We have interceded in Cuba because of our concerns over Spain's cruel treatment of its inhabitants. Our Congress has enacted the Teller Amendment, forbidding American annexation of Cuba, leaving "control of the island to its people." We should extend this courtesy to all Spanish possessions we are working to liberate, rather than annex the territories. The goal of the current war with Spain must be the continued spread of self-determination among all people, not the growth of the nascent American Empire. We should liberate more people from oppressive colonial governments, not give them a new oppression based in Washington.

Women's Suffrage?

There has been increasing talk over the past few years for the US Constitution to be amended to allow women the right to vote. After the arrest of Susan B. Anthony in 1872 for her attempt to vote, and the 1875 Supreme Court ruling that the constitution did not guarantee women the right to vote, unrest among women has grown. Also the concept of the New Woman of the 90's which emphasizes the independence of women has led to the growth in the push for women's suffrage. Ever since Wyoming first allowed women the right to vote in its state constitution, western states have led the way in allowing women to vote. Most have experienced very few problems as a result. The impact on most elections has been minimal. Research shows that most of the women tend to vote the same way as their husbands. The people showing up to the polls are still predominately male. Very few women have sought political office either. One of the fears of letting women vote has always been that to do so would dilute democracy in America. We don't need more uninformed voters being seduced by the political bosses. If this is not the case then what is the harm in allowing women across the nation to cast a ballot, since the impact of their votes would be small anyway. Give them what they want and quiet the agitation. Give women the right to vote and it will curb any ideas of equality in other areas of life and society and lend stability to our great country.

Anti-Imperialist League Emerges

The American Anti-Imperialist League is a new organization established on June 15, 1898, to battle the American annexation of the Philippines as an insular area. The anti-imperialists oppose expansion, believing that imperialism violates the fundamental principle that just republican government must derive from "consent of the governed." The League argues that such activity would necessitate the abandonment of American ideals of self-government and nonintervention—ideals expressed in the United States Declaration of Independence, George Washington's Farewell Address and Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg Address. The Anti-Imperialist League is hoping to exert political pressure on the current administration to cease its dangerous and onerous policies toward other peoples of the world. Prominent members of this organization include civic leaders like Mark Twain, Samuel Gompers, William Dean Howells, and Henry James.

The Village Mercantile Under Attack

Rumors have been circulating for some time now that The Village Mercantile is advertising and selling non-union rolled cigars. Word has reached the National Cigar Maker's Union of this situation. They are not happy about the way things stand. The head of their union, Mr. Samuel Gompers, has personally promised to deal with this issue. He says that if the rumors prove to be true and The Mercantile continues to sell the current cigars then economic pressure will be brought to bear in the form of boycotts and pickets.

My Visit to the San

I was so pleased to see the article about Doctor John Harvey Kellogg in the May 31st newspaper that I wanted to share my own knowledge of The Battle Creek Sanitarium, nicknamed The San.



Edouard Rene de Laboulaye, while hardly a common name, is certainly well known in America. A French Senator, college administrator and chairman of the French Anti-Slavery Society, he was also a careful observer of the politics of America, and an admirer of its constitution. He wrote a three-volume work on the political history of America and published it in Paris. During the Civil War, he was a zealous advocate of the Union cause and published histories of the cultural connections of the two nations. At the conclusion of the War, he had the idea of presenting a statue representing liberty as a gift to the United States. The sculptor Frederic Auguste Bartholdi turned the idea into a design, and Gustave Eiffel built it. Twelve years ago, the beautiful copper lady rose to stand tall above the water of New York City. Long may she stand and remind us of all the good America can do at home and in the world.
