A certain percentage of braceros would be processed and transported on the day that the remainder would stay overnight and would be selected and shipped out over the next fe laborers not selected for work on the day of their arrival may stay up to five days at the Center to find work. If not contracted within that time, the men are returned to the migricame from in Mexico. While staying at Rio Vista, laborors had access to food in the Me bathrooms, showers, recreation halfs and Mexican Consul office. Water fountains at Rio meeting places where the men could socialize, discuss life in Mexico and learn about propportunities at the processing center.


