

US Troops Victorious in Cuba!

Over the past week and a half US forces in Cuba have made major advancements in their push to capture the major city and port of Santiago on the south shore. Under the command of General William R. Shafter, American forces met and defeated Spanish forces at Las Guasimos on June 24th. One week later, in two simultaneous battles, El Caney and San Juan Hill, the Spanish were once again turned back and forced to retreat. At the center of much of this fighting has been the cavalry unit known as the Rough Riders, commanded by General Leonard Wood and Colonel Theodore Roosevelt. Roosevelt, who had been the Assistant Secretary of the Navy prior to enlisting, emerged as the hero of the conflict by leading his troops on a bold charge up Kettle Hill against a withering barrage of fire from the Spanish. Colonel Roosevelt emerged unscathed, but nearly a hundred of his soldiers were killed or wounded. After securing Kettle Hill and San Juan Hill, General Shafter is now ready to start his assault on Santiago.

About 22 Black sailors went down when the battleship *Maine* was sunk in Havana Harbor in February.



Columbus:

A beautiful Fireworks display, July 4th at Buckeye Park – Also Swimming, tobogganing, cash prizes awarded, and dancing into the evening.

"Wells Post, G.A.R. celebrated the Fourth of July in an appropriate manner. A rousing campfire was given to the members and associates and their families, and an elaborate program was prepared for the occasion.

Labor's Great Holiday

"The labor picnic at Andrew's Grove, corner of Eighteenth Street and Livingston Avenue, was a grand success and the thousands present were entering into the festivities of the day with holiday

enthusiasm...The merry-go-round was a source of great sport to the young people, while amongst the heavily patronized features were the miniature horse race, dancing floor, and baseball baby rack. The baseball game in the morning between the Columbus Reds and the Rosebuds proved very amusing and resulted in a victory for the Rosebuds...Quite a sensation was caused about 11a.m. when the transfer wagon arrived containing the 17th regiment band, followed by a gaily decorated wagon filled to overflowing with the members of the Uncle Sam and Mother Hubbard baseball team.

Cincinnati:

Coney Island – The grandest Patriotic celebration in the Middle States was held at the 'People's Favorite resort.' Concerts and dancing all day, Balloon Ascensions, Parachute leaps, Variety Entertainments, and Grandest Fireworks Display Ever Presented in the Ohio Valley. Oakwood Park had Free dancing, a balloon ascension, and parachute jumps.

Toledo:

The day was spent in various and sundry ways. There were many picnics and nearly every one of the many beautiful groves in and about Toledo were occupied by one or many jolly parties. The river was another fruitful source of amusement, and crafts of every description freighted with happy humanity and daily decorated colors were floating on its broad and placid bosom.

Cleveland:

The program of the day, as completed, was a day of brilliant and interesting events. The exercises opened at 6 o'clock in the morning with a national salute of 46 guns. 



Village Suffragettes March

During the Independence Day Celebration on Saturday last, women representing the H&P Club had a rally and gave speeches demanding the right to vote for women. Visiting speaker Mrs. Ida. B. Wells- Barnett gave a sturring address to the crowd. Mrs. Madeleine LaLiberte, President of the H&P, and fellow club member, Mrs. Laliberte said, "A look back through history will show that women have provided enormous help to their husbands, from the earliest days of our great country, through wars and hardships to the present. Women have assisted their husbands in running farms and small businesses and by working alongside them as equal partners." Mrs. Gray, who has a college degree and owns a profitable business in town, stated, "Even though I own a thriving business doing the ordering, bookkeeping, purchasing, and supervising the hired help I have no say in the taxes I pay nor in the laws that regulate my business. Why should I have no vote? I do have the honor of holding an elected office, but I hold that office only because the town council ALLOWS women to vote on an election-by-election basis. They do not see fit to grant us the right to vote in every village election. I implore the current town council and mayor to consider their decision in today's election to be a PERMANENT granting of THE RIGHT TO VOTE for women here in Ohio Village." Mrs. LaLiberte went on to say that many women are still reluctant to step out of the so-called "women's sphere" and to join the women's movement lest they be criticized or scorned. She said, "Ladies and gentlemen, the fight for voting rights has only just begun. It is clear to us that we must continue to petition our government officers to listen. If this does not prove successful, then we are determined to carry out even stronger measures and as Abigail Adams said, 'foment rebellion' ". Change is coming, but how fast will it come? In all likelihood we will see national women's suffrage in our lifetime. The Founding Fathers established a system that allows for slow, measured, and informed change free from the fanciful whims of the emotions of the time. Our hats are off the women of the Ohio Village who are leading this effort for informed change.



Hawaii Annexed

Ending years of controversy.

Since 1893 debate has raged over annexation.

War fever settles the issue.

On July 4th Congress passed the Newlands Resolution which officially annexed Hawaii to the United States. The resolution will be signed by McKinley on July 7.

The Newlands Resolution says, "Whereas, the Government of the Republic of Hawaii having, in due form, signified its consent, in the manner provided by its constitution, to cede absolutely and without reserve to the United States of America, all rights of sovereignty of whatsoever kind in and over the Hawaiian Islands and their dependencies, and also to cede and transfer to the United States, the absolute fee and ownership of all public, Government, or Crown lands, public buildings or edifices, ports, harbors, military equipment, and all other public property of every kind and description belonging to the Government of the Hawaiian Islands, together with every right and appurtenance thereunto appertaining: Therefore, Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That said cession is accepted, ratified, and confirmed, and that the said Hawaiian Islands and their dependencies be, and they are hereby, annexed as a part of the territory of the United States and are subject to the sovereign dominion thereof, and that all and singular the property and rights hereinbefore mentioned are vested in the United States of America." The Newlands Resolution establishes a five-member commissioner to study which laws are needed in Hawaii. The commission includes: Territorial

Morgan (D-AL), Representative Robert R. Hitt (R-IL) and former Hawaii Chief Justice Walter F. Frear (R-Hawaii Territory). Some members of Congress raised objections that establishing an elected territorial government in Hawaii would lead to the admission of a state with a non-white majority.


