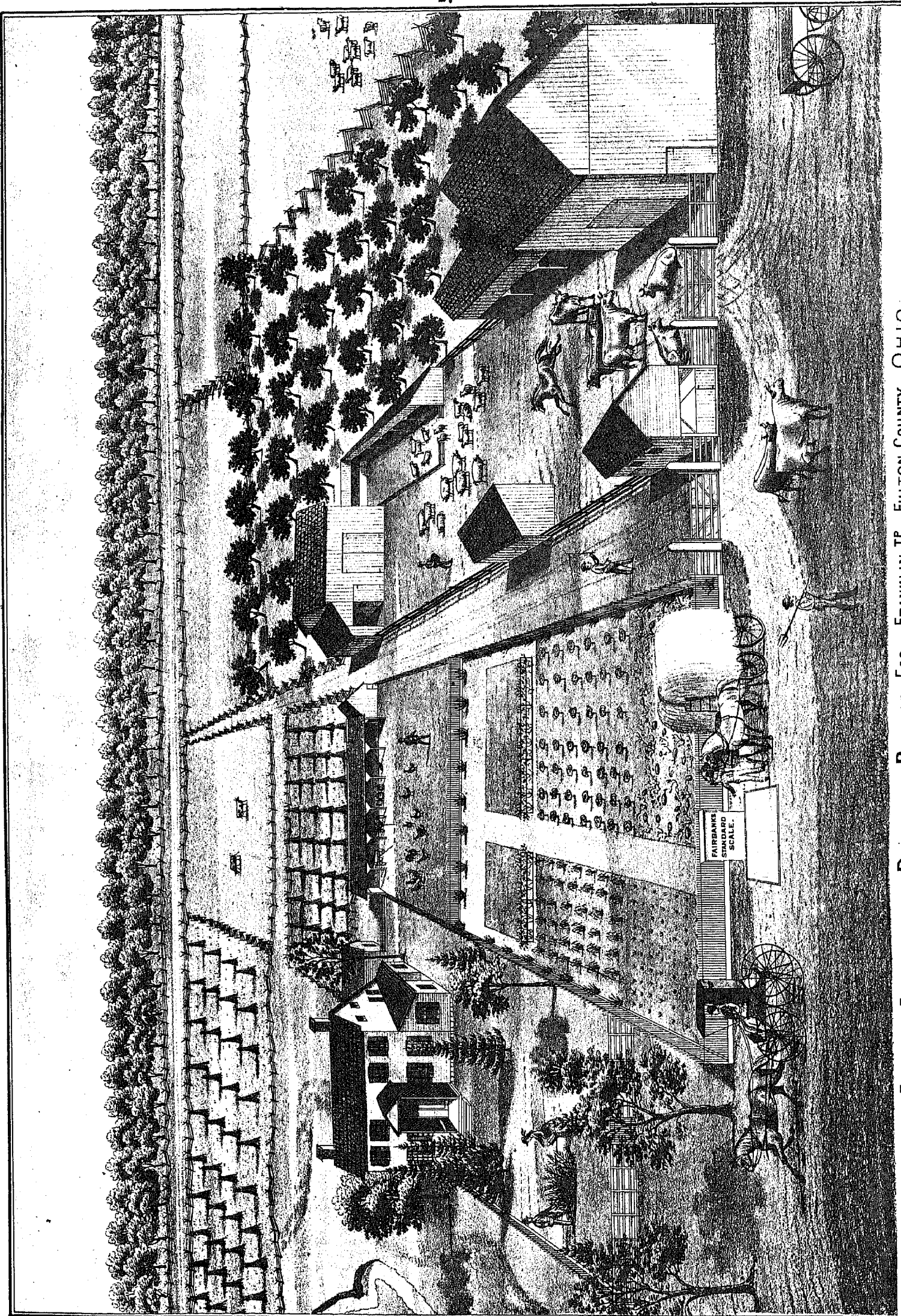

Mr. Powers was married in Michigan, August 17, 1845, to Julia D. Kennedy, who was born in Berkshire County, Massachusetts, May 25, 1824. Their family consists of ten children: Asahel A., born July 26, 1847; Sarah A., born April 14, 1850, married April 6, 1870, and died March 21, 1872; James A., born May 25, 1851; Clark W., born August 13, 1853; John P., born December 3, 1854; Mary W., born March 10, 1857; George W., born May 10, 1859, and died April 16, 1861; William I., born February 5, 1861; Julia L., born February 2, 1863; and Frank B., born June 16, 1868. settled in Fulton County, in 1849. Post-office, Fayette. Business, farmer and stock dealer, section 19.

JOHN A. BOWEN and his wife Andalusia (Wright) Bowen, were born in New York, the former in 1814, the latter in 1817. They were married in Adrian, Michigan, September 8, 1862. They have one daughter, Nellie, born February 11, 1868. Harvey and Lodrick Bowen, parents of the subject of this sketch, were born in Onondaga County, New York, the latter in Vermont. They now reside in Michigan. Mr. Bowen's great-grandfather was a Revolutionary soldier, and his great-grandmother's maiden name was Cook; she was a descendant of Cook the great navigator. George and Harriet Wright, parents of Mrs. Bowen, were natives of New York, and died, the former in 1867, the latter in 1859, in New York. Mr. Bowen settled in Fulton County, in 1873. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, farmer and miller, section 16.

TIMOTHY PLUMMER was born in Saratoga County, New York, March 12, 1830. He was married in Michigan, June 9, 1853, to Mary, daughter of Nathaniel and Experience Parsons, of Maine, who was born in Summit County, Ohio, October 9, 1828. Their children are: George W., born May 29, 1859; Mary E., born August 2, 1860; Walter G., born January 1, 1864; and Charles F., born August 21, 1872. Timothy S. and Lucy C. (Green) Plummer, parents of Timothy Plummer, were born, the former in Maine, in 1790, the latter in New York, in 1791. Timothy S. Plummer, Sr., was in the war of 1812, and was killed in several battles. Mr. Plummer's grandfather was from England, and settled in Maine. He left a large estate to his heirs at his death. Philomen Plummer, brother to the subject of this sketch, enlisted in the Union army in 1861, served three years, and was honorably discharged. Mr. Plummer settled in Fulton County, in 1853. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, farmer and dairyman, section 17.

HIRAM W. FORD, son of Samuel W. and Mary (French) Ford, of Connecticut, was born in Cortland County, New York, February 16, 1818. He was married in Seneca County, New York, January 18, 1840, to Sarah, daughter of Daniel and Rachel Willet, of New Jersey, who was born in New Jersey, December 26, 1815. Their children are: Samuel A., born November 11, 1840, died November 8, 1862; David C., born December 17, 1843; Francis M., born August 29, 1846; Ira C., born March 30, 1850; Ewing H., born May 7, 1854; Mary R., born March 22, 1856. Samuel enlisted in the 22d N. Y. Inf. Battery, in 1862. He was taken sick, and died in Washington, as above date. Francis enlisted in the 12th Regiment O. V. I., September 30, 1864, and was honorably discharged, July 7, 1865. Mr. Ford settled in Fulton County, in 1844. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, farmer, section 17.

FLETCHER J. BISHOP was born in Northumberland County, Pennsylvania, May 13, 1837. He was married in Morenci, Michigan, August 21, 1860, to Mrs. Julia A. Barnes, who was born in New Jersey, November 23, 1812. She was the widow of George W. Barnes, who belonged to Company A, 67th Regiment O. V. I., and died in the hospital near Richmond, after a lingering illness, February 13, 1864. Mr. and Mrs. Bishop have four children: Arthur C., born July 22, 1867; William H., born May 1, 1869; Charles F., born October 25, 1870; and James B., born May 5, 1873. Cornelius B. and Catharine Jones Bishop, parents of Fletcher Bishop, were born in Pennsylvania, and settled in Fulton County, in 1849, where the latter died, January 3, 1851. Henry L. and Eunice Smith, parents of Mrs. Bishop, were natives of New Jersey, and settled in Fulton County, in 1840. Mr. Bishop enlisted in the Union army, in the 3d Ohio Cavalry, September 25, 1862. He took part in a number of hard fought battles, and was honorably discharged at the expiration of his term, October 31, 1864. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, farmer, section 17.

ISRAEL SWOPE, son of Daniel and Rebecca Swope, who were born in Morgan County, Ohio, in 1810, and 1812, was born in Seneca County, Ohio, March 4, 1836. He was married May 9, 1860, in Vernon County, Wisconsin, to Sarah A., daughter of William and Rhoda F. (Griffith) Crane, the former born in Illinois, in 1812, the latter in North Carolina, in 1825. Mrs. Swope was born in Macoupin County, Illinois, April 28, 1843. This couple have had a family of six children, of whom four are living: William M., born January 7, 1861; Lucy J., born June 10, 1865, died in Hudson, Michigan, December 23, 1874; Esther F., born April 20, 1867; and Mary C., born October 15, 1868. Clarence, born April 24, 1871, died in Genoa, Ohio, January 12, 1874. May Edna, born February 12, 1874. Mr. Swope's grandfather was a native of Switzerland, born in 1770. His grandmother, on his father's side, and both grandparents on his mother's side, were natives of Maryland. Howell Crane, brother of Mrs. Swope, belonged to a Wisconsin regiment in the war of the Rebellion. He died at Rome, Georgia, five months after he enlisted, supposed to have been poisoned by parties who were in camp selling fruit. Mr. Swope settled in Fulton County, in 1875. FRANK E. and JUDSON BROWN are sons of Adam W. and Marilda (Brees) Brown, of New York, who settled in Fulton County, in 1860. They have four brothers: Hosea, Isaac, Daniel and John, and two sisters: Mary (Mrs. McMillen), of Chemung County, New York; and Lucinda (Mrs. McMillen), of Otsego County, New York. These brothers were born in Chemung County, New York, the former February 14, 1849, the latter February 9, 1852. Hosea, Isaac, and Daniel enlisted after three months on account of sickness, the second served two years, and died in the hospital at Newark, New Jersey; the third was discharged at the end of one year, on account of sickness, but afterwards enlisted in the 13th O. V. C., and served until the close of the war. John also enlisted in the 13th O. V. C., and served six months, and died in the hospital at Covington, Kentucky. Post-office, Otsego, Michigan. Business, farming.

WILLIAM E. HAUGHTON, son of Stephen and Huldah (Smith) Haughton, of Rensselaer County, New York, was born in Rensselaer County, October 2, 1831. He was married in Morenci, Michigan, July 4, 1857, to Harriet Z., daughter of Lorea and Laura G. Hendryx, the former of New York, the latter of Vermont, who was born in Painesville, Lake County, Ohio, March 14, 1834. Their children are: Ida May, born May 15, 1858; Eva D., born May 9, 1861; Willie D., born April 3, 1872. Mrs. Haughton is a teacher, and is at present engaged in her profession. Mr. Haughton was in the Union army in the war of 1861-5. He belonged to the one hundred day service, served in Virginia, and was honorably discharged. Mr. Haughton settled in Fulton County, in 1850. Post-office, Lyons, Ohio. Business, proprietor grist and saw mill, and farmer, section 24.

ZEBULON GRAY, son of Charles and Mary (Smith) Gray, both of whom were born in Canada, the former in 1809, the latter in 1836, was born in Canada, December 10, 1847, and removed with his parents, to Fulton County, November 25, 1864; where his father died April 2, 1874. He was married in Morenci, Michigan, March 20, 1865, to Margaret (Dewitt) Onweller, widow of David Onweller, of Stark County, Ohio, who died December 10, 1874, leaving five children: Della and Ella, born August 10, 1866, died March 4, 1867; Orilla A., born September 5, 1868; Howard L., born May 18, 1871; and Zella M., born February 2, 1875. Mrs. Gray was born in Holmes County, Ohio, June 11, 1843. Bernard and Jane (McKee) Dewitt, parents of Mrs. Gray, were born in 1799, and the former died in 1873. Mr. Gray enlisted in Company G, 16th Michigan V. I., in August, 1864. He was taken prisoner at Athens, Alabama, and was retained at Macon and Andersonville until the close of the war. David Onweller belonged to Company I, 67th Regiment O. V. I. He enlisted in 1862, served seventeen months, and was discharged on account of sickness. He afterwards enlisted in the one hundred service, and was honorably discharged at the close of the war. Henry Dewitt served three years, was wounded in battle, and was honorably discharged at close of the war. Benson Gray belonged to Company F, 7th Michigan Cavalry, served fifteen months, was wounded at the battle of Calpepper, and discharged. He afterwards enlisted in the 18th Mich. V. I., and served until the close of the war. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, farmer, section 11.

JAMES FLETCHER, son of James and Emily (Navar) Fletcher, the former born in France, the latter in New York, was born in Quebec, Canada, June 2, 1832. He was married in Toledo, Ohio, January 1, 1861, to Cordelia Olmstead, born in Huron County, Ohio,

August 11, 1840. They have five children: James A., born May 10, 1863; Charles, born September 20, 1865; Cordelia, born October 20, 1869; infant (deceased); Susan W., born October 19, 1874. H. and Susan (Nephew) Olmstead, parents of Mrs. Fletcher, were born in Pennsylvania, and reside in Lucas County, Ohio. Mr. Fletcher enlisted in the Union army in the three months' service, in 1861, at the expiration of which time he again enlisted in the same regiment, 14th O. V. I., for three years, took part in a number of hard fought battles, was wounded at Lookout Mountain. At the expiration of this term of service he enlisted in Company A, 77th Regiment O. V. I., and served until the close of the war. He was three times honorably discharged. Mr. Fletcher settled in Fulton County, in 1866. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, cheese making, section 11.

JOHN VAN DYKE EMMONS was born at Gravesend, Kings County, New York, October 31, 1828. His wife, Aletha E. (Stryker) Emmons, was born in the same place, August 18, 1829. They were married in Kings County, New York, September 27, 1848, and settled in Fulton County in 1870. Their family consists of seven children: Hubbard, born January 2, 1850, died July 29, 1859; Jane A. (Mrs. Bennett), born August 13, 1852; John V. D., born May 18, 1856; Tunis, born July 14, 1858; Stephen G., born December 15, 1860; Abraham S., born August 7, 1864; and Homer L. B., born June 4, 1869. Stephen and Jane (Van Dyke) Emmons, parents of John V. D., were born in New York, in 1800 and 1810; the former died August 11, 1874. Tunis and Ann (Hubbard) Stryker, parents of Mrs. E., were born in New York, and deceased in the same state in 1859 and 1846. Stephen Emmons, brother of the subject of this sketch, was in the war of the rebellion, served during the war, took part in a number of hard fought battles, and was honorably discharged at its close. Post-office, Lyons, Ohio. Business, farmer and gardener, section 24.

NATHAN S. GRAY is a brother of Zebulon Gray, whose history appears on a preceding page of this work. He was born in Ontario County, Canada, May 15, 1854. His brothers and sisters are: Benson, who resides in Hillsdale, Michigan; Zebulon, Frances, Sarah E. (deceased), Lydia J., Julia A., William J., Sarah W., Prince A., Adaline, and George L. Mr. Gray settled in Fulton County in 1864. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, carpenter and joiner, section 20.

MRS. JULIA E. HARRIS, widow of the late Jonathan Harris, who was born in Westchester County, New York, April 1, 1824, and died in Chesterfield Township, Fulton County, July 15, 1870, was born in Erie County, Ohio, August 9, 1840. They were married in Sandusky City, November 16, 1863. Mrs. Harris has three children living and one deceased: Mary Jane, born June 24, 1865; Lydia L., born February 18, 1867; Julia S., born January 24, 1869, died January 27, 1869; Frances E., born January 11, 1870. Alvin Harris, son of Jonathan and Julia E. Harris, was born in Connecticut, and died in Erie County, Ohio, the former in 1869, the latter in 1864. Henry and Lydia Harris, parents of Mr. Harris, were also natives of New York, and reside in Huron County, Ohio. Mr. Harris was in the war of the rebellion three years, and received an honorable discharge. Post-office, Wauseon, Ohio. Business, farming, section 35.

ALFRED TODD, son of Harvey and Maria Todd, was born in Fulton County, Ohio, September 28, 1854. He is one of a family of five children: Oliver, born September 26, 1855; Mary J., married L. Smith, August 20, 1855, and died November 18, 1854; Catharine, married in 1867, and resides in Hillsdale, Michigan; George, deceased in 1850. Harvey Todd, the father of this family, died April 7, 1874. Before his death he willed the home of fifty-five acres, to the subject of this sketch, also one pair of horses. The will was signed by P. Powers and Eustace Leggett, justice of the peace. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, farmer, section 20.

JOHN H. MASTEN, son of Cornelius and Isabella Masten, of Canada, was born in Huntington County, Canada, September 8, 1832. He was married in Michigan, June 26, 1859, to his second wife, Phoebe (Taylor) Brink, who is a daughter of Henry and Charlotte Taylor, of New York, and was born in Sussex County, New York, November 23, 1831. The children of this couple are: Cornelius, born June 20, 1861; John D., born July 11, 1863. Mrs. Masten's first husband, name was Jacob Brink, a native of Ohio. He left four children: Byron, born December 6, 1848; Bartley, born August 16, 1849; Bainbridge, born August 12, 1851; Bradley, born October 3, 1853. Mr. Masten's first wife was Martha Thayer, a native of Ohio, who died in Fulton County, in 1855. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, farmer and mechanic, section 30.

BRADLEY D. RICE is one of a family of five children: Mary Augusta (half-sister), born August 28, 1854 (deceased); Bradley D., born September 19, 1857; Viola Della, born May 9, 1859; Jerry E. (deceased), and Charlotte, born March 3, 1862, sons and daughters of Jerry and Zilph M. (Reasoner) Rice, the former born in Bellevue, Ohio, August 5, 1834, the latter born in New York, May 9, 1834. They were married in Michigan, December 7, 1855. The parents of this couple are: Hiram and Hannah (Powers) Rice, born in Genesee County, New York, in 1804 and 1807, the former died in Michigan, in 1852, the latter resides in Ohio; and Benjamin and Martha (Rounds) Reasoner, also of New York. Mr. Rice's first wife was Augusta Hobart, born in Elyria, Ohio, died in Kalamazoo County, Michigan, August 28, 1855. Mr. Rice settled in Fulton County in 1875. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, book-keeper, section 29.

FRANCIS M. RICE, son of Hiram and Hannah Rice, was born in Lenawee County, Michigan, August 21, 1841. He was married in Hillsdale, Michigan, July 11, 1866, to Carrie E., daughter of James B. and Laura (Gould) Collins, born in New York in 1800, and 1804, and who reside in Michigan. Mrs. Rice was born in Genesee County, New York, January 4, 1815. This couple have three children: Jennie J., born April 7, 1867; Rosa May, born July 7, 1870, and Willie, born March 19, 1874. Mr. Rice enlisted in the Union army August 18, 1862, in Company I, 1st Michigan horse artillery. He served fifteen months as a private, and then promoted to corporal and served three years, took part in every battle from White Sides, Tennessee, to Atlanta. His regiment was first assigned to the army of the Potomac, and afterwards to the army of the Cumberland. The first hard battle in which the regiment engaged was that of Gettysburg, in which they lost but one man. Mr. Rice was mustered out of service with the regiment in Detroit, July 18, 1865. He settled in Fulton County in 1875. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, farmer and horse dealer, section 30.

CHARLES BOURN, and his wife, Julia A. (Baldwin) Bourn, were born in Massachusetts, the former in Berkshire County, October 3, 1817, the latter in Windsor, June 12, 1822. They were married in Morenci, Michigan, in May, 1843. They have one son, Charles L., born January 29, 1850. Seth and Phoebe Bourn, parents of this couple, were born and died in Massachusetts. Elias and Olive Baldwin, parents of Mrs. Bourn, were also natives of Massachusetts. The latter died in Morenci, Michigan. Mr. Bourn's grandfather on his mother's side, was a soldier in the war of 1812. Mr. Bourn settled in the county in 1843. He purchased 120 acres of land in 1840, and resides on the same farm, of which he has cleared 100 acres. He has three brothers and five sisters. He has filled the office of constable twelve years, and justice of the peace three years. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, farming, section 21.

CHAUNCEY BULKLEY, son of Barage and Deborah (Schoonover) Bulkley, born in New York in 1797, and 1800, and who died, the former in Michigan, in 1868, the latter in Ohio, in 1851, was born in Niagara County, New York, February 19, 1829. He was married in Michigan, June 6, 1829, to Salome Kelley, who was born in Ross County, Ohio, January 31, 1831. Their children are: Oren H., born November 18, 1853; Orval, born February 5, 1859; Ullyses S., born September 15, 1863; Mary E., born August 18, 1865; and Cora B., born May 23, 1871. John and Maria (Baker) Kelley, parents of Mrs. Bulkley, were born, the former in Virginia, in 1794, and died in Indiana in 1838, the latter in Rhode Island, in 1807, and reside in Fulton County. Mr. Bulkley had two brothers, Freeman and Royal, in the war of the rebellion. The former served three years, and the latter seven months, and were both discharged on account of disability. Mrs. Bulkley's only brother enlisted in his country's defense, in the same war, and took part in two hard battles

before he was seventeen years old. He was honorably discharged at the close of the war. Frazier F. Smalley, a brother-in-law of Mrs. Bulkley's, a soldier in the same war, died of cholera in Mississippi, July 9, 1863. Mr. Bulkley settled in Fulton County in 1844. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, farmer and blacksmith, section 20.

DERWIN E. BUTLER was born in Catusaugus County, New York, May 28, 1822. He is a son of Harlowe and Mary (Hickox) Butler, the former born in West Bloomfield, Ontario County, New York, January 4, 1798, and the latter in the same county, December 28, 1803, died in November, 1869. His parents were married in 1820, and had a family of four sons and two daughters, who are all living. Three sons, Arastus M., Louis, and M. W. Butler, were in the Union army in the war of the rebellion. Harlowe Butler was seized with the western fever in 1835, and on his way to Ohio, in the time of the Toledo war, was seized and taken prisoner. He was retained but a short time. He settled with his family in Fulton County in 1836, and planted a nursery with apple-trees, which Darwin E. washed out in Bloomfield, and from which the family have eaten apples and drank cider for the past thirty years. They were pioneers, being the fourth settlers in the town. For a long time the family were dependent on the rifle of the father and his eldest son, Darwin. Harlow Butler was the first justice of the peace in the township, and the first and only county examiner in the county. He issued the first forty-seven certificates to teachers, and held the first law-suit, which was Simmons vs. the State of Ohio, for settling on school land. Darwin Butler, was married in Fulton County, November 12, 1843, to Aurelia Hilliard, born in Dover Township, Athens County, Ohio, October 5, 1822. Their children are: Randolph Elisha, born May 10, 1846; Ella L., born March 3, 1849, died September 22, 1850; Arthur D., born December 16, 1854; Ernest L., born September 13, 1860, and Minnie May, born November 7, 1866. Elisha was one of the minute men in the war of the rebellion. Arthur D. completed a nice little brass steam engine before he was twelve years old, which his mother often attaches to the boiler, and runs for the amusement of the children. Mr. Butler's sons are all either machinists or farmers, and good citizens and honest men. Thomas Hilliard, grandfather of Mrs. Butler, was born in Connecticut, June 19, 1745, and died in New York, March 2, 1802. He was chaplain in the American revolution, and the father of twenty children. Elisha Hilliard, the twelfth child, and father of Mrs. Butler, was born in Rutland County, Vermont, January 1, 1789, and died August 11, 1847. Selah (Fairfield) Hilliard, wife of the above and mother of Mrs. Butler, was born in Rutland County, Vermont, December 29, 1788, and died September 20, 1868. She has one brother, Rev. J. M. Hilliard of Chicago, and one sister, Mrs. Edwards, of Chicago, living. Post-office, Oak Shade. Business, machinist, section 21.

GARNER WILLET, son of David and Rachel (Smalley) Willet, of New Jersey, who were born, the former in 1792, the latter in 1796, was born in Somerset County, New Jersey, December 20, 1816. He was of English descent on the father's side, and Scotch and Danish on the mother's. He removed with his parents to New York in 1835, and at the age of nineteen took his rifle on his shoulder and started west. He visited Adrian, Michigan, and several places in Ohio, led a wandering but rather happy life, viewing the country and killing deer, until 1837, when he bought a farm in Chesterfield Township, Fulton County. When he left his father's home his fortune consisted of \$35 and his rifle, so the money to purchase his farm was earned by the sweat of his brow, working on the M. S. railroad and Illinois canal. In 1839 he was joined by his father's family. In 1854 he sold his farm, and purchased where he now lives. He was present at the organization of Chesterfield Township. He was married April 20, 1845, to Harriet W. Parsons. Their children are: Arthur M., born May 19, 1846; Clay, born April 29, 1850; Clara E., born May 2, 1852; Dwight, born May 24, 1854; Arvilla L., born March 2, 1857, and George W., born July 30, 1867. Mrs. Willet was born in Summit County, April 10, 1823. Her parents, Nathaniel and Experience (Herring) Parsons, were born in Maine, in 1787 and 1790. Her grandparents came from England. Mr. Parsons emigrated from Maine to Summit County, Ohio in 1816, and in 1834 to Chesterfield Township, Fulton County, Ohio. He was one of the early pioneers, and endured many trials and privations. The nearest mill was thirty miles distant, and Tecumseh, Michigan, the nearest neighbor, four miles distant, but obstacles were overcome, and the aged pioneers spent the last days of life in abundance and ease. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, farmer and dairyman, section 6.

SAMUEL STOUT and his wife Julia (Baldy) Stout, were born in Berks County, Pennsylvania, March 10, 1812, and January 5, 1818. They were married in the same state and county, January 13, 1836, and had a family of eleven boys and five girls. Malon R., born May 24, 1837; William B., born November 6, 1838; Mary A., born April 24, 1840; James H., born November 17, 1841; Emmeline, born December 6, 1842; Alfred, born May 1, 1844; Alexander S., born August 13, 1845; Laura F., born March 11, 1847; John, born August 24, 1848; George S., born February 20, 1850; Isaac, born February 16, 1852; Franklin V., born September 9, 1854; Aldro A., born April 1, 1857; Charles L., born March 3, 1859; Catharine A., born July 25, 1860; and Sarah A., born September 11, 1862. Charles died March 22, 1859; Catharine died November 26, 1860; William B. died May 22, 1863. Alfred enlisted in Company H, 3rd Ohio Cavalry, in 1861, and served until the close of the war. He was in the Andersonville prison ten months. William B. belonged to the 14th Regiment, Wisconsin V. I. He enlisted as a private, but was promoted to an office. He was killed in the battle of Vicksburg. James H. enlisted in Company H, 148th Regiment, New York V. I. He was wounded and died in the hospital at Washington. John and Peggy (Reed) Stout, parents of Mr. Stout, were born in Pennsylvania, where they both died. Jacob and Sarah (Sprigman) Baldy, parents of Mrs. Stout, were born in Berks County, Pennsylvania. Mr. S. settled in Fulton County in 1860. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, farmer and mason.

GEORGE W. BATES was born in Livingston County, New York, April 4, 1845. He was a son of Eliam and Barshaba Bates, the former of Rhode Island, the latter of Michigan. He was married in Fulton County, Ohio, October 10, 1849, to Mary A. Carver, who was born in Connecticut, January 7, 1830. She was a daughter of Increase and Adah Carver, born in Connecticut in 1804, and 1809, now residing in Michigan. The children of Mr. and Mrs. Bates are: Roxie J., born July 22, 1854, died when one month old; Judson A., born July 8, 1855; Catharine A., born September 22, 1857; Mary E., born September 20, 1857; Fred A., born August 26, 1860; Alfred M., born March 17, 1864. He has filled the offices of trustee and member of the board of education for a number of years. Post-office, Morenci, Michigan. Business, proprietor steam saw mill and carpenter, section 12.

ROOS, son of John B. and Elizabeth (Benner) Roos, who were born in Dutchess County, New York, in 1791, the former of whom died in 1859, the latter in 1872, was born in Dutchess County, New York, December 5, 1821. He was married in Fulton County, Ohio, January 25, 1849, to Emily L. Noble, born in Genesee County, New York, February 28, 1834. Their children are: Libbie E., born July 25, 1850; Eunice M., born October 24, 1857; Olive E., born December 10, 1860; and Lena May, born December 2, 1872, died January 12, 1873. Dwight and Eunice (Watrous) Noble, parents of Mrs. R., were born in Vermont, the former January 22, 1804, the latter November 12, 1806. Their children are: Benjamin, deceased, January 2, 1873; James, deceased, May 29, 1864; John S., William B., Nathaniel D., Elizabeth C., Sarah T., Martha A., Rachel M., Mary M., Ellen R., deceased, September, 1856; Susan C., and an infant, deceased. James and Sarah Watkins, born, the former in Delaware, the latter in Pennsylvania, were the parents of Mr. Templeton. They settled in Wayne County in 1822. Nathaniel Templeton, grandfather of the subject of this sketch, lived near where Simon Girty led the Indians across the Ohio into Pennsylvania, and was with Crawford in the battle with the Indians on the Sandusky Plains. He was wounded in the first day's fight, and, in the war of 1812, he was captured on the third day and tomahawked and scalped by the Indians. His comrades obtained and buried his body, and carried his gun home to his wife. The gun is now in the Templeton family, over one hundred years old. This family descended from the Highland Scotch and Irish. They are very stout and robust. Our subject, in his best days, weighed 440 pounds; could take an iron bar seven inches square with his hands and lay it out of his road. He could lift 1,000 pounds. JASPER N. MICHAELS was born in Seneca County, Ohio, November 7, 1839, and married October 5, 1861, to S. A. Bralley, who was born in Huron County, May 28, 1844. Their children are: Moses T., Sarah E., Lewis J., and Albert E. and Elbert E., twins. Lewis and Elizabeth Michaels, parents of the subject of this sketch, were born in Virginia. Moses and Sarah J. Bralley, parents of Mrs. M., were born, the former in Black Rock, New York, the latter in Buffalo. They settled in Fulton County in 1856. Mr. M. had three cousins killed in the war of the rebellion, and one uncle, who died in Texas, and one starved to death in Libby Prison. He settled in Fulton County in 1861. Post-office, Delta. Business, lumberman and machinist, section 10.

JOHN S. TEMPLETON, son of John and Susan Templeton, was born in Wayne County, Ohio, March 22, 1839. He was married in Fulton County, September 24, 1864, to Lydia A. Fesler, born in Mercer County, Pennsylvania, May 2, 1834. They have four sons: Frank P., James B., David D., deceased February 10, 1864, and John W. Joseph and Catharine (Fox) Fesler, parents of Mrs. T. were born in Pennsylvania, and settled in Fulton County in 1841. Mr. Templeton enlisted in Company I, 38th Regiment, O. V. L., August 21, 1861. He was elected first corporal, and was promoted through all the intermediate offices to a first lieutenant. He took part in the battles of Stone River, Chickamauga, Chattanooga, and others. He was mustered out of service January 4, 1864, on account of deafness. Mr. T. has a bass drum that has been in use forty years, also a pair of silver sleeve buttons worn by his grandfather one hundred years ago. Mr. Templeton settled in Fulton County in 1853. Post-office, Swanton. Business, railroad conductor.

John and Hester Osterhout, parents of Mrs. Blake, were born in Dutchess County, New York, and settled in Fulton County in 1851. Mr. Blake settled in Fulton County in 1852. Post-office, Delta. Business, carpenter and farmer, section 15.

JOHN R. BLOOMER, son of George and Sally Bloomer, of Vermont, was born in Huron County, Ohio, November 17, 1837. He was married in Clyde, Ohio, in 1870, to Esther A. Newman, daughter of John and Anna Newman of Pennsylvania, who was born in Seneca County, Ohio, January 29, 1848. They have two children: Rosa B., and John A. Mr. Bloomer enlisted in Company G, 24th Regiment O. V. L., in May, 1861, was in the service three years, took part in the battles of Cheat Mountain, Shiloh, Chickamauga, and others. He settled in Fulton County in 1871. Post-office, Swanton. Business, railroad engineer, section 10.

MOSES R. BRAILEY and his wife Sarah J. (Maxon) Bralley, were born in New York, the former in Canandaigua, Ontario County, the latter in Buffalo, Erie County. They were married in Eden, Erie County, New York, April 21, 1837. Their children are: Melissa, Susan D., Laura L., Sevilla A., Lester C., James S., Charles E., Elva P., Sarah M., Eleanor A., and Ellen E. Gildon and Ann Bralley, the former of Massachusetts, the latter of New York, were the parents of the subject of this sketch. Mr. Bralley was born in New York, the father of Mrs. Bralley. Mr. Bralley settled in Fulton County in 1857. He has filled the several offices of justice of the peace, prosecuting attorney, and comptroller state treasury. He enlisted in the Union army in the war of the Rebellion, and served as lieutenant, captain, major, lieutenant colonel, brigadier general, and pay agent for Ohio. Post-office, Swanton. Business, attorney at law, section 22.

CHARLES E. BRAILEY, son of Moses R. and Sarah Bralley, was born in Huron County, Ohio, in 1851. He was married in Fulton County, Ohio, February 21, 1875, to Carrie B. Dixon, who was born in Fulton County in 1857. Mr. Bralley settled in Fulton County in 1851. Business, druggist. Post-office, Swanton, section 12.

JOHN ARTHUR GRANDY, son of M. B. and Ann (Legg) Grandy, the former born in New York, the latter in New Hampshire, was born in Swan Creek Township, January 31, 1863. He was married in Fulton Township, Fulton County, January 1, 1883, to Amelia L., daughter of Calvin and Louisa (Brewer) Quiggle, the former of Pennsylvania, the latter of Massachusetts. Mrs. Grandy was born in Geneva County, Ohio, December 8, 1840. Their children are: Frank, Jessie, and Mary. Mr. Grandy settled in Fulton County in 1887. He has been township treasurer eight years, and is a member of the board of county school examiners. He enlisted in Company H, 138th Regiment O. V. L., in the war of the Rebellion. His brother, Moses D. Grandy, was killed in the battle of Honey Hill, South Carolina. He was a member of the 25th Regiment O. V. L. Post-office, Swanton. Business, livery stable, section 12.

ALBERT PIKE, son of Alanson and Hannah Pike, of New York, was born in Fulton County, April 30, 1848. He was married in Wauseon, Ohio, January 1, 1873, to Sarah Adeline Call, born in Ashabula County, Ohio, August 12, 1854. They have one son—Alanson B.—born January 19, 1874. Luther and Lydia (Moody) Call, parents of Mrs. Pike, were born in Ashabula County, Ohio; the former entered the Union army in 1862, when his daughter Lydia, was eight years old; the latter having died when she was two years old, the little girl was left an orphan, in care of a friend, who sent her to school. Mr. Pike had two brothers in the war of the Rebellion. He settled in Fulton County in 1848. Post-office, Swanton. Business, farmer, section 12.

JOSEPH A. SIMONS was born in Alleghany County, New York, April 11, 1828. He was married in Union City, Michigan, to Hattie E., daughter of Isaac and Roxey Osborn, the former of Connecticut, the latter of Vermont, who was born December 23, 1833. Their children are: Jay A., Franklin E., Mary H., Roy E., Asenath A., and Luella F. James and Asenath (Newell) Simons, parents of Joseph A., were born the former in Monroe, and the latter in Herkimer County, New York. He settled in Fulton County in 1875. Post-office, Swanton. Business, machinist and farmer, section 12.

WELLS WATKINS, son of James H. and Sarah (Fisher) Watkins, of Maryland, was born in Jefferson County, Ohio, April 7, 1818. He was married July 5, 1838, to Sarah, daughter of Robert and Mary (Newhouse) Watkins, who was born in Wayne County, Ohio, June 27, 1817. Their family consists of nine children: Martin, deceased, August 26, 1847; Mary, deceased, December 21, 1847; Mary M., resides in Fulton County; Vernon C., resides in Iowa County, Michigan; Jasper N., resides in Fulton County; Sarah A., resides in Toledo; Eliza J., died in 1850; Riley R., resides in Fulton County; and Christina C. Mr. Watkins left Wayne County, August 6, 1838, and journeyed one day to reach Fulton County, where he settled and endured the hardships of pioneer life. The first winter he carried his grist three miles on his back to a horse mill; walked to Perryburg to market, starting on Monday morning and returning on Saturday evening, paid fifteen dollars per barrel for flour, fifteen cents a pound for pork, one dollar and fifty cents per bushel for potatoes, etc., etc. At that time he had to chop two and a half cords of green hickory wood for a day's work, for which he would receive fifty cents. Indians were numerous; the nearest village was Maumee. This state of things continued but a year or two. Mr. Watkins was in Company H, 130th Regiment O. V. L., in the one hundred day service during the war of 1861-5. Vernon C., his son, belonged to Company E, 138th Regiment O. V. L. Post-office, Swanton. Business, farmer, section 10.

ORVILLE C. ECOLE NAY was born in Bristol, Vermont, September 11, 1807. He is a son of Jeremiah and Mary (Dunshie) Nay, of New Hampshire. He was married in Franklin, Jefferson County, Ohio, January 8, 1837, to Elizabeth Mills, born in Sussex County, New Jersey, March 5, 1812. Her parents were Michael and Hannah (Garnes) Mills, the former born in New York, in 1782, the latter in Germany, in 1782. Mr. Nay settled in Fulton County in 1834. After paying for his land he had no money left. The other settlers in the township were: David Williams, William Meeker, and Sidney Hawley. They had to go with ox teams to Maumee for provisions, a journey of three days. Wolves were abundant, and the early settlers used to build fires to scare them away from their cabins at night. Mr. Nay was at twenty-seven log-house raisings the first summer. James Nay, grandfather of Eccole Nay, was one of the "Tea Party," at Boston, and carried away some of the tea in his shoes, which was in the possession of his friends at his death. He was also in the Revolutionary war, and took part in the battle of Banker Hill. Post-office, Delta. Business, farmer, section 9.

RUDOLPH WITMER, son of John and Maria (Radt) Witmer, of Switzerland, was born in Uppenberg, Switzerland, October 12, 1815. His wife, Maria Kaiser, was born in Berne, Switzerland, March 11, 1826. They were married in Perryburg, Wood County, Ohio, January 6, 1856. They have three children: Sophia W., Savage, Mary A., and John Witmer. Elizabeth A., deceased March 1, 1867. Mr. Witmer settled with his parents in Fulton County in 1834. They first lived in a bark shanty, in the woods, and on the 21st of June, 1834, a terrible storm of wind and rain blew down the trees of the forest in a frightful manner, not one limb striking the pioneer's cabin. Mr. Witmer had two brothers in the Union army in the war of 1861-5, one was killed in the battle of Perryburg, Landing. Mrs. Witmer was the widow of Peter Rider, when she married Mr. Witmer, by whom she had one child—Sophia—who married Bruce Savage. Post-office, Delta. Business, farmer, section 17.

GEORGE W. JACOBY, was born in Seneca County, New York, May 29, 1825. He was married in Ashland County, Ohio, in 1851, to Martha Monroe, born in Portage County, May 18, 1826. Their children are: Marsena, Theodore, Edward B., and Emma. John and Sarah (Shankwater) Jacoby, parents of George W., were born in Pennsylvania, the former came to Fulton County in 1850; and died in 1855. Samuel and Elizabeth (Blair) Monroe, parents of Mrs. Jacoby, were born, the former in Virginia, the latter in Pennsylvania. G. W. Jacoby settled in Fulton County in 1855. Post-office, Delta. Business, farmer, section 20.

EDWARD STEPHEN MANN, son of Benjamin W. and Mary J. (Guy) Mann, the former of Massachusetts, the latter of Upper Canada, was born in Madison County, Ohio, August 19, 1856. He was married in Henry County, Ohio, March 31, 1882, to Mary J., daughter of Seth H. and Almira (Wood) Hoyt, who was born in Genesee County, New York, May 16, 1840. Their children are: Helen A., Lily G., deceased April 26, 1872; Freddie H., and Clinton C. Mr. Mann settled in Fulton County in 1870. Post-office, Delta. Business, farmer, section 30.

HEIRMAN G. ADAMS was born in Erie County, Ohio, March 12, 1840. He was married in Branch County, Michigan, September 5, 1868, to Margaret McVean, who was born in Amsterdam, New York, May 10, 1841. Their children are: Freddie H., Gracie, and Mattie. Alonson and Sarah M. Adams, parents of the subject of this sketch, were natives of New York, and settled in Steuben County, Ohio, in 1860. Duncan and Grace (McDonald) McVean, were also born in New York. They were the parents of Mrs. Adams. Mr. Adams enlisted, November 23, 1861, in Company B, 11th Michigan Infantry. He was transferred into the veteran corps; was wounded in the battle of Stone River, December 31, 1862, and honorably discharged, November 23, 1864. He settled in Fulton County, Ohio, in 1868. Post-office, Delta. Business, farmer, section 21.

AROLA G. HEWETT, son of Henry and Anna (Walker) Hewett, of New York, was born in Washington County, New York. He removed to Lucas County, Ohio, in 1850, and to Fulton in 1872. His children are: George, resides in White House, Ohio; Nathan, and Esther A., resides in Swanton, Ohio. George belonged to Company K, 3d Regiment O. V. L. He served three months, and re-enlisted for the war, and was discharged in 1865. Nathan was a member of Company K, 3d Regiment O. V. L., and served eighteen months. Post-office, White House, Lucas County. Business, farmer, section 36.

JOHN WAGONER settled in Fulton County in 1854. He is a son of John and Catharine (Kestler) Wagoner, of Pennsylvania. He was married in Henry County, Ohio, October 19, 1850, to Abigail S. Hobbs, who was born in Madison County, Ohio, August 20, 1831. Their children are: Mary A., Arthur, and John E. Mr. Wagoner was born in Sandusky County, Ohio, June 2, 1848. He had one brother in the Union army in Company G, 60th Regiment O. V. L. He was in several battles, and was wounded at Spottsylvania, and was discharged July 6, 1865. Post-office, Colton, Henry Co. Business, physician, section 8.

SYLVESTER SOLES, son of Nelson and Jane (Johnson) Soles, of New York, was born in Erie County, Ohio, February 6, 1847. He was married October 22, 1867, to Elora J. Webster, born in Seneca County, Ohio, April 1, 1850. Her parents, Samuel and Eliza (Rhodes) Webster, were natives of Pennsylvania. Mr. Soles, with his father's family, settled in Fulton County in 1862. He enlisted in the Union army, 6th Co., 60th Regiment O. V. L., in 1865, was in two battles, and served eighteen months. He had one brother in the same regiment, who died July 22, 1864. Post-office, Delta. Business, farmer, section 5.

WILLIAM J. LUTZ and his wife, Diana J. Raymond, were born, the former in Pennsylvania, November 16, 1834, the latter November 22, 1835. They were married November 24, 1859. 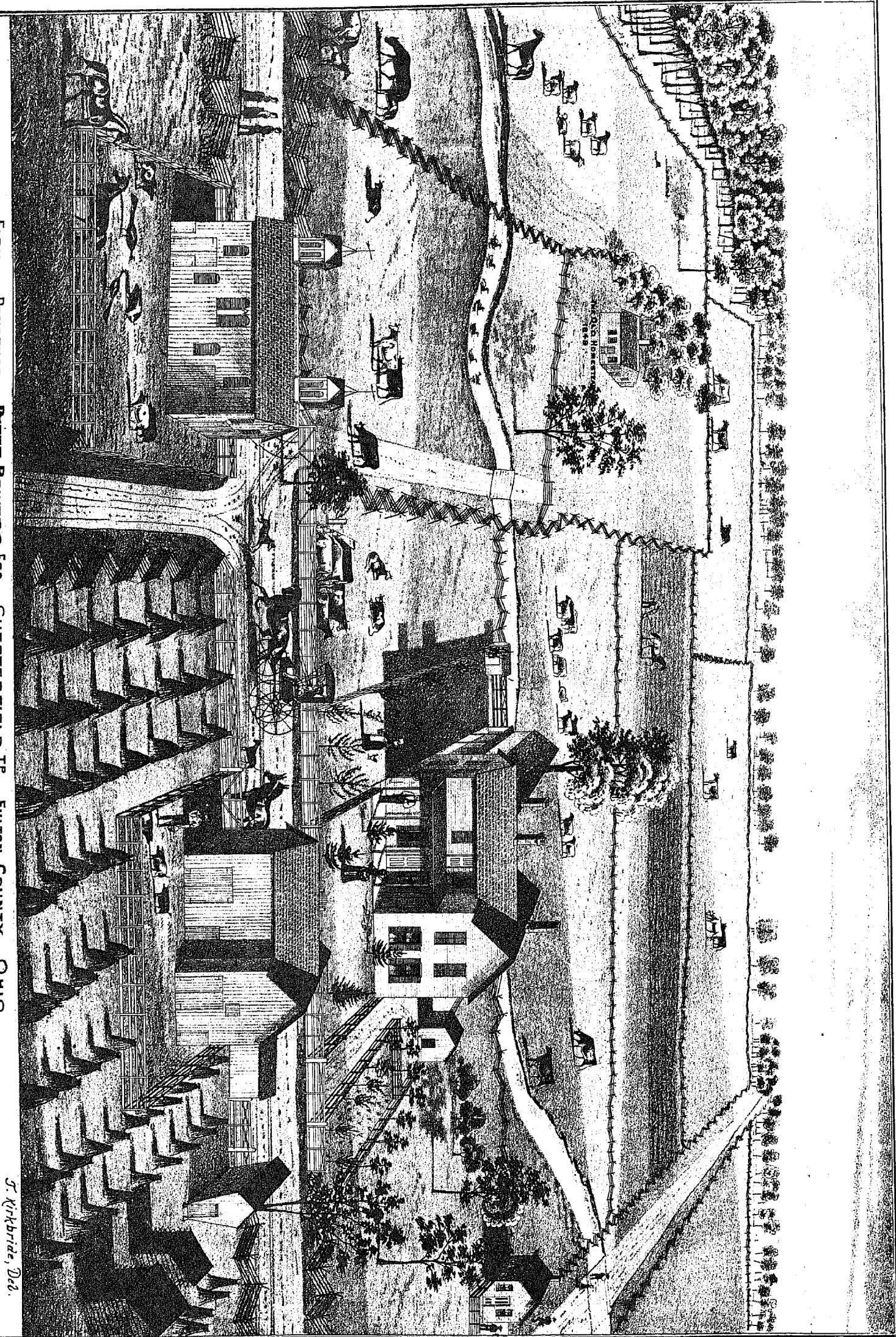

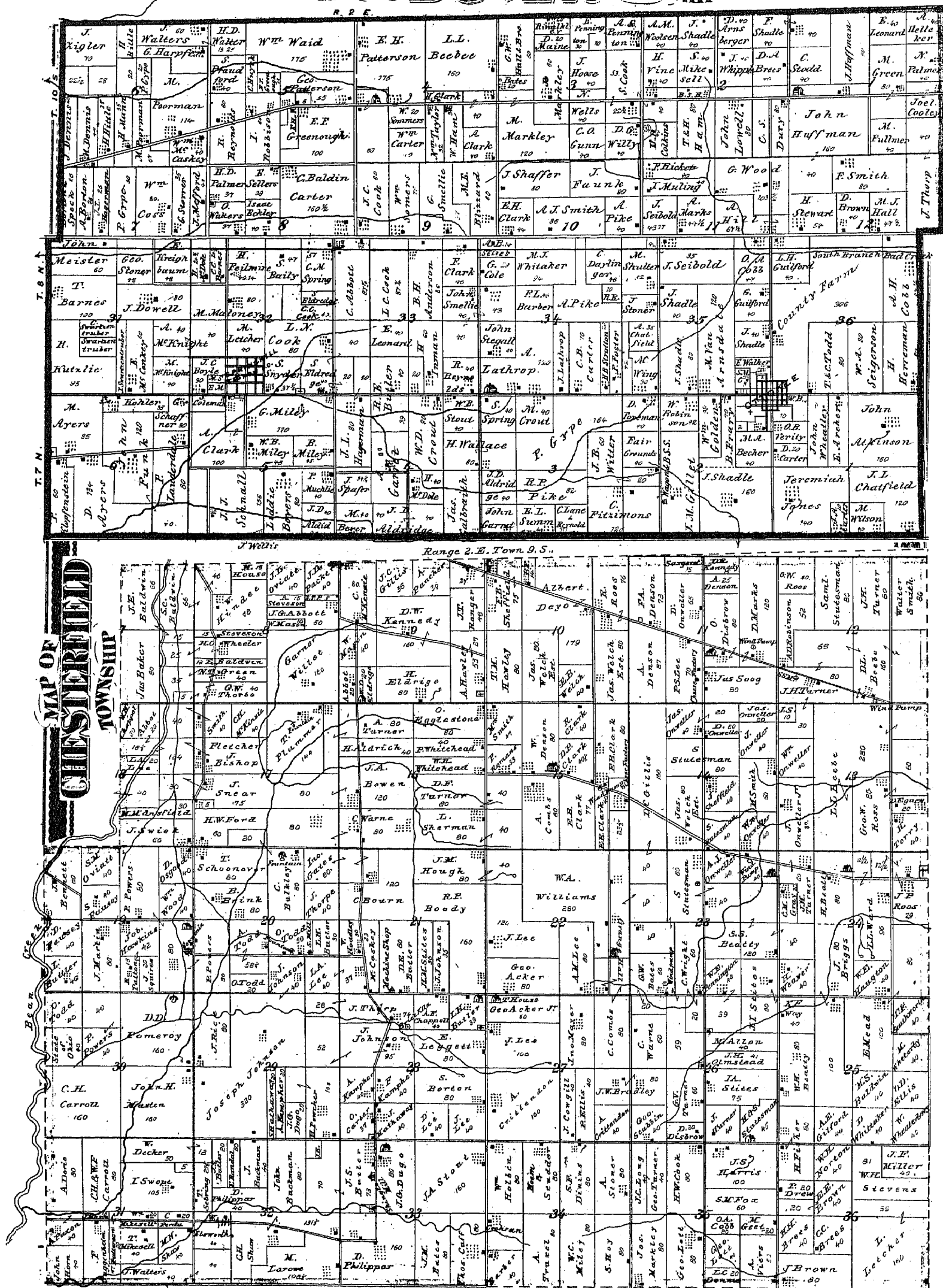

JAMES C. VAUGHAN was born in Fulton County, Ohio, August 30, 1835. His wife, Harriet A. (Taylor) Vaughan, was born in Lucas County, June 30, 1840. They were married in Lucas County, Ohio, March 20, 1869. Their children are as follows: Jason W., born April 26, 1861; Cora, born February 19, 1863; Rodney B., born July 24, 1865; Mary, born September 4, 1867, died September 6, 1868; Carey A., born October 20, 1869; Ida, born May 18, 1872, died July 23, 1873; Lewis B., born December 6, 1873. Alexander and Rebecca (Jones) Vaughan, parents of the subject of this sketch, were born, the former in Pennsylvania, the latter in Holmes County, Ohio, and died in Noble County, Michigan. This couple settled in what is now Fulton Township, Fulton County, then Lenawee County, Michigan, in 1835, and their son, James, was the first white child born in Fulton Township. Mrs. Vaughan is a daughter of William and Mary (Carrson) Taylor, who settled in Fulton County in 1835. Mr. Vaughan has been township trustee two years, and postmaster a number of years. He belonged to Company H, 130th Regiment O. N. G., in the war of the rebellion. He received an honorable discharge. Caleb J. Vaughan enlisted in Company 1, 38th Regiment, O. V. I., in 1861, served three years, and was always with his regiment and ready for duty. He was honorably discharged at the close of the war. Post-office, Al. Business, farmer and lumberman, section 1.

JOHN H. BATDORFF and his wife, Caroline (Brown) Batdorff, were born in Wayne County, Ohio, September 11, 1840, and March 23, 1843. They were also married in Wayne County, Ohio, September 28, 1865. They have two sons: Russell B., born December 12, 1867; Mahlon, born October 18, 1871. John and Elizabeth (Morgan) Batdorff, parents of the subject of this sketch, were born, the former in Pennsylvania, in 1816, the latter in Wayne County, Ohio. They reside in York Township, whence they removed, in 1842. Mrs. Batdorff's parents are William W. and Phoebe (Lee) Brown, the former of Virginia, the latter of Ohio, now residing in Wayne County, Ohio. Mr. Batdorff enlisted in Company A, 120th Regiment O. V. I., in 1862, and served in the Union army three years. He was captured on Red River, May 31, 1864, and taken to Tyler, Texas, where he remained until the war closed, when he was discharged. He took part in a number of battles—Chickasaw, Vicksburg, Black River, Jackson, and others. He also assisted in capturing 45,000 prisoners. Post-office, Al. Business, farmer and drover, section 4.

WILLIAM C. HOEIT. Post-office, Al. Nativity, Canton. Business, Milling.

ANDREW JACKSON KNAPP was born in Homer County, New York, March 28, 1822. He is a son of James and Abigail Knapp. Mrs. Lovina M. (Brown) Knapp was born in Fairfield, Huron County, Ohio, February 15, 1826. This couple have a family of five children: Laura, Charles J., died in 1860, Frank B., William and Lizzie. Mrs. Knapp's parents were Henry H. and Laura M. (Merrill) Brown. Post-office, Wauson. Business, farmer, section 14. Residence, Clinton Township.

LYMAN TOMPKINS was born in Seneca County, Ohio, Post-office, Al. Business, surgeon and physician. Residence, Fulton Township.

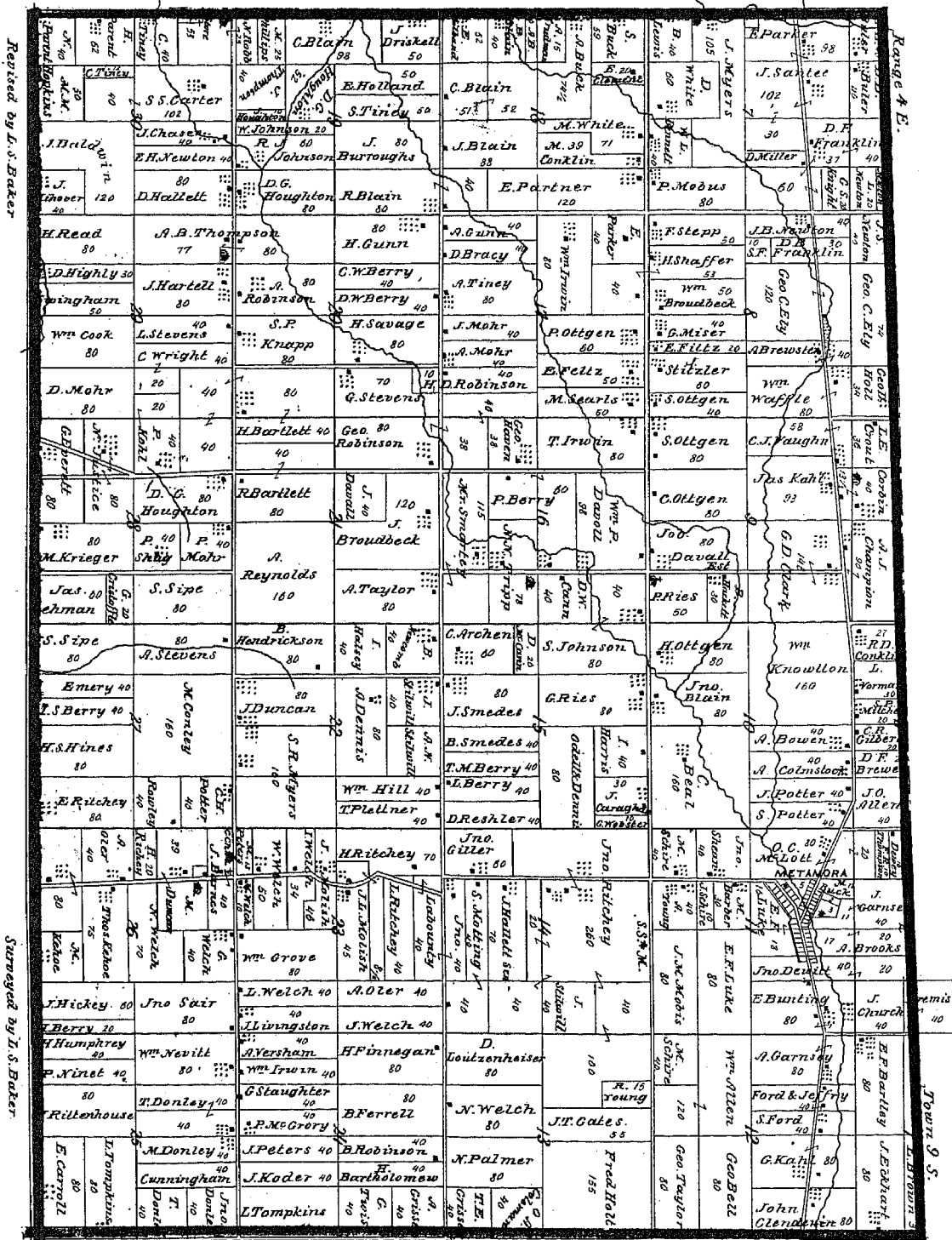
FRANKLIN TOWNSHIP.

WILLIAM J. RUSSELL and his wife, Harriet E. (Anderson) Russell, were born in Cumberland County, Pennsylvania, October 3, 1834, and December 4, 1837. They were married October 21, 1856. They have two sons: John W. N., born September 17, 1857; George W. K., born March 21, 1861. The parents of this couple, John and Sarah Russell, and Thomas and Alice Anderson, were all natives of Pennsylvania. Mr. John Russell died in 1861. Mr. and Mrs. Anderson settled in Fulton County in 1866, and William J. Russell the same year. Mr. W. has filled the office of supervisor and school director. Post-office, Fayette. Business, stock raiser and farmer, section 7.

JOHN D. RUSSELL, brother of William J., was also born in Cumberland County, Pennsylvania, April 15, 1844. He was married in Fulton County, November 9, 1871, to Athalinda J., daughter of Norris and Mary A. Palmer, the former of Pennsylvania, the latter of Virginia. Mrs. R. was born in Knox County, Ohio, June 1, 1847. Mr. Russell belonged to Company G, 22d Regiment, Pennsylvania V. I., in the war of the rebellion. He entered service August 20, 1864, and was discharged August 3, 1865, having taken part in several skirmishes, but no large battles. Mr. Russell lost \$2,000 worth of timber and railroad ties in Pennsylvania by fire, in the year 1872. The same year he settled in Fulton County, and is now one of the proprietors of the steam saw mills known as the Russell & Shilling Mills. Post-office, Fayette, section 5.

ASHER E. BIRD, son of Asher E. and Catharine Bird, of Pennsylvania, and who settled in Fulton County in 1856, was born in Fulton County June 6, 1845. He was married to Louie Van Buskirk, in Michigan, September 13, 1862. Her parents, Daniel and Harriet Van Buskirk, were born, the former in Maryland, the latter in Loudon County, Virginia, where Mrs. Bird was born, June 21, 1846. The family settled in Fulton County in 1860. Mr. Bird cleared the farm upon which he now lives. In the war of the rebellion he belonged to the 6th Regiment, O. V. I. He received a slight wound in the leg at "Appomattox Court House," the day Gen. Lee surrendered. Mr. Bird has a piece of the apple tree under which Lee surrendered. He received an honorable discharge. Post-office, Fayette. Business, farmer and stock raiser, section 5.

JAMES S. RIDDLE and his wife, Matilda (Siddons) Riddle, were born in Pennsylvania, the former in Allegheny County, June 29, 1813, the latter in Washington County, September 17, 1812. They were married in Wayne County, Ohio, November 21, 1831. Their children are: John Q., resides in Wauson; Charles C., resides in Pioneer, Ohio; Thomas H., resides in Terre Haute, Indiana; May J., resides in Michigan; Louisa, resides in Fulton County; and James J., resides in Terre Haute, Indiana. John and Jane Riddle, parents of James S., were born, the former in Donegal County, Ireland, the latter in Pennsylvania. They





settled in Fulton County in 1852. John and Magdalena Siddons, parents of Mrs. Riddle, were born in Essex County, New Jersey, the latter in Butler County, Pennsylvania. Mr. Riddle was a member of an Ohio regiment in the war of 1861-5. He served two years, was taken prisoner at Harper's Ferry, afterward paroled, then exchanged, after which he re-enlisted and was discharged at the close of the war. Mr. R. settled in Fulton County in 1845. He has been township trustee eighteen years, justice of the peace nine years, school director twenty-four years, and is at present infantry director. Post-office, Tedrow. Business, farmer and stock raiser, section 1.

PETER MINICH was born in Northampton County, Pennsylvania, October 21, 1806. He was married in Seneca County, Ohio, January 31, 1829, to Catharine A. Downs, who was born in Ross County, Ohio, April 1, 1818. They have a family of four children: John L., Carolina E., Louisa E., and Lodema A. Mr. Minich's great-grandfather was born in Germany, and emigrated to America in 1600. He settled in what was many years after called Pennsylvania. He had three sons, Henry, Peter, and John. Peter, the grandfather of the subject of this sketch, had one son, Henry, who was born in Pennsylvania, and who married Elizabeth Kanouse, of Northampton, Pennsylvania. They had eight sons and one daughter: Peter, William Henry (deceased), Julia Ann, Anthony, Daniel, John, Abram, David, and Jonas (deceased). Mr. Minich journeyed from Pennsylvania to Ohio, a distance of 700 miles, on foot, and settled on a farm what was then Lucas County; but has since been changed to Franklin Township, Fulton County. He has cleared and improved the same. Mrs. Minich's great-grandfather was Jacob Lehn, born in the dukedom of Mecklenburg, Germany, in 1525. He was the son of a nobleman, and emigrated to America in 1545, and settled in Lexington County. They had seven sons and two daughters; the boys died in infancy. He was married in Fulton County, Ohio, November 16, 1852, to Esther, daughter of Robert Downs, of the Province of Ireland, the latter of Wales. Mrs. Dickason was born in Tuscarawas County, Ohio, September 28, 1828. They have four children: Jennie (Mrs. Cahow), Benjamin F., Mary E., and Etta S. Mrs. Dickason has two sisters, Lovina and Sarah Jane. Mr. D. has been justice of the peace and township trustee of Franklin Township six years. Post-office, Tedrow. Business, stock raising and farming, section 1.

JOHN McLAUGHLIN and his wife Margaret (Kilne) McLaughlin, were born in Perry County, Pennsylvania, December 22, 1812, and March 22, 1817, respectively. They were married in Richland County, Ohio, December 21, 1834. They have had a family of twelve children: Daniel, born November 16, 1835; William, born August 3, 1837; died February 3, 1851; Fernelia, born June 26, 1839; Sarah J., born May 11, 1842; David T., born March 30, 1844; died August 6, 1864; George W., born January 17, 1846; Milo, born December 2, 1847; died October 26, 1871; Elsie, born June 6, 1849; Oscar, born September 26, 1851; died June 10, 1852; Francis M., born March 25, 1853; Margaret E., born December 26, 1855; died April 28, 1863; John C. F., born December 7, 1858. Daniel and Isabel McLaughlin, parents of the subject of this sketch, were born in Perry County, Pennsylvania, and the latter in Ireland, March 22, 1792. They settled in Fulton County in 1836. George C. Callahan, father of Mrs. McLaughlin, was born in Perry County, Pennsylvania. David T. McLaughlin was in the Union army in the war of the rebellion. He was captured and taken prisoner, was confined at Belle Isle six months, after which he was exchanged and finally killed at the battle of Atlanta. Post-office, West Unity, Williams County. Business, stock raiser and farmer, section 1.

CHARLES L. STEVENS, son of William H. and Armentia Stevens, who settled in Fulton County, Ohio, in 1850, was born in Knox County, Ohio, December 25, 1835. He was married in Franklin Township, Fulton County, in December, 1859, to Hannah, daughter of Eschel and Mary Masters, who was born in Fulton County, February 22, 1840. Their children are: Mary A., Florence E., William L., and Waldo E., and infant. Mr. Stevens settled in Fulton County, Ohio, in 1850. He has been assessor and township clerk. In the war of 1861-5 he was captain of Company H, 6th Regiment, O. V. I., served three years and five months. He participated in the battles of Winchester, Charleston, Fort Wagner, siege of Richmond, Petersburg, and surrender of Lee. He was wounded at Fort Wagner, and draws a pension. Post-office, Tedrow. Business, stock raiser, carpenter and farmer, sections 1 and 2.

DORSEY BARNES and his wife, Elizabeth (Shaffer) Barnes, were born in Maryland, the former in Washington County, Maryland, September 2, 1804, the latter in Baltimore County, October 14, 1803. They were married in Michigan, March 28, 1842. Their children are: Christina (Mrs. Clark), John (deceased), Mary A. (Mrs. Nixon), Ozias N., and Dorsey S. Ozias and Mary Barnes, and Jacob and Alice Shaffer, parents of this couple, were all born in Maryland. John T. Barnes was a member of Company H, 3rd Regiment, O. V. I., served three years, was taken prisoner and was in Andersonville eighteen months. He was finally released, and died in the hospital near Columbus. Mr. Barnes entered his farm in September, 1833, and the same day a party of men rented the first log cabin in German Township, owned by Christian Lawver. Post-office, Tedrow. Business, stock raising and farming, section 2.

L. G. HITTLE and his wife, Margaret (Stambach) Hittle, were born in Pennsylvania, July 27, 1808, and December 9, 1814, respectively. They were married in the same state, August 28, 1836. They have had a family of eight children: Mary J., born November 12, 1837; William H., born December 3, 1839; Salina, born May 13, 1842; Anna M., born April 12, 1845; George W., born February 4, 1848; Harrison B., born April 21, 1850; John P., born June 13, 1852; Cornelia A., born December 12, 1858. Daniel and Margaret Stambach, parents of Mrs. Hittle, were born in Pennsylvania. Frederick and Mary Hittle, parents of Mr. H., were also born in Lehigh County, Pennsylvania. Post-office, Fayette. Business, farming and stock raising, section 6.

GEORGE E. RITTENHOUSE was born in Hunterdon County, New Jersey, August 14, 1824. His parents, George and Mary Rittenhouse, were born, the former in New Jersey, the latter in Pennsylvania, and removed to this county in 1852. Mr. Rittenhouse was married in Fulton County, January 18, 1866, to Rhoda, daughter of Isaiah and Mary Borton, the former of New Jersey, the latter of Virginia. Mrs. R. was born in Stark County, Ohio, June 21, 1834. Their family consists of: Martha E., born September 10, 1866; Lillian E., born May 23, 1868; Mary W., born September 6, 1870; Mary J., born August 10, 1871. Mr. Rittenhouse lost a brother in the Union army. He was a member of an Illinois regiment, and died with the measles at Jefferson City, Missouri. Simeon Borton, brother of Mrs. R., belonged to Company I, 61st Regiment, O. V. I., and was killed after three years' service, in a skirmish in May, 1866. J. E. Borton was also three years' service. He was taken prisoner, returned home and died soon after. Mr. R. has filled the several offices of justice of the peace, supervisor, director, and constable. His house was set on fire October 23, 1875, but it was discovered in time to prevent damage. Post-office, Tedrow. Business, carpenter, stock raiser and farmer, section 36.

JOSEPH ELY, son of Asher and Catharine Ely, of New Jersey, was born in Northumberland County, Pennsylvania, March 4, 1814. He was married to a daughter of William and Catharine Struble, in Morrow County, Ohio, October 26, 1837. They had a family of nine children: Adrianna (deceased), Emily (Mrs. Powell), Joseph W., William H., Asher, Francisco, Mary E., Catharine G. (Mrs. Kelley), and

Robert. Mrs. Ely deceased. Mr. Ely was married a second time in Lenawee County, Michigan, in 1860, to Rebecca, daughter of Jonathan and Martha Leacock, of New Jersey, who was born in the same state, April 2, 1822. They have one son and one daughter: Cassius M. Clay (deceased), and Martha L. Asher was a member of the 2nd Regiment, O. V. I., and Francisco, of the 128th Regiment, O. V. I., in the war of 1861-5. They were honorably discharged at the close of the war. Jerome and Dallas Eves, sons of Mrs. Ely, belonged to the 20th and 18th Regiments, Michigan V. I., in the same war. They served their time and were honorably discharged. Mr. Ely settled in Fulton County, in 1838. He has been county commissioner fifteen years, township clerk four years, township trustee four years, and justice of the peace three years. Post-office, Fayette. Business, farmer and stock raiser, section 7.

G. H. BAUM, son of George and Elizabeth Baum, the former of New Jersey, the latter of Virginia, was born in Mahoning County, Ohio, July 18, 1816. He was married in the same county, October 10, 1839, to Esther, daughter of Samuel and Esther Kline, of Pennsylvania, who was born in Pennsylvania, February 20, 1817. Their children are: Joseph, Angeline, Lorinda (deceased), Esther (deceased), and Curtis H. Mr. Baum settled in Fulton County, in 1853. Post-office, West Unity, Ohio. Business, stock raiser and farmer, section 35.

WILLIAM O. ELY settled in Fulton County, in 1848. He was born in Knox County, Ohio, April 1, 1837, and married in Michigan, February 18, 1858, to Martha J. Bird, born in Lucas County, Ohio, August 3, 1837. They have two children living: Alice M., and Lottie C., and three deceased: Sarah, Emma, and Catharine M., in 1850, and Nettie, in 1870. William and Sarah Ely, parents of the subject of this sketch, were natives of Pennsylvania, and settled in Fulton County, in 1848, where the former died, and the latter still resides. Asher E. and Catharine Bird, parents of Mrs. Ely, were also natives of Pennsylvania. They settled in Fulton County, in 1836. Levi Ely, belonged to the 125th Regiment, O. V. I., in the war of 1861-5, served nineteen months, and was honorably discharged. Nelson Ely died in camp during the same war. Post-office, Fayette. Business, stock raiser and farmer, section 8.

ANTHONY SNYDER and his wife Deliah (Shipman) Snyder, were born in Northumberland County, Pennsylvania, December 8, 1823, and August 12, 1830. They were married in the same county, November 2, 1849. Their children are: Tamar E. (Mrs. W. H. Ely), Lydia J., Ainsman E., Irvin A., Mary F., George H., and William S. (deceased). Peter and Hannah Snyder, the latter of New Jersey, Harmon and Elizabeth Shipman, parents of Mrs. Snyder, were born, the former in New Jersey, the latter in Pennsylvania. They settled in Fulton County, in 1859. Mr. Snyder was township trustee twenty-one years, and has also filled the office of supervisor and school director. Post-office, Fayette. Business, stock raiser and farmer, section 5.

JOSEPH REASONER, son of Talmond and Desire Reasoner, of Dutchess County, New York, both of whom died in Williams County, Ohio, was born in Montgomery County, New York, January 31, 1814. He was married in Williams County, Ohio, in 1854, to Leah Lavelly, daughter of Peter and Frances Lavelly, of Pennsylvania. Mrs. Reasoner was born in Holmes County, Ohio, June 5, 1836. Mr. Reasoner was twice married. He had a family of twelve children; by his first wife: Eliza (deceased), Matilda, Daniel (deceased), and Catharine, by his second wife: Frances C., William T. S., George H. T., Albert E., Dora E., and Mercy T. Daniel was a member of the 68th Regiment, O. V. I., in the war of 1861-5. He was wounded in front of Atlanta, July 22, 1864, in the third year of his service, and died in the hospital. Mr. Reasoner has filled the several offices of county commissioner, infantry director, justice of the peace, for twenty-four years in Williams County. Mr. Reasoner settled in Fulton County, in 1875. Post-office, Fayette. Business, stock raiser and farmer, section 8.

SAMUEL B. DARBY was born in Rutland County, Vermont, May 18, 1807. He was married October 26, 1828, in New York, to Sarah, daughter of Samuel and Sarah Guilford, of Massachusetts. Mrs. Darby was born in Franklin County, Massachusetts, November 5, 1810. They have four children: Fannie Maria (Mrs. Hall, of Indiana), Emily R. (Mrs. Zimmerman, of Michigan), A. J. Darby, and William L. Darby. Samuel and Sally Guilford were the parents of seventeen children, fourteen of whom lived to the age of maturity: Robert, Samuel, Oester, Burbridge, Kezia, Elizabeth, Frederick, William, Sarah, Mary, John, Solon, and Ann Statia. In the Fall of 1836, Mr. Darby sold his farm in the State of New York, and removed west. He entered a farm on the banks of the Tiffin River, where he now resides, and of forty acres on the banks of Henry County, but which has since been made a part in what was then Henry County, and arrived with his family to take possession of their new home. His possessions were, a wife and three children, two pairs of oxen and a wagon, one dollar and seventy-five cents in money, and a little provision, and the shattered side of a stump for a habitation. The country was low, wet, and yet destitute of pure water, for neighbors it gave them plenty of Indians, and offered plenty of game such as bears, wolves, turkeys, deer, etc. Mr. Darby shook his head, and thought it looked forbidding, but Mrs. Darby was full of hope, so with stout hearts they pitched their tents, and began plowing. He, dispossessed of one pair of oxen, and replenished the stock of provisions, built a cabin home, opened up the woods, and looked hopefully toward the future. The following winter, Mr. Darby and a few neighbors built a small school house, and Mr. Darby taught, the winter school numbering twelve scholars. He was the first postmaster in the county. The mail route was from Defiance to Medina, Michigan. German township was organized in 1840, and Mr. Darby was elected township clerk, soon after organized in 1840, and Mr. Darby was elected justice of the peace, with the exception of the peace when he was county recorder. Mr. Darby now lives in a nicely improved and settled country, with good roads, good buildings, in a township which contains two steam saw mills, one planing mill, one blacksmith shop, six churches, and six school houses, but without a post-office, store, grocery, or saloon. Post-office, Elmira. Business, farmer, section 4.

JOSIAH CONAWAY, son of John and Mary A. Conaway, of Maryland, was born in Cochocton County, Ohio, February 17, 1819. He was married in Knox County, February 27, 1840, to Jane, daughter of Sylvester and Elizabeth Larson, of New Jersey, who was born in of Sylvester County, Ohio, June 10, 1822. They have one son, Leander, who Knox County on the homestead. They also have one son deceased, Ernest. Mr. Conaway's father died in Knox County, the peace, and township clerk, County. Mr. Conaway has been justice of the peace, and township clerk. He settled in Fulton County, in 1848. Post-office, Fayette. Business, carpenter, stock raiser and farmer, section 3.

LEANDER BUXTON and his wife Mary J. (Brown) Buxton, were born in Knox County, Ohio, October 1, 1842, and January 7, 1837, respectively. They were married in the same county, December 25, 1861. They have a family of three children: Florence A., Nellie A., and Elmer E. The parents of Mr. Buxton were John and Elizabeth Buxton, who were born in Maryland; the former died December 12, 1857; William T., Leander, their children were: Francis, Noah W., John W., William T., Leander, and Rebecca E., Sarah A., Mary J., Minerva, and Louisa. Jonathan and Rebecca E., Sarah A., Mary J., were natives of New Jersey. Mrs. Mary Brown, parents of Mrs. Buxton, were natives of New Jersey. The children of this couple are: Thomas R., Joel P., James S., Jonathan, Sarah A., Ann E., and Phoebe S. Mr. Buxton was a member of the 15th A. V. I., in the war of 1861-5. He settled in Fulton County, in 1865. Post-office, Fayette. Business, farmer, section 3.

PETER GYPE. Post-office, Tedrow. Business, proprietor of steam saw mill. Nativity, Germany. Settled in Fulton County, in 1849. Residence, Franklin Township, section 1.

WILLIAM H. STEVENS, son of William H. and Sarah Stevens, the former of Kentucky, the latter of New Jersey, was born in Pennsylvania, June 4, 1809. He was married in Morrow County, Ohio,

February 5, 1851, to Effie, daughter of Stephen and Sarah Foster, of New Jersey, who was born in Warren County, New Jersey, August 10, 1815. The children of Mr. and Mrs. Stevens are: Royal C., Charles L., Daniel L., Sylvanus M., William H., John S., and Sarah C. The sons of Mr. Stevens were all in the Union army in the war of the Rebellion. Royal C., Charles L., and John S., belonged to the 67th Regiment, O. V. I., William H., Daniel L., and Sylvanus M., to the 44th Regiment, O. V. I. Sylvanus was ten months in Andersonville prison. William lost an arm at the battle of Pea Ridge. Royal was shot in the breast at Fort Wagner. Charles L. was wounded at the same fort. John passed through the war unharmed. Mr. Stevens settled in Fulton County, in 1854. Post-office, Tedrow. Business, stock raiser and farmer, section 1.

PHILIP R. FISHER. Post-office, West Unity, Williams County, Ohio. Nativity, Pennsylvania. Settled in Fulton County, in 1845. Residence, Franklin Township. Business, stock raiser and farmer, section 12.

J. L. FIDLER. Post-office, Amanda. Nativity, Knox County, Ohio. Business, stock raiser and farmer. Residence, Franklin Township, section 1.

BENJAMIN BORTON, JR., was of a family of five children, Nathan C., Ann D., Benjamin, and Job B., sons and daughters of Job and Mary C. Borton, of New Jersey. He was born in Williams County, Ohio, November 28, 1850, and married in Fulton County, in 1870, to Esther, daughter of John and Catharine Harley, of Pennsylvania, who was born in Richland County, Ohio. They have three children: Mary C., Jennie A., and Bryant. Mr. Borton settled in Fulton County, in 1871. Post-office, West Unity, Williams County, Ohio. Business, stock raiser and farmer, section 36.

JAMES RANDELS and his wife Sarah E. (Morfoot) Randels, were born in Ohio, the former in Columbiana County, August 4, 1831, the latter in Trumbull County, April 4, 1837.
